Dear Mr Stewart,

The 1st Denmark Scout Group Committee recently applied for part funding through the Community Financial grants to have an additional storage area constructed and attached to the West side of the Scout Hall as you know we were successful, thank you. This letter is to seek Shire permission to construct this storage area.

This storage area will be 12 metres in length and 4 metres in width. This storage area will start at the south end of the hall facing Brazier Street, running alongside the west side of the hall to the double metal doors approximately one third of the length of the hall. We are aware that there are leech drains along this side of the hall and as such there will be no sealed floor, it will remain as dirt to this additional storage area, this will make for easy access to the leech drains should this be required.

This will be specifically to house the Scout Caravan and Camp trailer. The caravan is permanently left onsite at the Scout hall and we have found it to be a target for vandals on numerous occasions. Our caravan plays a major part in our fundraising activities. This storage shed will also keep our caravan safe and protected from Denmark's often inclement weather.

The Camp trailer is housed (with a great deal of difficulty) within the Camp room at the North end inside the hall. The storage shed would make for much easier accessibility for parking the trailer with a car as oppose to the trailer being pushed back in to position by hand which currently happens now. With the trailer in the storage shed this also allows us to make better use of our Camp room.

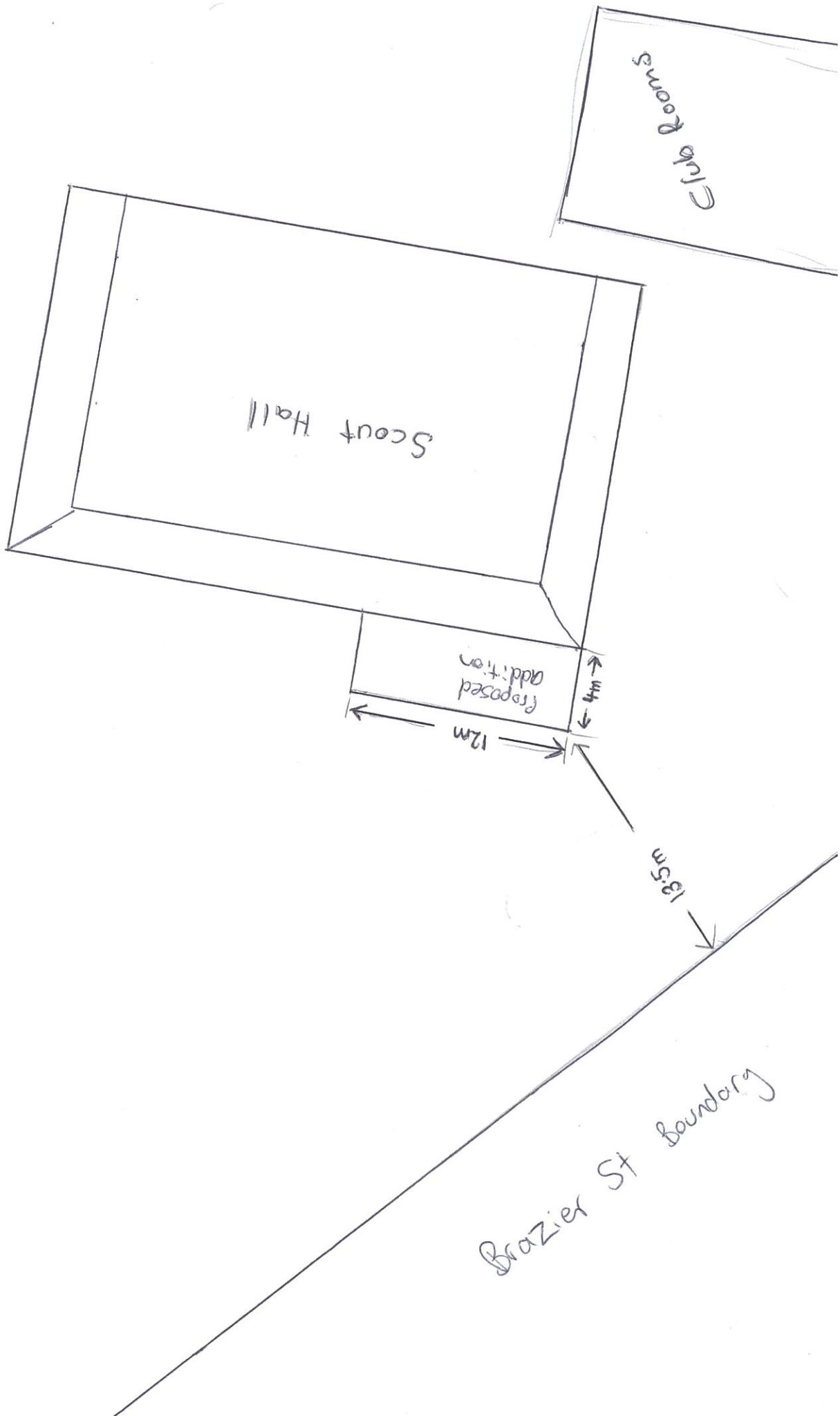
We are looking forward to having the structure erected so we can have both of these items safely housed and protected outside of the hall.

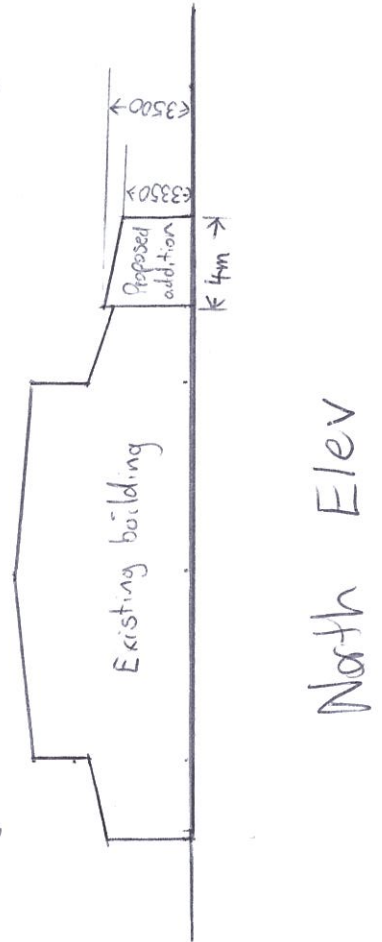
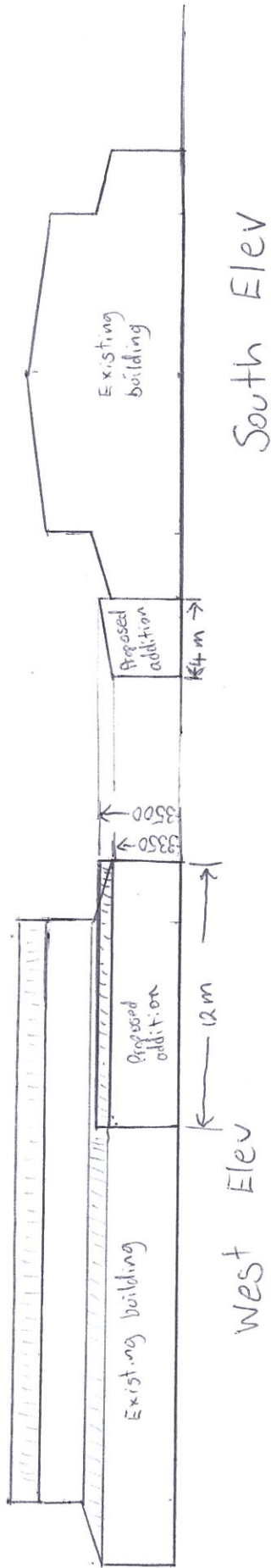

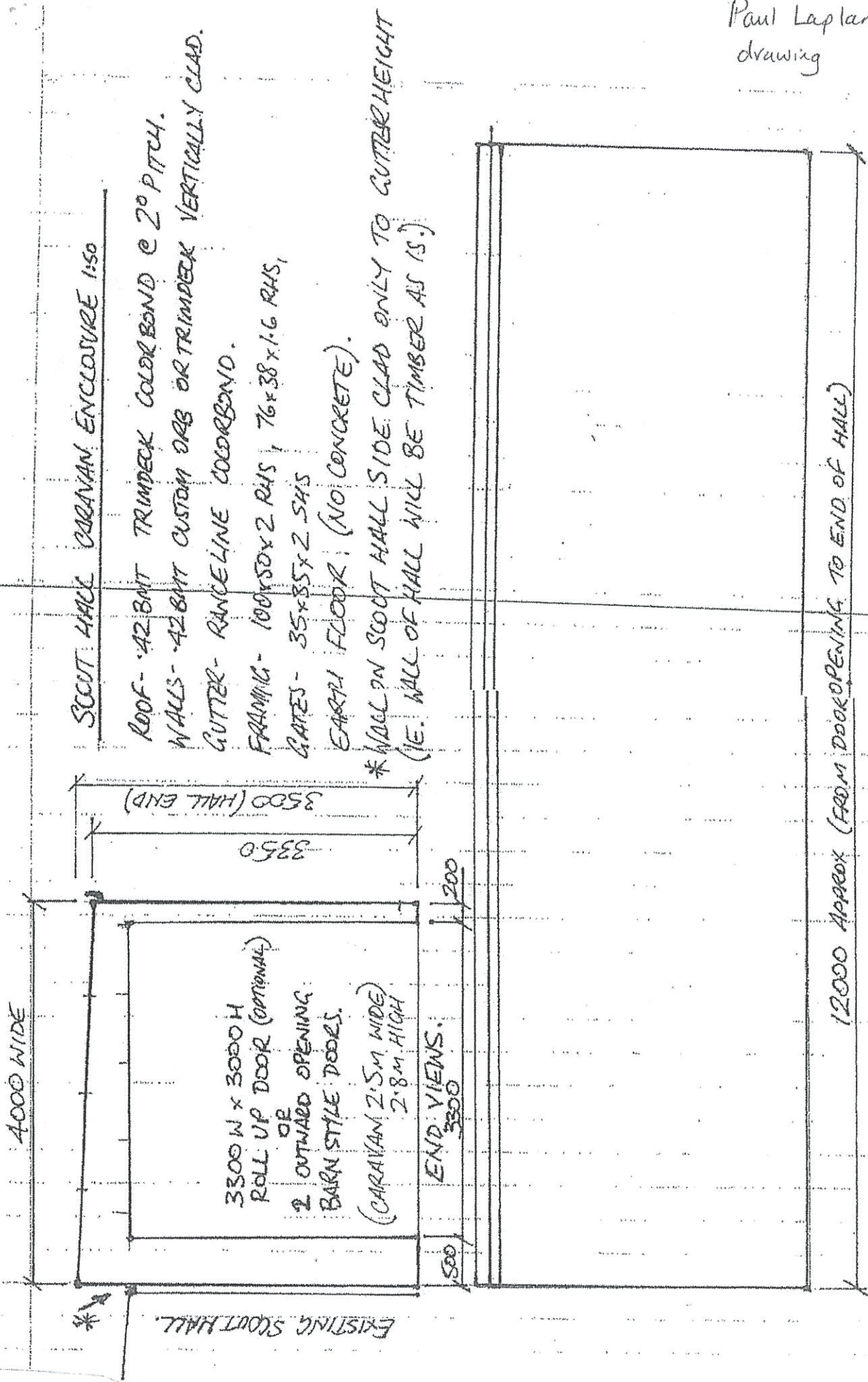
Brazier St Boundary

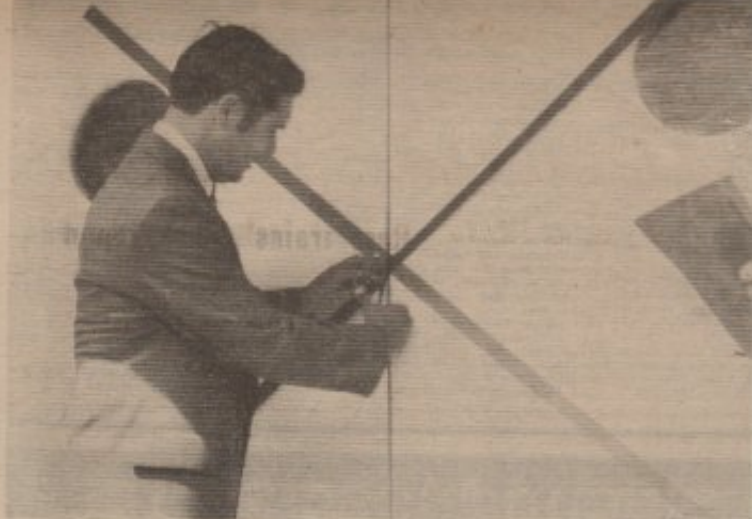

Dream realised after 45 years

SCOUT HALL OPENING

DENMARK: It was a historic and proud moment for all who participated in the opening of the Denmark Scout Hall at the weekend.

As scouting officials, parents, friends and well-wishers saw Albany MLA Wyndham Cook cut the ribbons on the door and later unveil the dedication plaque on the inside wall, it was a mark of sheer achievement after a hard battle which began 45 years ago.

Scout leaders and committee members in those early days (when Charlie Smith donated a block of land) were enthusiastic and had hoped to build a scout hall.

Lack of finance always dampened their enthusiasm and it almost seemed to be a lost cause.

Early in 1968 under the guidance of the Rev Aubrey Bailey and a dedicated committee, the 1st Denmark Scout Troop got under way.

Many civic-minded people helped the scouts, brownies and guides in walkabouts and cake stalls in an effort to boost the funds.

The driving force of Mr Bailey has been clearly seen but not always appreciated.

In his speech Mr Bailey said "I would the whip I know, who walked out of meetings; and I never flipped my lid till I joined the Scout Group."

He said "At times we have been very discouraged but always we have plodded on; looking back, if I had it to do over again I would use a longer whip."

Appreciation was shown to Mr Bailey when Mr Greg Falls, area commissioner from state headquarters, presented him with a scout badge—an award for his dedicated service to the Denmark group during the past five years.

QUEEN'S SCOUT

Mr Falls also presented to Donald Atkinson of Denmark the highest award—the badge of a Queen's Scout. Donald is the first Denmark youth to receive this award.

Vice-chairman Les Brenton presented Mr Bailey with a framed picture of the entire Denmark group of scouts, cubs, brownies and guides, superimposed beneath it a picture of the unfinished scout hall.

Two of the tiniest brownies in the pack presented Mrs Bailey with a floral gift.

A gift presented by Carol Smith and Jennie Scott concluded the presentations.

The speakers and invited

guests were Mr A. Nash, Mr Bailey, Mr Cook, vice-president Mr L. Brenton, Denmark Shire President F. Osborne, Mr Greg Falls, Miss E. Jennings guide commissioner for Albany and Denmark districts, Mrs Wolfe (guide captain) and Mrs Bailey.

More than 100 boys and girls of the Denmark group attended, with six guides from the Albany Group.

To date the total cost of the Scout Hall is \$10,000; \$6,000 was obtained by the

shire council loan to be repaid during 20 years.

The block sold realised \$980, and the boys and girls raised \$3700 in the past three years.

A further \$1000 is needed to finish the building.

Mr Bailey, minister of the Methodist Church, will leave Denmark on January 29 to take a position in Carramah.

To date there is not a minister to replace him.

Mrs Bailey, known to all as a music teacher, will be missed by her pupils.
