#### PROTECTION OF ENVIRONMENTAL VALUES POLICY

#### **Objective**

The Protection of Environmental Values Policy aims to assist Supervising Officers in ensuring the protection of natural and cultural values from operational activities that may have the potential to significantly disturb or compromise existing environmental or heritage values and is to be applied to all operational disturbance activities occurring on Council managed lands.

#### **Background**

The Policy and corresponding Environmental Impact Form and Checklist has been developed to:

- Provide the means by which one of Council's five primary goals (Environmental Management) and existing Environmental Policy can be achieved
- Ensure that all legislative requirements pertaining to environmental and heritage values are met when conducting operations on Shire managed lands
- Ensure continued protection of environmental and heritage values that exist on Shire tenure
- Provide a consistent standard of practical application for environmental and heritage checks across Shire operations
- Simplification of consideration of all environmental and heritage issues when conducting Shire operations
- Improve consultation and communication across directorates as to integrated Shire operations
- Raise awareness and understanding across Shire directorates of environmental and heritage values that exist within Shire Reserves

### **Guiding Statement**

The Protection of Environmental Values Policy is commensurate with one of five primary goals of Council: "Environmental Management – To help conserve the natural environment of Denmark and promote its responsible use." The Policy is also in keeping with Council's existing Environmental Policy (P100503) which states that "Council supports the ethos of ecological sustainability. It will endeavour in all its activities to apply the principles associated with conserving natural resources, integrate environmental accounting procedures into its management decisions...". The Protection of Environmental Values Policy and corresponding Environmental Impact Checklist is the means by which environmental management, the application of environmental principles and environmental accounting can be achieved across Council operations.

#### **Procedure**

All operational disturbance activities that have the potential to have a significantly adverse impact upon existing known environmental and heritage values that are to be carried out on Shire managed lands are to complete the Environmental Impact Form and associated Checklist to ensure that existing environmental and heritage values are not compromised by operational works.

Application of the environmental form and checklist is to be undertaken by the Supervising Officer with assistance from Shire Natural Resource Management staff where required. The Supervising Officer undertaking the works is responsible for ensuring that both Section A Project Details, and Section B Environmental Impact Checklist is completed with outstanding issues identified with

corresponding recommendations . Section C will then be completed by the relevant Director to authorise the project prior to commencement of works. The Shire GIS system has information and datasets that correspond to each environmental and heritage value to assist with completing the checklist.

#### **Policy Review**

Protection of Environmental Policy Version 2

The Directorate of Planning and Sustainability is the responsible directorate for the development of the Protection of Environmental Values Policy, however whole of Council operations will be required to ensure adherence to the Policy and associated protocol. It is also intended for application on all operations being undertaken on Council managed lands by external parties.

The Policy will be put to Council for adoption on September 2010.

Policy is due for review after a period of 3-5 years.
