WHAT IS CULTURAL PLANNING?

What is culture?

Our Culture, Our View defines culture as:

The intangible elements of a community created by us as members of that community and passed on and developed from generation to generation.

Culture includes:

- Our dreams, values, beliefs, customs and traditions, our history and our heritage and how we communicate these with each other.
- Our knowledge, art, morals, law and other capabilities and habits.
- Our shared experiences, memories and identity.
- How others see us.

Our culture may be expressed through:

- The media; print, broadcast, electronic
- Film
- Tourism
- Heritage buildings, places, museums and keeping places
- Libraries
- Architecture and buildings
- Our engagement with and pursuit of the arts in all of its forms
- Sports, associated events and facilities
- Parks, gardens and landscaping
- Recreation and facilities
- Streets, roads, paths
- The countryside
- Our treatment of and response to our natural environment, including our plant and animal life, waterways, catchments, shorelines and oceans
- The kind of work and business we do, commercial endeavours
- Cultural backgrounds
- Sacred places, and expressions of faith and religion

How can we plan for culture?

Cultural planning is about identifying and celebrating community culture. Cultural planning brings people together to express what is most important now and into the future, for both the intangibles and the physical. Cultural planning is not about needs but is about shared aspirations. In cultural planning, the communication and celebration of values and aspirations are as important as the plan itself.

THE WAY WE MADE THIS PLAN1

Our Culture Our View has been supported by funding from the Shire of Denmark and the Denmark Arts Council (supported by Community Arts Network WA). Cultural mapping and consultation was undertaken through integration of the project with Denmark Arts program, interviews, survey, focus groups, culture café and stakeholders' forum.

The project was guided by a Working Group, made up of representatives of the Shire of Denmark and Denmark Arts, and a Community Reference Group, made up of 11 people nominated from the general community.

What does Our Culture Our View do?

- Identifies a 20 year cultural vision for the communities of the Shire based on shared values and principles with actions for the next 5 years shared across organizations and Government.
- Identifies and celebrates the cultural assets and identity of the communities of the Shire of Denmark; and
- Provides the framework for the development of cultural initiatives.

How do we make it work?

- Our Culture Our View captures diverse views and voices from across the communities of the Shire of Denmark, all of which reside within the plan as opportunities for the future.
- The Actions are those opportunities where there are community and/or government bodies who have stepped forward to pursue them.
- Our Culture Our View will be overseen by the Our Culture Our View Committee, an Advisory Committee of the Shire made up of a broad section of community leaders and the Shire. The Committee will monitor implementation of the Plan, make adjustments as necessary and provide a public progress report once a year.
- Our Culture Our View is the product of a described process undertaken in a specific moment in time. Its strength will be in its engagement with the community and its ongoing review and renewal.

CULTURAL VISION FOR THE YEAR 2030

Uniqueness and diversity across the Shire of Denmark are expressed through its natural beauty, the diversity of its communities and through the engagement of its citizens with community life. We pursue a balance in the tension between human growth and development, and the preservation and vitality of our natural environment. Denmark's creative life provide an ongoing communication between past, present and future, build bridges across sectors and experiences, and reflect, challenge, inform and celebrate community vision.

Our built places compliment our natural landscapes, with hubs of development and community bounded by natural environments and linked by walking, cycling and riding pathways. Our built environments are places where art is seen and equal consideration is given to aesthetic impacts, the impacts on the natural environment and the achievement of cultural, economic and social diversity.

Accessible and environmentally sensitive public transport links key centres across the Shire and Albany. The East River Bridge is an important secondary access point in and out of the Shire.

Our community facilities are well managed and maintained. All members of the community are able to access the Denmark Aquatic Centre, with a strong flow of users from outside of the Shire. The Denmark Cultural Centre is at the heart of the Denmark Cultural Precinct, providing professional performance and exhibition space and studios, co-located with other creative and community organisations and services. The Cultural Precinct is linked by walkways and cycle paths to the Tha House Youth Precinct.

New technologies provide virtual bridges across the Shire and to the world, creating information and ideas pathways for business and community.

The Shire's industry and commercial sectors are focussed on quality and innovation. Denmark is a hub of excellence for niche and boutique industries, creative industries and the arts and environmental enterprises. Cultural tourism, sustainable agriculture, viticulture and hospitality sectors are of international standard.

There are diverse and thriving community groups across the Shire. The community is actively engaged in decision-making, coming together for community discussion and debate. Diversity is a key part of community vigour. Our leaders, artists, innovators, teachers, mentors, and volunteers are supported and valued.

The communities of the Shire are inclusive, with strong programs and services supporting people with disability or at disadvantage, or experiencing depression, addiction or violence.

Young people have access to places that respect their privacy but also provide for their safety and wellbeing. Learning about our local environment and heritage is included in formal schooling. There are links across business, community and creative sectors encouraging skills building and engagement. Young people contribute to the shaping of their own opportunities and growth.

Learning, formal and informal, is a hallmark of our culture; about the past and present Noongar culture, about our environment, our heritage and about other cultures and experiences. The Denmark Arts College provides summer programs focussed on our visitors and winter programs focussed on residents. In partnership with community organisations, schools and Government Agencies, Denmark is a centre for wellbeing and sustainability research and development.

GOVERNANCE

OUR CULTURE OUR VIEW COMMITTEE

Our Culture Our View is vested in the Our Culture Our View Committee, and advisory committee of the Shire. The Committee is made up of a broad range of community representatives.

Composition:

- Community leaders noted for their integrity, independence, and ability to respond to and champion whole of community aspirations.
- Across-sector engagement, not representative of individual groups or enterprises, but people with links across a number of community groups or enterprises.
- Champions ability and willingness to stimulate debate and engagement with *Our Culture Our View*.
- Sensitivity to and ability to provide guidance on inclusion of all sectors of the communities of the Shire of Denmark.

Role:

- To champion *Our Culture Our View* and community engagement.
- To advise the TeamS on opportunities.
- To monitor implementation of *Our Culture Our View*, including making amendments in response to changes in circumstances and opportunities to ensure its integrity and relevance.
- To advise on controversial issues and to assist where relevant in conciliation processes.
- To report to the community once a year on *Our Culture Our View*.










Ensure that the plan properly sets the context for how the actions have been identified within the context of the broad range of ideas put forward. Concerns that the plan appears too arts focussed. The meeting acknowledged the process by which actions identified by having organisations committing to pursuing them. The meeting also acknowledged the very strong commitment of Denmark arts and the arts community to the cultural planning process – and there are elements of the plan that may be reflective of that. There were concerns that other sectors had not been sufficiently approached. Carol and Dawn confirmed with the meeting the efforts made. In order to affect difference, WG and RG members were invited to pursue other groups themselves. Ultimately, the plan is to be structured so it is clear that the door is open to new initiatives.

Strategies

Rename as Ingredients for Success – and meeting identified number of actions which may in fact apply across all initiatives, and therefore be identified as Ingredients for Success: Such as Noongar inclusion, greater links between arts and business sectors, importance of marketing and promotion.

Actions

The meeting agreed that the number of actions likely to exceed the capacity of organisations to pursue and confirmed the value in considering further each of them.

Each workshop participant rated each of the actions with regard to capacity of the community to progress and the value of the benefit to be delivered.

After individual ratings, the group then considered the actions again as a whole, and the following actions were agreed as the most likely to be acted upon whilst delivering important benefits and advancement of the vision:

- 1. New ways to share stories across generations and cultures.
- 2. Better information between and about our community organisations including up to date and accurate register of community organisations, volunteers register and community calendar.
- 3. Old hospital as accommodation for community groups.
- 4. Establishment of a Denmark Arts or Cultural Centre supporting all artforms including performing arts, visual and fine arts and craft.
- 5. More public art sculptures, in the design of new buildings, in public lighting, seating, signage and other public facilities.
- 6. More arts for young people.
- 7. Development of Town Centre Town Square.
- 8. New community officer for future, vision, community development, collaboration.
- 9. Birthing in Denmark support for birthing in Denmark with choices about the way our babies are born, including potential for a Denmark Birth Day.
- 10. Provision of affordable, sustainable group housing.

Governance

In order to maximise the long-term integration of the cultural plan into community planning, the meeting agreed that the oversight committee should be an advisory committee of the Shire. Gregg advised that February (when Shire requires budget submissions) and September (budget announcements) would be good times for the committee to meet.

Actions

Carol to provide revised plan in one week's time for comment.

Comments to be provided prior to 13 October – final draft for submission to Shire and DAC 15 October 2009.

October 2009

Submission of final draft plan for comment.

November 2009

Submission of final plan to Shire and Denmark Arts.

IMPLEMENTATION

The key to the success of the plan is the inclusion of actions to which community organisations or other groups or agencies have committed to pursuing.

All other ideas arising from the consultation are retained in the plan as opportunities that can be actioned as the community comes forward to pursue them.

Action plans will be developed by each team responsible. Teams will report to the Our Culture Our View Advisory Committee twice a year.

Implementation of the plan as a whole will be monitored and evaluation by the Our Culture Our View Advisory Committee. It is envisaged that the Committee made up of a broad section of community leaders, will meet at least twice a year to monitor implementation, make adjustments as necessary and publish a progress report to the community once per year.

COMMUNITY SNAPSHOT

²The Shire of Denmark has a population of just over 5,000 and is located on the south coast of Western Australia approximately 50 kms west of Albany and 400 kms south of Perth. The Shire has an area of 1843 sq kms extending 70 kms in an east-west direction and 30 kms north-south.

Denmark's human history begins with its ancient and living Noongar culture. Its non-Indigenous history is characterised by waves of settlement, beginning with the timber industry, followed by group settlers and soldier settlers and agriculture. The "hippies", artists and people seeking alternative lifestyles began arriving in the 70s. As a result, Denmark has a great diversity of population, making for a huge variety of interests/occupations. With tourism being a major industry, many people have developed lifestyles combined with various cottage industries to cater for tourists. The main local industries include – tourism, viticulture, horticulture, beef/dairy/sheep/pig/tree farming, cottage industries and agriculture. Denmark was awarded the title of "Australia's Tidiest Town" in 1998.

The Shire of Denmark website lists over 90 community, arts and sporting organisations.

Community cultural assets include The Six Seasons by Andre Steyl, Jo Williams and Donny #, held by the Shire of Denmark and the Cork Mural at the Civic Centre by a range of community artists. There are community concerns that both works are held for the community but without any policy regarding maintenance, copyright or moral rights.

Our facilities

In addition to its much loved natural and outdoor spaces, the Shire has a range of well-used facilities, marked by a large degree of sharing across community groups and functions.

A new purpose built facility adjacent to the Scout Hall and Recreation Ground. Programming including Break Dance, Cooking, Pool, Guitar Hero, Silk Screening and Design, Didge, Drumming and Guitar, Visual Arts including Spray Art, Health and Lifestyle, Information Technology, Study and Work Groups.

The Centre has a sprung floor.

Denmark Civic Centre

With a sprung floor and removable seating, the Civic Centre in the Library and Telecentre precinct in the centre of Denmark Town, is a focus for town meetings and performances. There are difficulties in staging performances in a Centre not designed specifically for that purpose, including sight lines, staging and backstage technical capacity.

The Cork Mural at the rear wall of the main auditorium, one of Denmark's early community arts projects, is lost to view behind the seating.

Centre for Sustainable Living

Housed in the old Agricultural College, CSL has multiple indoor and outdoor space for workshops, exhibitions, and conferences and has its own facilities for accommodation.

Wineries and galleries, restaurants and hotels – across the Shire are all important live venues and exhibition spaces.

LIBRARIAN OF BASRA (AUSPICED PROJECT)

By Denmark's Hypertheatre. A colourful young people's theatre piece shimmering with middle eastern inspired music, sensuous contemporary dance, and compelling storytelling. The play is based on US children's author Jeannette Winter's book *The Librarian of Basra*, and is a sensitive portrayal of a librarian's heroic struggle to save the vast collection of books in Basra Central Library from destruction during the 2003 invasion of Iraq. The production had already performed to over 800 school children at Albany Library during Children's Book Week in August 2007, at the Fairbridge Festival as family entertainment (April 2008), had sell-out performances at the Denmark Civic Centre, as well as Denmark and Albany High School performances (August 2008), and was the premier event for Children's Book Week at the Northern Territory Library in Darwin (August 2008). A tour of Darwin followed, with five performances and workshops held at various schools throughout the suburbs of Darwin to more than 1000 children and young people, all incredibly well received. With ongoing support from Denmark the *Librarian of Basra* toured WA libraries in the second half of 2009.

VISUAL ARTS EXHIBITION SPACE AT DENMARK VISITOR CENTRE

Unfortunately financial pressures on the Denmark Visitor Centre mean that it must charge commercial rates for the space making it unsuitable as a community arts facility. The Visual Arts Sub-committee will remain active co-ordinating a range of activities for local visual artists and the community.

DYSCORD AND THE GREAT SOUTHERN EXPERIENCE

Metal and punk band Dyscord headed down to Denmark to rock the Civic Centre stage with Denmark's very own Hells of Iron and Twisted Logik. FREE workshops on band management, stage presence and metal vocals were run as well as a session on recording a CD facilitated by Rob from Goanna Studios. These workshops gave more depth to the gig and provided a great chance to meet the band. This event promoted young people and young artists throughout the Great Southern and provided them with skills that they could only access by bringing these professional artists into our community. Parents and community members supported the gig by volunteering. A bus from Albany was provided. Promotion for the gig also featured on Denmark Arts newly created MySpace page www.myspace.com/denmarkarts

Two local young people co-ordinated the whole event gaining skills in project management, grant applications, marketing and financial management.

COLIN OFFORD IN CONCERT

Colin Offord, singer, composer, multi-instrumentalist and inventor of original instruments. Colin accompanies his voice with the most noted of his many instruments, the "Great Island Mouthbow", a complex string instrument that can be bowed, plucked and played percussively. Colin is a nationally recognised musician who came to Denmark after a tour of the Kimberley before flying back to Queensland. The Anglican Church's accoustic qualities allowed his music to be presented in the best possible way. Two workshops with Colin were also offered: Composing through Improvisation and The Endless Voice.

APERITIF (PART OF GREAT SOUTHERN ART TRAIL)

All Denmark residents and visitors were invited to partake in "Aperitif", an exhibition showcasing Denmark's vibrant art community. Denmark artists exhibited in over 20 venues as part of ArtsouthWA's Great Southern Art Trail. Denmark artists have a strong presence on the Trail, putting Denmark on the map as an art enclave. "Aperitif" provided a sample of the exquisite work of Denmark artists participating in this year's Trail.

DECEMBER JANUARY EASTER SATURDAY, BERRIDGE PARK, DENMARK MARKETS

The Denmark Markets create a village of colour and festivity with a bustling blend of music, art and food. Happening four times a year between December and Easter, the markets aim to promote the work of local artisans and craftspeople alongside a full program of performing arts. Children and young people were the focus of the December Market. Danica Logan from Rainbow Ocean provided a welcoming space for children to paint and sculpt, while The Fairy Queen wove her magic with special story times. A 'Not So Big' Buskers site was in action all day for young people to show off their skills from juggling to playing ukulele. Grown ups also a chance to busk at the 'Big' Buskers site, featuring poetry, music and Tai Chi demonstrations. Young people hit the main stage with the Denmark Fiddlers kick-starting the BIG DANCE EVENT, followed by a line-up of much loved dance bands including Mandala, Xave Brown Band and The Fungals with Dave Rastrick. The BIG DANCE EVENT celebrated the talents of Denmark percussionist Matt Lyons before his departure for the less temperate shores of Scotland.

BRAVE NEW WORKS #16 – The Denmark Festival of the Arts 2009

Brave New Works is Denmark's premier community arts festival held every Easter. The aim of the festival is to encourage the people of Denmark to explore and experience all art forms in new and innovative ways around a chosen theme. This is done by supporting local artists to engage their community in arts focused projects and encouraging all participants to bravely go where they've not been before. The theme for Brave New Works#16 (BNW#16) was "Sharing Stories". The theme was chosen to encourage people to explore personal or shared stories within historical or contemporary contexts. Brave New Works#16 employed a number of local and imported artists to guide the broader community through the development and production of high quality visual and performance arts. BNW#16 empowered and offered skill exchange to local participants by choosing a person from each project to coordinate their project, done in consultation with the Brave New Works Coordinator and sub-committee.

Festival's features for 2009 included:

- Noongar Welcome Ceremony: The Noongars of Koorabup welcome to country. Joey Williams, in collaboration with other Noongar performers, created a ceremony mixing traditional and contemporary styles performed by firelight on the banks of the Koorabup River on the opening night of the Festival. The performers continued to have a presence throughout the Festival at the markets and at the performance pavement.
- Living Books: This initiative was started in 2000 by a Danish NGO and has spread across Europe and now to Denmark Australia. It is a library resource which turns people into books, catalogues them to be offered as a community resource. This is collaboration between the Denmark Library, Denmark Arts and the Shire and run by a committee of local people. Brave New Works will launch the Living Books, Denmark.
- Unravelling: Denmark Stories: A multi-media production developed through a series of workshops with the local community. Writing and Performance workshops were offered to develop personal stories which were the spring board for sound and visual responses. Local musicians had the opportunity to work with Perth based New and Experimental musician Jonathan Mustard in creating soundscapes while photographer Michael Hemmings worked with a visual artist to create the video-scape. The performance was a patchwork of personal stories,

memorable moments and poetic reflections expressed in words, music and video imagery – all woven together into our shared vision of a larger unifying story: one that reflects the journey from childhood into womanhood, and of unravelling from pain and isolation into transformation and acceptance.

- Word Nests: From the women of Unravelling, located around the town, for looking for and digesting.
- Site Specific Art Project: Tasmanian based Site Specific artist Liz Woods was invited to mentor local artists for three weeks resulting in the installation of artwork at the CSL, Springdale and eastern riverbank near Boatshed, with workshops and artist talks.
- Artistories: Professional Albany artist Trish Wares was invited to deliver workshops on working with visual diaries to a diverse range of emerging artists, resulting in an exhibition by 10 Denmark artists of their visual diaries based on "Sharing Stories". The exhibition displayed diaries by a range of the community's artists including young and emerging artists as well as established professional, painters, sculptors, printmakers and graphic artist, who have worked on the books for three months. The Exhibition featureed a digital projection of images form the diaries.
- East of Us: A collaboration between 11 artists from Denmark and members of the Ravensthorpe community. The artists spent a week in late March exploring cultural ties and sharing stories. Music, photography, sculpture, painting, print making and the written word were all used to explore what makes this area to our east unique.
- La Petite Sirene: Local choreographer Nari Lees, running two movement and self expression workshops with students at the primary school. The students were choreographed into a representation of the story of the Little Mermaid. An exciting mix between performance installation and traditional dance performed around the town over the weekend.
- **Performance Pavement**: On the main intersection in the centre of Denmark there are four expansive curbs. During the weekend each of these curbs had performances installed on them. It was programmed but open to any one willing to try their hand at something.
- **Festival Club**: Three young adults were invited to help coordinate this project. The club ran over the weekend with an open floor to perform, play music, dance, recite etc. Food and drinks were served in an informal setting.
- Outdoor market: over 100 stalls of art and craft and food on Easter Saturday with a program of performances presented free to the public during the Market Day at Berridge Park including the Kids Village.
- Brave New Banners: The streets and venues of BNW #16 decorated with banners from Denmark community groups and artists sharing their stories with colour and imagination.
- **MoveMENt**: A group of men working with local dancers Annette Carmichael and Nari Lees and performer Paul Doquile over 8 months to develop skills and techniques resulting in dance works inspired by the inherent physicality of nine Denmark men, wherein dance is uncovered in a collective story.
- Funk 'n' Junk: A community based project where young people were invited to explore their stories through sculpture and painting. The project provided young people with creative, artistic and social activities. Local artists Todd Jackson and Kye McAllister supported participants in the use of recycled materials, resulting in an exhibition.
- The BNW BIG Show: A variety show and a strong tradition in Brave New Works. On the closing night, the Festival offers the Civic Centre stage complete with sound & lighting, and a Stage Manager, to anyone or group in the community brave enough to expose their hidden talents. An open invitation is sent out to the community inviting them to produce a small piece in response to the theme of Sharing Stories. This is a fun night when the community gets together on equal terms.

PERTH INTERNATIONAL ARTS FESTIVAL DIRECTIONS IN GROOVE

Directions In Groove (DIG), best remembered as Sydney's flagbearer during the acid jazz craze that flourished in the '90s. Part of the 2009 Perth International Arts Festival in Perth, Albany and Denmark. A local Denmark band programmed as a support act to DIG. This will offer the benefit of increased profile for the Denmark band and an opportunity for them to connect with these exceptional musicians. Setting up the Denmark Civic Centre as a hip jazz bar with couches and cocktail tables, creating a great vibe for the coolest night out this summer!

DENMARK FESTIVAL OF VOICE BUSINESS PLANNING

To develop plans for the future that will accommodate the rapidly growing number of voice enthusiasts keen to participate in this popular festival. In 2008 the Festival sold out a month in advance and many local residents were unable to purchase tickets. The Festival's box office is seriously limited by issues of venue size and accommodation availability in Denmark. It has become urgent that an assessment of the Festival and its potential for growth occur. We are keen to develop a model that equally supports the needs of local residents while attracting an increased number of visitors to the region. A Business Plan for the event will help address existing challenges and lay down a sustainable path forward. The management of the Festival is largely performed by a small group of dedicated volunteers and their ability to sustain this effort is diminishing. A new management structure for the Festival also needs to be considered.

DVTV

An on going project administered by Denmark Arts to promote and appreciate the art of filmmaking, provide a forum for independent filmmakers and film festivals through screenings for members and the public. dvtv has video cameras and facilities to document community events and make movies through community arts projects or by arrangement. Copies from most video formats can be digitised and converted to DVD, VHS or back onto the camera's tape. Titles, soundtracks and special effects can be added with dvtv's Final Cut Pro software and Mac computers. dvtv has successfully attracted funding to purchase a dvd burner and printer in order to make multiple copies of video footage for community groups such as Denmark Village Theatre and Serendipity Dance as well as for Denmark Arts projects.

V'VACI EARLY MUSIC GROUP

Denmark Arts provides support to this music group in its presentation of concerts promoting classical music. On Friday 12 September 2008 the concert, Remarkable Recorder featured the skill of guest artist Ruth Wilkinson at the Old Butter Factory playing music from the 14th to the 21st century. Ruth is in demand as a tutor in Early Music all over Australia and is in Denmark as tutor to the V'vaci Early Music Group. V'vaci will present a range of concerts throughout the year.

TOURING PERFORMANCES

Denmark Arts selects a program of professional touring performances as they become available through Country Arts and associations with UWA and directly with artists.

GONDWANA COMMUNITY ARTS PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

Work commenced on the development of a new youth arts initiative Gondwana Link Arts Project. Planned for the second half of 2009 the project aims to engage schools across the Gondwana Link (www.gondwanalink.org), from Denmark to Esperance in carrying out rich learning tasks, inspired through the arts, in order to raise awareness about what's special in their 'own backyard'. This project has a direct partnership with Albany's "Gondwana Link" which is: "a landscape scale vision involving individuals and local, regional and national groups. We are working together to achieve reconnected country across south-western Australia in which entire ecosystems, and the fundamental ecological processes that underpin them, are restored and maintained." In 2009 the project was tested through a pilot arts project with three schools. The aim is to increase the scope and possibilities of the project over the next few years in partnership with the Gondwana Link offices and the Denmark Centre for Sustainable Living.

I was born in Denmark and have lived here but for a few years and I feel our culture stems from the attitude, the strength of character, that open friendliness of the people who live and love Denmark. The drive to preserve the natural environment and improve within those boundaries goes back to the free settlers and the groupies, with their courage, determination and hard work, their wonderful picnics, football matches, dances and mateship. I see this is the building block of Denmark's culture.

What do I love about Denmark? This is very hard to define I love that dark, serene river on a clear day when the reflections of the karri trees go deep, deep. When I was kid and even when I was first married, everyone knew everyone. It was a rare thing to see a stranger in town. Now I could go to town and not see anyone I know. I met this lady the other day and I asked her did she live in Denmark and she said, 'I have been here for 17 years': 17 years, and I'd never seen her, I could hardly believe it.

But I loved those people of my childhood, the shop keepers, the farmers, the mill workers, they were such characters, sort of wild and colourful who did crazy things for fun yet helped their neighbours at the drop of a hat. And the dances: every Saturday night there was a dance somewhere, satin dresses, taffeta and tulle dresses in bright colours. My Mum played the piano for the Scotsdale hall dances and I would not get under the seats to go to sleep until the 12 dancing princesses came (they were the young teenage girls of the day. They would come into the hall in a group in their beautiful long gowns ... God... it was so exciting, like a fairy story)

How to improve Denmark? Environmentally, Do nothing ... leave it as it is ... In town I would like to see that market place in the centre of town Something like what is on the cut off corner in Peel Place Albany, but bigger.... and I would like to see a mini tree top walk going off the end of Strickland Street, high in the karri trees, to the youth centre and rec centre but they are just my dreams for the town. And more trees planted in the actual town.

Please note Denmark is a **town**, not a village ... village is an English word, it is not Australian Let's be true to Australia ... no Scotsdale Brook, it is Scotsdale CREEK, don't change the names of roads when they have been called a certain name for years (the Powleys came to DNK in 1907, they walked out to their block through the bush, Mum, Dad and 3 little kids) and later made a road to their farm using axes and a horse. It was called Powley Road. Then about 10 years ago it was changed to Jackson road, named after an English family that had been here about 5 years and have now left and I could name other roads that have changed) Yes, use the pioneers names for the roads, parks etc I would like to see a mural, depicting the lives of the settlers, painted in sepia (with a hint of green and a splash of blue) on one of the towns blank walls (Reeves Butchers or the Surf Shop) I would like to see a Group House (not called a settlers cottage ... we all lived in group houses) erected perhaps in the old hospital grounds with all the stark facts of life that these people had to cope with, but plant the pink dog roses around the door... everyone had them.

I love the trees, especially the Karris, the weather, the stories of the first settlers, the people of that era and the enthusiasm of the new settlers. But I guess the best part for me is that Denmark is my home, my roots are here I like to go into the untouched forest and just sit and let the silence flow around me ... it's very good therapy.

As I said, how to assist improvement ... the less we do the better ... be careful all you new enthusiastics ... progress is not always the answer ...sometimes doing nothing is a better solution. Didn't you come to DNK because you loved it as it is ... well?

How to appreciate the pioneersMy sister recently said a film should be made of the time of our childhood years before it is too late and we are not around to advice. I thought she was a bit nuts at the time but on thinking about it, yes, if it was possible it would be great ... you want colour in a community ... well there was certainly colour then. The rest I wrote last night about my ideas for town

Tidy Towns originally was formed to help keep the town tidy, paint the street furniture, the curbing in the streets, pick up, clean up, but now it is all about the environment and what is DNK doing about it. I feel DNK has reached the peak of the subjects needed in the criteria and we need to go back to cleaning up the district and seeing that what we have is kept in good order... paths, trails, gardens, parks, those sorts of things. I personally don't think the Tidy Towns awards are of much value to DNK ... we are on the map now and we won't go away.

Community Survey - Deadline extended to 28 February 2009

More than 100 responses to the Our Community My View Survey have been received to date: 2/3 of responses have come from women, 40% from people over 50 and the majority from people aged 30 and 49.

The celebration of inspiration, creativity and innovation, respect for and the development of the capacity of people and communities, sustainability and respect for the natural environment are leading as core values.

There is consistent acknowledgement of the diversity and need to maintain the recreational, leisure and sporting activities available and pursued by the community, including the desire for a local indoor pool.

There is strong focus on the importance of Denmark's natural beauty and the need to balance the built environment with the preservation of our natural environment, respect for and protection of sacred places and our local settlement and Noongar heritage.

There is a solid call for more prominent acknowledgement of diversity of artistic expression and practice within the Shire. This is articulated through desire to see a Community Cultural Centre and Public exhibition space to accommodate visual and performing arts, music and cultural activities in the Town of Denmark

Our business community is considered strong, and is encouraged to use creative engagement across community. There are consistent calls for increased training opportunities for small business development. The key action identified for community development is the establishment of a coordinated central community database and network strengthening the links between community groups and businesses. There is also repeated mention of examining the feasibility of a community bus service to support access to community events and facilitate economic ties and opportunities with Albany.

There are strong sentiments for a stronger and vigilant Denmark in accommodating the challenges of depression and addiction.
