# 2011 SHIRE OF DENMARK COMMUNITY NEEDS AND CUSTOMER SATISFACTION SURVEY

# Introduction

This report provides a summary of a Customer Satisfaction and Community Needs Survey conducted in January 2011 by the Shire of Denmark.

The Report both summarises and provides analysis and comment on the information received from 1000 randomly selected electors, comprising a representation of both local and absent landholders from their respective locations within the Shire.

The return rate of 47.4% for the survey is considered to be an excellent response from a statistical perspective and the information that has been derived from the sample will be extremely useful in guiding strategic and operational priorities of the Council and gauging opinion on many relevant issues.

A copy of the Survey Results, including comments received, is attached to this report for additional information and to support the recommendations contained within this Report.

# **Project Objectives**

The overall objectives of this survey were:

- To provide a clear understanding of the needs of the electors of the Shire of Denmark in relation to current and future service provision;
- To ascertain the electors level of satisfaction with the current services and facilities provided;
- To ascertain the aspirations and needs of the Shire of Denmark's electorsObtain information to guide future strategic decision making and budget priorities.

# Background

At the 26 August 2008 Ordinary Meeting of Council, a Policy was adopted to reintroduce the biennial Community Needs and Customer Satisfaction Survey. The survey is to be conducted every second year by Shire staff to minimise the cost to ratepayers. A survey was conducted in December 2008 which recorded an excellent response rate of 36.8%.

# **Validity of Survey Results**

The formula used to assess the Statistical Validity was taken from the "Survey System" website. The returned numbers of surveys were entered into the sample size calculator to calculate the Confidence Interval. Once this figure was ascertained the Confidence Interval figure was entered against the entire population of ratepayers. With the calculations and figures entered into the Sample Size Calculator the Confidence Level was then determined at 95%.

# Survey Methodology

The survey process involved several stages. Staff and Councillors revised several versions of the initial draft in the planning stages of the process, to ensure the questions reflected the objectives of the project.

At the January 2011 Ordinary Meeting of Council, it was agreed that a comprehensive mail out to 1000 electors, selected at random via the Shire of Denmark's Consolidated Electoral Roll, was an efficient and comprehensive method of survey.

Staff conferred with Councillors regarding the questionnaire and it was piloted with a number of randomly selected staff members, independent of the preparation of the document, to verify its clarity, purpose and efficacy. The questionnaire was adopted by Council, individually numbered and subsequently sent with a reply paid envelope to all selected ratepayers in the Shire of Denmark on the 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2011.

Each survey was individually numbered to alleviate copies being reproduced and not detected. Once the questionnaires were returned, staff entered the figures and collated all of the data. All returned survey numbers were entered onto a spreadsheet to ensure there were no duplicated copies sent. All surveys handed over the counter were scrutinised to ensure that no duplicated copies were handed in.

In accordance with this Resolution, staff have prepared this Report to assist Council and the community to interpret the information received and use the results for their intended purpose.

# Survey Responses

Council is extremely pleased with the response of 47.9% (representing 479 respondents) which allows Council to have a high degree of confidence that the results received reflect the opinion of property owners to the questions asked in the Survey.

Respondents were asked to specify what age group they were. The following table indicates the percentage of property owners per age group that responded to the questionnaire:

Where relevant, the results of the Survey will be distributed to Committee's of Council for comment and use in their discussions. The survey results will also be made freely available on the Shire website for interested persons to access at their convenience.

These results will continue to allow Council to determine benchmarks by which future service delivery can be measured and allow for strategies to be adopted on an ongoing basis to implement a process for continuous improvement across all levels of the organisation.

Council would like to acknowledge those unidentified persons who responded to the Survey and thank them for their effort in completing the extensive and detailed questionnaire.

# **Officer Comments**

The responses received indicate a high level of agreement or support for the;

- Lifestyle Village at the Denmark Country Club.
- McIntosh Rd Industrial Park.

Moderate agreement or support for;

- Beveridge Rd Subdivision.
- Golf Course Residential Development.

Of the above projects, all but the McIntosh Road Industrial Park development, could be considred very much in their infancy and require significant research, analysis and resource allocations to progress further. It would be beneficial to further consult with electors once a detailed proposal is available for comment (assuming the projects reach this stage of development). The McIntosh Road Industrial Park has already been considered by Council, with a business plan for the proposal currently being developed prior to being further considered.

The general support for all four initiatives should give confidence to Council that such projects are generally in keeping with the wishes of the community and allow for them to be further investigated if Council so determines.

It may be appropriate to allocate funding in future budgets to allow for further research and analysis of these projects.

# **Officer Comments**

The responses received indicate a high level of disagreement or lack of support for either demolition of the Infant Health Clinic Building or demolition/relocation of the Cottage Crafts building. The answers to the retention of these facilities at their present location supports these results, although it is noted that there is minority support for the relocation/demolition proposals.

This issue has generated significant community interest in previous months, with a petition received in support of retaining these facilities at the present locations and the subject of various questions and deputations at Council Meetings. Since these questions were posed in the Survey Council has further considered these matters, having regard for the results of the Survey, at the April 2011 Ordinary Meetings and subsequently resolved as follows;

## COUNCIL RESOLUTION & OFFICER RECOMMENDATION

ITEM 8.5.2

That with respect to Reserve 26026 and the Petition received from the Denmark Cottage Crafts Inc, Council;

- 1. Receive the Petition of 735 signatures and note the comments;
- Note that the Petition and results of the 2011 Community Needs & Customer Satisfaction Survey will be taken into consideration should Council consider any future alternate use(s) of Reserve 26026;
- 3. Note that the Lease between Council and the Denmark Cottage Crafts Inc. for a portion of the Reserve 26026 is current until the 1 January 2013, at which time Council will determine its renewal;
- 4. Revisit options with respect to the former Infant Health Clinic building should Denmark Arts Inc. vacate the building;
- 5. Authorise the CEO to enter into discussions with Denmark Cottage Crafts Inc., Denmark Arts Inc. and the Denmark RSL Inc. regarding the concept of a community Art Park which incorporates Reserves 26026 & 23631 and better integrates with the streetscape; and
- 6. Confirm that it has no intention to remove the historic Plane Tree.

The responses to the above questions indicate a high level of support for tourism within the Shire as long as such development is in keeping with the local character and is sustainable.

There is little question that the local economy is heavily dependent on tourism and it is important that the local community recognises this importance.

### **Officer Comments**

Although 27.60% of respondents disagree with the Minister for Local Government's view that there should be a maximum on nine Councillors, 45.90% support the statement.

These results were used by Council when considering the matter of Councillor Representation at the April 2011 Ordinary Meetings of Council where it was subsequently resolved as follows;

COUNCIL RESOLUTION & CR WAKKA'S NOTICE OF MOTIONITEM 7.1MOVED: CR WAKKASECONDED: CR BARNES

That Council, noting the Minister for Local Government's directive of 5 February 2009 in relation to councillor numbers being voluntarily reduced to between 6 and 9, and now that the Minister is intending to put before Parliament a Bill to force Councils to reduce their numbers to a maximum of 9, resolve to make a report to the Local Government Advisory Board proposing that there be no change to its current 3 Ward structure but that its number of elected representatives be reduced to 9 by reducing one Councillor from each ward, and that Council request that the Board give effect to this decision for the 2011 Shire of Denmark Local Government Elections and only if it can be achieved without a complete 'spill' of Councillors.

# **Officer Comments**

The above results provide for some interesting information in that the local community sees Bush Fire protection as the priority for the Shire of Denmark, in front of more traditional roles such as roads, waste management and recreation services. This supports the significant investment made by Council in fire prevention matters in recent years.

Equally, the relatively low priority given to social issues such as arts, youth and welfare issues (aged, disability services and others) is also of interest as Council has been taking an increasing role in these activities in recent years.

That the survey responses and results be noted by Council and used for further reference when and if these items are considered further by Council.

#### **Officer Comments**

The high level of disagreement to this statement would indicate that electors are concerned about high density subdivision detracting from the character of the townsites. This question was asked in the 2008 Survey with similar responses levels, although there was slightly more support for such development in the 2008 results.

b) Council should encourage commercial activities.

#### **Officer Comments**

This high level of support for the encouragement of commercial activities is in keeping with the results of the 2008 Survey.

What is not clear from the results is just what form this encouragement should take, which could be provided in a number of ways, including;

- Rates discounts or concessions for commercial premises.
- Rates subsidies for start up businesses.
- Provision of commercial and industrial land.
- Employment of an Economic Development Coordinator.
- Greater support for the Denmark Chamber of Commerce.

#### **Officer Recommendation**

That Council convene a Meeting with commercial stakeholders, including the Denmark Chamber of Commerce Inc, to investigate cost effective ways that Council can greater encourage commercial activities within the Shire.

There is a high level of support for the encouragement of agricultural activities, a result in keeping with the same question asked in the 2008 Survey.

Like the previous question, what is not clear from the results is just what form this encouragement should take, which could be provided in a number of ways, including;

- Rates discounts or concessions for agricultural properties.
- Provision of agricultural land in planning schemes and strategies.
- Increased maintenance and construction on rural roads.

That the survey responses and results be noted by Council and further considered in the adoption of the Municipal Budget.

With a similar response to the 2008 Survey, it would be apparent that electors of the Shire do not support heavy industry within the Shire.

# **Officer Comments**

The responses to the two above questions would indicate broad community support for the increase of home based business, subject to the necessary controls to ensure neighbourhood amenity is not disturbed.

#### Officer Recommendation

That strategies to promote increased home business activity be investigated in the Local Planning Strategy and Town Planning Scheme, with consideration given to adequate controls to ensure the amenity of neighbours is not unduly affected.

g) Property security is an issue in the Shire.

### **Officer Comments**

Although property security is becoming of increasing concern to residents in Western Australia, these sentiments are not necessarily shared by the majority of Denmark electors. This is possibly a reflection of the relatively low crime rate in Denmark. The Shire of Denmark has a Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan to address such concerns.

# Officer Recommendation

That Council, with the cooperation of local Police and other stakeholders continue to monitor property security and crime generally within the Shire and review the Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan at an appropriate time to ensure its ongoing effectiveness. h) There is a need for regular public transport.

## **Officer Comments**

The responses to the above three questions indicates a high level of support for improved public transport within the Shire and to the regional centre of Albany.

Despite this support, it is equally evident that electors do not wish to pay for or subsidise this service through their annual rates payment. Without some form of financial support it is the view of staff that any form of public transport would be unviable on a user pays basis.

The responses to these questions are similar to those received in the 2008 Survey.

## Officer Recommendation

That Council elect not to investigate the introduction of a public transport service at this time and that the matter be revisited in the 2012 Community Needs and Customer Satisfaction Survey.

The Shire of Denmark has previously included a Voluntary Environmental Levy on the rates notice, with mixed responses, and the initiative was abandoned in adopting the 2009/10 Municipal Budget. Despite some support for such a levy in the above results, the majority of respondents do not support such a concept.

# **Officer Comments**

Despite a relatively high neutral response to these questions, the majority appear to view the provision of youth services as an essential operation of the Council. These responses would support the significant investment made in youth services in recent years by Council.

The Shire of Denmark has a Youth Centre Advisory Committee which provides advice to Council on youth related issues and there is a separate Youth Advisory Committee, which operates externally to the Shire of Denmark.

Again, despite a strong neutral response, the level of support for a natural earth burial facility within the Shire of Denmark would warrant such an initiative being investigated further by Council.

# **Officer Comments:**

Denmark has a reputation for a strong and vibrant social scene, which is reflected in the support for Council to continue to encourage such activities in the District. This support was also apparent in the 2008 Survey.

Council provides substantial financial assistance to Denmark Arts which plays a major role in providing such activities and in addition offers subsidised hire rates for Council facilities such as the Civic Centre which are used in these pursuits.

Beveridge Road is not the right time to get maximum return for ratepayers.
- In any of the above, I am wary of the huge amount of cash required to carry out these projects. I see a conflict of interest between when is a council a council and simply carries out the mandate with which it is charged and when does it become a business. Also, I do not like the situation that arises when the institution (i.e. the council) that sets and upholds the statutory requirements of the conditions of approval of sub divisions etc, also becomes the developer. Borders could become very grey and shadowy. I think the developing is best left to those who do it all of the time.
- It has to go somewhere.
- It is not just a matter of the Shire being involved in a possible financial loss but more importantly who will benefit. I would like to know how profits, if any, would be distributed. It seems to me that to ask for 'in principle agreement without giving details is bordering on dishonesty.
- I've never heard of the a) and c) proposals. Is this why the hospital wasn't to be located in that area?
- Lifestyle eco villages independent of sporting associations no exclusive developments.
- Minimise council financial committee contribution unless required for other re-zoned purpose.
- No clearing of bush land on Beveridge Road.
- Private enterprise should be the developers of any residential villages of any sort. The industrial park needs to be developed to promote industry in the shire thereby providing employment. Although council may own the land in

Beveridge Rd, I question its ability to become developers of that land. The shire is not a business as such and unless expertise in development is acquired then the land should be sold to a developer to carry this out. Provided it is desirable to have this land developed at all.

- Re the golf course only if this is mutually agreeable with the Country Club.
- Residential subdivisions, there are already several that are currently being developed close to town. With more residential development comes the need for footpaths, roads etc. We are very close to town & have no footpaths or mail to our gate!!
- The Denmark Shire has and over supply of freehold residential land packages available at present. Some subdivisions continued to have blocks available for sale from the original sub-divider, years after the subdivision was granted. The land held by the Denmark Council on Beveridge Rd does not need to be developed, thereby adding extra blocks to the market. They would only add to the oversupply and may bring prices down further.
- The golf course concept would appear to re-create Dunsborough McIntosh Rd good location for light industrial area Council land should be for public use not residential subdivision.
- These activities all have risk involved and Council should not be taking risks with ratepayer's money. The subdivision of council land on Beveridge Rd may not be so risky and is worth considering.
- These facilities are strongly used by locals and tourists.
- We might need this asset one day.
- We need all ages to make a healthy Denmark.
- What about a 'Lifestyle Village' for under 25's? And what about a Skate Park Residential Development in conjunction with Tha House? (Basically, communities should live integrated lives and not secular/discriminatory ones).
- With the over 50 age group already comprising more than 1/3 of Denmark's population it is vital to plan for future requirements.
- Would depend on the model that was used.
- After examining all relevant evidence of merit on each and every site mentioned and weighing against all likely negative aspects, there should be no reason to doubt the success of each venture. The growth rate of the Denmark region should not be overstated or a financial burden will follow which in turn will postpone other enterprises.
- Any development must be monitored so that it is attractive, functional and affordable. The light industrial park should be situated where it will not impinge on residential areas (noise, smell, visual impact) and be obscured from view.
- Council is an administrative body for the state government and should remain so; it is not a sovereign state.

#### 1. LONG TERM OPTIONS FOR COUNCIL LAND

Council is exploring long term options for the Council land at the corner of Strickland St and Mitchell St Denmark, comprised of the existing Infant Health Clinic building, vacant land adjacent to the RSL building and the old groups 41 and 42 school building, relocated to the site in the late 1970's and now utilised by Denmark Cottage Crafts.

Demolition of the Infant Health Clinic building and relocation of the Denmark Cottage Craft building to either the Old Hospital Heritage Precinct or the reserve opposite the Rivermouth Caravan Park (adjacent to Lions Club / Spirit of Play), to utilise the site as a CBD Car Park;

- Parking issues were completely ignored when Strickland St was upgraded. The resulting chaos was obvious to all users of Strickland St. Knocking down buildings used by ratepayers will only exacerbate the dissatisfaction presently felt. More creative thinking is in order.
- Placing the Infant Health Clinic & Cottage Craft opposite the Rivermouth Caravan Park no-one would go that far to visit it.
- Please leave craft shop where it is. I believe it would close altogether if moved to the suggested locations.
- Promote the car parking areas at the back of the businesses facing Strickland St (behind post office etc).
- Pursue CBD parking corner Brazier and Barnett Streets along with landscape/planting.
- *Re:* Cottage Crafts as it is a valuable asset to the community it should remain in the retail section of the town.

- Relocation of these Heritage buildings would destroy the historical value of the centre of Denmark and upset the Cottage Craft Group and many other residents of Denmark. Please find parking elsewhere.
- See previous comment re Shire and commercial involvement.
- Sell as it is to a developer all of the above
- Status quo and review in 5 years
- The Cottage Craft organisation would suffer greatly if it were to be moved from near the main shopping areas. Out at the proposed location it's too 'remote' for most tourists, and it would perhaps suffer from 'out of sight, out of mind' syndrome!! This organisation is very successful and has returned a lot of money to the community over the years, and I can see this would be significantly affected if there was a major change to their location. (I am not connected with The Cottage Craft, other than think it is a wonderful opportunity for those who are members).
- The Craft centre is in a great location it is in the middle of town and should remain there. Visitors can find it easy.
- The demolition of the Infant Health building seems reasonable, but moving the crafts building does not. Surely the building does not warrant such expense? It is good to have the op shops and the craft building all in a cluster. The

building is not particularly attractive, but the location is better for the crafts people than being shoved out of the way. Maybe the development could include a new craft centre. Strickland Street definitely needs more shops or businesses if it is to be the heart of the town. Parking should not be visible, but it should be well signed, bearing in mind that tourists need good visual clues.

- The demolition of these buildings would be absolutely disgraceful. The area from St Leonards to the craft building (old school historical tree) right up to the Primary School is of historical significance Murphy's Shed Building below the school Red Cross VWA etc in other towns these are preserved not made into concrete parking areas. Locals and visitors would not visit the craft shop in big numbers if it was out of the main shopping area these types of shops give heart to the town, allows all the people to display their talents and give the opportunity to buy a gift found nowhere else.
- The Denmark Cottage Craft adds to the character of the town at its current site a parking lot would be a sad alternative.
- The Denmark Cottage Craft building needs to be relocated to the reserve opposite the Rivermouth Caravan Park (adjacent to Lions Club / Spirit of Play). This is the Heritage Precinct previously nominated for heritage building relocation. It would be better to keep all relocated buildings in one area, and promote it as a tourist attraction, (upkeep is essential to attract tourists though). There is also the probability that Spirit of Play School will need to grow in the future, other buildings in the vicinity would allow this easily. There is a great opportunity with the Old Hospital Heritage Precinct to be developed as a unified centre. Cramming other building onto this site will distract both from its usability/functionality for the community groups which will use it, and its beauty as a tourist destination.
- The idea of turning this heritage site into a car park is appalling.
- The infant health building I have no attachment to, however I feel the old school buildings should stay. The Denmark Arts could be housed in the old hospital site if that became an arts community activity precinct. The Denmark Cottage Craft could only be moved if they were to be placed in an equally commercially appropriate location. The church could be relocated without too much trouble.
- The Infant Health Care Centre is old nice to keep Cottage Craft and big old tree.
- The infant health centre is an example of heritage architecture and should not be replaced with a car park. Having new buildings will lose the village atmosphere. Retaining the infant health centre will require funding however it does add to Denmark's village atmosphere. The current set up allows easy access for the elderly to visit these sites, relocating them would not.
- The infant Health Clinic should be retained in its existing place for ease of access. I consider the Arts and Crafts Centre to be part of Denmark's Heritage that should be preserved together with the old plane tree.
- The old hospital precinct would be an acceptable location but the Rivermouth site is too far from town and therefore completely unacceptable. We must preserve this unique 'business'.
- The old infant health clinic could be demolished and gardens extended for public to enjoy but the craft shop should remain. This building represents so much of Denmark's soul and to demolish this charming old building would be an assault on the character of our town. A small portion of the money earmarked for this unwise project could be used to paint and repair the existing craft shop building and then this important part of Denmark heritage would be retained along with our oldest tree. Time restrictions should be applied to all street parking along the length of Strickland Street, not just outside the post office as it is currently. This could vary between 15 minutes and 2 hours depending on location and would free up short term parking in the centre of town. As it is people can and do park there all day. Long term parking should be on the outskirts, by the river and both ends of Strickland Street. This would also encourage visitors to browse the less centrally located shops. We do not want Denmark to become a "little Albany", please let's retain our unique character and charm, the reason people choose to live here and to visit. A car park is just not necessary in this location especially as there has been approval to build a new shopping centre on the western side of town near the visitor centre. It would make sense to wait for the impact of this change. The proposal to relocate the craft shop to old hospital building would definitely fail as its success depends on passing trade and no one will find it hidden away up there out of sight. Pretty sad for the Flying Doctor Service who are beneficiaries of this outfit.
- The precinct as it is, is appropriate. The Infant Health Clinic building isn't one of my favourites but if it was a choice between it and a car park I know I'd choose to retain the building or turn it into a park. The question about whether to turn the area into car parking wouldn't be considered if adequate car parking was provided around the circumference of the CBD rather than IN it.
- The question should have been more specific like the old hospital precinct as an option river mouth as another not either or.
- The town centre is badly in need of more parking, especially during the tourist season.

- The western side of Strickland Street needs more retail shops to maintain the village feel and keep the heart of Denmark alive, particularly with the threat of the spread of the retail sector up the hwy to Hardy Street. More parking is required; therefore this needs careful planning in conjunction with the development of the retail space. The Infant Health building is not attractive in anyway, although it is MHI listed. It could be included in a development. The Cottage Craft building is also listed, but this is not its original location anyway so could be reshifted, to enable the development of the commercial heart of the town.
- There is sufficient parking in town, if only people could face walking a few meters more. Why move such a charming old building? (Which are lacking in WA). The cottage craft building is nice and should stay where it is.
- These are vital resources in farming community they need to be kept within the town centre. The town is becoming too fragmented, council chambers up one end, shops being built opposite side. Many places have had to rebuild their CBD. Denmark may face a similar problem.
- These buildings are part of Denmark's heritage, and to put a car park in this space would be a catastrophe. This would also mean that all of the local charities who receive funds from the Craft shop would no longer be recipients, as members who volunteer and signatures on our petition indicate, that the present locations is ideal, and to move the craft shop further away from the town centre would result in fewer people visiting the shop.
- This is a hard decision to make. The town does need new parking solutions which are pedestrian and driver friendly, however it would be a good idea to incorporate the current tenants of the buildings in new inner CBD buildings, at the same levels of rent, etc.
- This is part of our heritage.
- This is part of the character and heart of Denmark; it helps to keep the feel of the rural history and keeps community groups within the heart of Denmark.
- Though it is appreciated that during tourist season there are extra cars in town; the rest of the time it would be an unattractive space; plus we should retain our heritage, too much of our town is being sacrificed to appeal to tourists and commerce.
- To do anything to these buildings would be a great disappointment. The council needs to look at other avenues to solve the parking in the CBD. Utilise land that is not going to affect the true nature and history of Denmark.
- To remove these building out of town would be wrong, as a lot of people including tourist wouldn't go to them.
- We are a town in desperate need of more CBD parking.
- We definitely need more parking closer to the shops, especially for the elderly.
- We really need more parking in the CBD.
- What is the council planning to do with the properties?
- Why not move the civic centre and "arts"/library etc to the old hospital site. Then civic centre site can be used for much needed car parking in the CBD. This would be a lovely environment for all the arts for Denmark community!!
- Why spoil such a lovely and well known area. Who's going to go all the way down to the Rivermouth Caravan Park area? How are the disabled going to get there?
- Yes we need parking, but please keep it hidden such as in suggestion.
- You'll kill the Cottage Craft enterprise if you move it from the CBD.
- A country town atmosphere should be retained otherwise what "makes" Denmark last forever.
- Although I have indicated 'strongly agree' at (c) for the retention of the buildings at their current location, it is only the Cottage Craft building that I think should remain. I would have no problem with the Infant Health Clinic being removed.
- Another option is to demolish the Health Centre and leave the Cottage Craft as a historic building where it is! \* can't read rest of comment.
- Any development would require retaining the plane tree to get my approval.
- As the town population grows commercial space will become scarce and this area is not used to its full potential.
- Both suggested sites for the buildings are NOT a feasible proposition and to use Strickland St + Mitchell Rd frontage as car park is a ridiculous idea. Put the car park at the end of Strickland St on the grassed area. There could be a proposition to demolish the Health Clinic and use that corner for commercial development but NOT to put a car park at the rear. Let people walk it's good for them and they would have to walk passed the other comm. premises in Strickland St. The Craft Shop must remain close to Strickland St as it is very well-positioned and used where it is now. Perhaps you could put a new building for the Craft Shop on the Strickland St/Mitchell Rd corner but NO CARPARKS make people walk.

- We are unique Keep it they will come.
- What is the Character and Values of Denmark?
- Where do I find a clear definition of the 'character and values of Denmark'? The Settlement Strategy mentions character as a country or rural town. The importance of the natural environment is certainly mentioned in many documents so I assume this to be a value.
- Allowing wave skis at Ocean beach is socially and environmentally unacceptable to the majority of beach users. There needs to be preservation of what are valued and designated areas provided away from popular swimming beaches for such activities.

#### Other Comments:

- Denmark is a tourist town and that is good however we must retain what it is about Denmark that draws so many visitors here.
- I am happy with the development of tourism even with shire involvement on a non -profit basis but would like to see the problem of infrastructure solved first especially parking.
- I find the Visitor Centre a very unfriendly place. It seems that it is almost too much trouble for the staff to serve you.
- It is important for employment and overall economic viability of Denmark that tourism be fostered and developed. However, it is equally important that the rural and quaint ambience be maintained. This can be achieved by maintaining the boutique nature of accommodation and a green belt attitude.

- Maybe we should remember that we are a country town and a friendly lot!! Let's not lose our friendly town with infighting!!! Aggression never helps to solve a problem.
- More artistic involvement in the townscape please. THIS is the unique nature of Denmark.
- More promotion of the history of Denmark. Council could allocate more money for the current museum, which is run totally by volunteers. Better signage is also needed for the museum.
- Most tourism services have been supplied by private enterprise. There is unlimited scope to develop tourism, but by who? Shire or business? Council may facilitate tourism development but must be mindful of the economic viability vs. sustainability and remain aware that it is actually businesses taking the risk, not the Shire. The council appear to so far have had a balanced view but must remain wary of introducing prohibitive costs of businesses e.g. increasing rates.
- Not enough parks for car with caravans.
- Rate payer's money should be more focused on permanent resident's facilities and maintaining Denmark's "Quaint Country Town" image rather than modernising it to look like every other tourist town in the country.
- Sewered.
- The more tourism facilities and options the better, it will help to maintain a sustainable vibrancy.
- The Tourism industry will provide a lot of jobs for the future, so it needs to be encouraged, but with care for any detrimental effects.
- Too many residential homes are used for tourist accommodation; specific 'holiday cottages' should be encouraged in tourist developments similar to The Cove, Karma etc and leave residential areas for residents. We once lived in Minsterly Rd and had no permanent residents as neighbours. It was very disruptive & chaotic, we didn't enjoy the experience.
- Too much self interest hold this sector back, council should limit the funds to the industry until they have their house in order as much of the input seems wasted to benefit too few. Seems to be a user of resources rather than an economic mainstay at present, "uncompetitive and ordinary" was a description used by a recent visitor from QLD.
- Tourism is great for Denmark generally, but there is still need for caution. Being overzealous and allowing tourism developments a free for all approach is no acceptable to the Denmark community as a whole. Many developments in Denmark are appropriate to both the character and values of the Shire. Some stretch the bounds of the natural environment, and the quiet tranquil atmosphere of Denmark, (these ventures should be discouraged). The tourists who visit Denmark drive long distances to reach a beautiful destination which provides a superb natural environment and peaceful surroundings. Accessibility is necessary for some area, but this must be balanced with keeping some areas minimally accessible and others pristine. Tourists are looking for areas they can hideaway in not just numerous attractions we should not just emulate, but draw attention to our unique attributes of tranquillity, beauty, peacefulness, and naturalness. We are not just another town.
- Tourism is of no benefit to me personally but I realise that many people rely on this for income. The Shire needs to manage this growth industry with care and definitely in a sustainable manner.
- Tourism is the major money earner for Denmark.
- Tourism must not be promoted at the expense of the community and environmental values. e.g. barometer fiasco.
- Tourism needs to develop in line with the character and vales of Denmark (as separate from "is developing").
- Why the question marks? These are statements and not questions but see similar comment later.
- Bringing tourists into the region might easily increase costs for residents without a concomitant benefit to them. Any expenditure on attracting tourists needs to be evaluated carefully against benefits, which need to be ascertainable. There's a case for somehow subsidizing enterprises that both benefit locals and tourists, such as restaurants. This could be done with concessional rates, perhaps.
- Attention to the public toilets in Denmark should be a priority they are all dirty, old fashioned and not very appealing. Appropriate parking for those with long vehicles and trailers/caravans should be provided so as not to clutter existing car parks suggest a location within walking distance of town. Without this facility tourists will just drive straight through.

#### 4. COUNCILLOR REPRESENTATION

The Minister for Local Government, the Hon John Castrilli, has previously stated that it is his view that the maximum number of Councillors required for any local authority is nine. This view was supported by the recent Local Government Reform Steering Committee Report (March 2010) which recommended legislative amendment to prescribe the number of Councillors to be between six and nine.

"The Denmark Shire Council has however previously considered the Ministers view and rejected reducing the number of Councillors. The Western Australian Local Government Association has also stated that the number of Councillors should be a matter for individual Councils".

- Can't answer this properly as I don't know what the implications are?
- Representation should be for the residents to determine in both number and form.
- I support reduced focus on individual wards and concentrate on more Denmark wide decision making and management.
- Depends on size and nature of shire. One size does not fit all.
- More councillors, the better the public/residents are represented
- Only LOCAL councils should have that right.
- Less of a committee mentality may result in more action and less circular talk.
- The shire council surely knows better than I do.
- Perhaps 9 good Councillors would be better than having 6 good and 6 bad!
- Perhaps it may make for a more representative council; however a small group with extreme or lunatic views would not have much trouble getting a rat bag on council. More important is the quality of the people we elect and their preparedness to represent us all, we should first address the need to attract quality candidates even if it means paying a part time salary (say \$40,000 plus expenses).

- Less councillors means less representation of the ratepayers.
- Most Councils have reduced to 9 or less.
- The district is large enough for present number.
- Should have been done years ago.
- How many does Denmark have?
- 9 or more!
- Until we have satellite developments (e.g. Kent River) nine councillors is enough.
- Nine is an ideal group size for open discussion. In such a small place as Denmark there is no reason why a small group can't be representative.
- How many Councillors down here?
- Councillors should reflect the geographical breadth of the community and should be elected because they can take a broad approach to council matters and assist in the wise running of the Denmark Shire. Having too many councillors may lead to councillors being elected on the grounds of narrow interest groups. Councillors elected for those narrow reasons may not be equipped to make good decisions for the running of the broader needs of the shire.
- The work required of councillors is considerable. Reducing the numbers may provide a disincentive for community members to stand for the positions. As councillors are unpaid I don't understand why there are attempts to reduce their number.
- Nine is plenty for a good balance.
- It would be useful to compare with other shires, and to know quite plainly what each councillor does and is responsible for. I don't feel confident to support or not support as I do not know enough about it.
- Need to keep in mind rural needs.

- More councillors might make for more arguments but also gives a better range of opinions.
- It could be argued that it is merely a cost-cutting exercise with no other considerations. With less number of councillors could perhaps bring less diversity representation.
- No less than 9 Councillors
- Denmark has a diversity of interests and it is important that these opinions have the opportunity to have a voice in council.

#### Comments:

Traffic from heavy vehicles to cars travel too fast, with placement of speed limits taking little regard for topology, safety and noise in and around Denmark, Development at the western end of town and to the west of Denmark will make this worse. - I was gratified to see that in the website the document 'Transport Options in the Shire of Denmark' is provided. To have all the options, whether one thinks it's adequate or not, listed in one place is a good thing. Transport options between Denmark and Albany may be a little limited, but what is REALLY missing is a local bus service within Denmark itself. This could start with something as small as a minibus/van between town and Ocean Beach for the summer holidays, at least. To expand on that would be to provide a route/s encircling and throughout the urban parts of the town, both within the central part and also off to the urban areas off Ocean Beach Rd. The timetabling of a bus could start with an a.m. run, a midday run and an afternoon run or any variation in between to or from the centre. The morning runs being for workers and early morning people and the afternoon ones incorporating transportation for those school students who live too far away to walk and too close to qualify for the normal school bus. (I.e. within 4 km of the school). This type of service I would not expect to be viable for at least the first 5 years. It would take that long for people to transfer their allegiance to, for the 'cultural' transference to take place, and for fuel prices to bite more. Therefore, it should not be expected to be self-funded too quickly - and it may not be in the foreseeable future. The implementation of a public transport levy should not be cast aside at all because we all potentially benefit from such services. And a 3 month trial, as I believe was the case a few years ago with a trial bus service to Albany, is just not enough time for this sort of thing to 'take'. In a climate like Denmark's and with the tyranny of suburban distance, it's not practical to expect people to simply jump on their bicycles, even if there was a

web of cycle paths installed throughout - not to mention in the case of the aged and not-so-mobile members of the community. The building of off-street parking on the circumference of the CBD (as opposed to inside of), adequate cycle path provision and a bus service, would be the holistic approach to Denmark's transportation future. The sooner any of these can happen the better prepared we will be for Denmark's future growth. We can either knee-jerk our way into such infrastructure in a more distant future (with the possibility that urban growth and other pressures will get in the way) or we can inculcate, invoke and lead the way to engendering the culture of less car-use/more pedestrianism, especially for the centre of town which will, be we know it, be choked with cars, noise and fumes. Let us create this future, not just fall prey to the changes.

We do not need public transport in Denmark.

If it is striving to find a balance between sustainable developments and maintaining what attracts people to Denmark the environment, the village lifestyle, the mix of accommodation then it is doing a good job.
- Greater progress is needed on securing sustainable energy and water needs.
- Why does this electronic questionnaire not allow for comments like the paper version does?
- Council's role should be to provide infrastructure with the state/federal govt, support essential services, ensure regulation etc allow for the community to develop sustainably and facilitate but not provide services that can be developed by community groups, private enterprise. Parents should be encourage to support their children etc.
- Most people from Margaret River say that Denmark is like MR 10 years ago and is making the same mistakes. The future substance of the south coast all charm lost.
- Council's role should be to create a sustainable, liveable town for residents/ratepayers (and thus tourists).
- If I were grading an exam paper, I'd give the Council a 'B'.
- The council does a good job meeting the needs of the community but there is always room for improvement. Tourism is an important industry and must be encouraged and supported but not at the expense of the natural environment that makes Denmark so unique. Over the next few years there will be an increasing number of retirees settling in Denmark. The council will need to address issues that will arise as this generation ages. I.e. retirement villages, improved medical services and aged care facilities. There are many environmentally friendly improvements that can be made to ensure that this currently active group is catered for. These improvements such as the Poison Point development and more cycle tracks will also attract families to the region and cater for our current family needs.
- Too focused on development, should be focused on a sustainable, environmentally aware community to retain the character of Denmark. Encourage eco-tourism, foster home-grown businesses.

- Rather poorly
- I have no knowledge of the planning
- This question should be part of question (C) because I am too ill informed to answer the above. Generally I would say YES Council is meeting and planning for the needs of the Shire of Denmark.
- I believe the shire does a good job and I am proud to live here. I am disappointed with the Strickland St streetscape as it does not depict a sleepy country town.
- I believe that the pressure on Denmark planning is intense and whilst we are doing a reasonable effort, our creativity and long term vision is lacking. I have a perception (correct or incorrect) that some decisions are undertaken by Council staff and projects undertaken in-house without sufficient community discussion and/or input from specialists that exist within our community. Our community consultation is limited, outdated and under pressure to be completed quickly thereby not ensuring a creative and sustainable solution in my belief. We lack an agreed vision about the future, reinforced by the fact that Council has not adopted the cultural plan. I would like to see greater controls placed on developers and in some instances legal action taken, when shire policies are obviously ignored. The rural environmental and cultural diversity of Denmark is critical for our future and issues such as housing, rental options and high density development within the town sites are not fully explored in creative means. For example, one question only asks if I agree / disagree with development in town this is too simplistic a question and does not address the more complex issues of how much is too much
- As I do not live in Denmark for most of the year, I cannot comment adequately on this issue. Perhaps if an information sheet were attached to the survey outlining the Council's current decisions and future planning, then I could comment. From what I have seen of the area recently, what I think of the Shire of Denmark's decisions is not entirely negative.
- The Council is meeting and planning for the needs of the Shire of Denmark in an excellent manner. Their ongoing dedication to addressing issues that affect both the local residents and visitors is reflected by the positive remarks and feedback that is received by all concerned. Overall: Very satisfying and comforting to know these councillors have our best interests at heart. Well done.

- I am only a new member to the electorate, but it seems the council is doing an ok job, I'm not sure about some of the ideas offered up in this survey but not everyone is expected to agree with it all and suppose that's the point of the survey. So I'm sorry I can't give a more full answer to your question but give me a couple more years here in Denmark and I'll get back to you on it.
- By and large, I believe Council does extremely well in responding to community needs and exhibits a good deal of foresight in future planning. Obviously Council is never going to please all of the people, all of the time. Inevitably Councillors are perceived as either "green" or "brown" and vote accordingly on many issues. I believe it's important to achieve, to the extent possible, a balance of views and open minds. If the number of Councillors must be reduced, I would like to see no fewer than 9, given the physical breadth of the Shire, and uneven number to obviate the need for a casting vote on issues.
- Ages Care community project is a great step forward. What about those who are neither youth nor aged? Such projects are a sustainable way for the shire to meet the developing needs of the community planning needs to be more in line with the community sustainable development and less in line with the personal opinions of the councillors. Concepts such as a vehicle free or reduced CBD can be facilitated by electric vehicles and car parking on the perimeter of the CBD Planning for links between the school, hospital and other services could be a vital step for sustaining the shire
- Quite well.....Council is maintaining its interest which is to be expected in such a small and special community where the main priority is to protect the quality of life for the residents. Council "MUST" protect the current nature of Denmark which means very careful and limited expansion. It must be demonstrated that money is not the total end goal to everything.....and sometimes development for development sake is not necessarily the only way forward.
- I believe the council needs more informed vision of future needs and plans accordingly. For example have the utilities and infrastructure in place before considering future development There appears to be little respect of Denmark's character and retaining it when introducing new developments and streetscape and to this end being mindful of some continuity
- Need to be stricter re the development of land. No high density housing. Keep the trees and severely penalize those developers who disregard regulations. Love the new work in town centre.
- Council is doing an overall OK job of meeting current and future planning needs, however infrastructural, development and property issues still take precedence and there is minimal community development and welfare considerations made. We all know it is easier to deal with 'tangibles', however it is the intangibles (welfare and well being), which are the most difficult issues to tackle. The Shires Community and Regulatory Service section is predominantly active in regulatory services...fire, emergencies, rangers etc...Which is all very important. However, other than administration of the Youth and Recreation Centres there is no real leadership on the community development and engagement front and no consolidated approach in bringing together the needs of all age groups in our community. There is no Community Development Officer though this has been suggested on numerous occasions to Council. Admittedly there are committees of Council such as the Seniors, and Disability committees, but they are not brought together in a concerted way to address the hardest to tackle social issues concerning the overall well being and planning for all age sectors of the community.
- Quite well. More canvassing of public comment from abroad. Section of community would be welcomed.
- I would like to see Strickland Street ESPECIALLY THE NEW SQUARE as a: GIVE WAY TO PEDESTRIANS zone. It is momentarily a VERY confusing and therefore dangerous zone for children!!! I also think the Council should make better use of the "Denmark Arts Council" in designing street scapes, park, play-grounds and the like. Denmark is full of talent. Let out visitors see the artistic flair of the "Denmarkians". Sculptures etc. are needed to brighten the street scapes and; sorry shire; the newly designed/painted park on the river. We (as a community) could have done so much better! So to answer your question; No I don't think the Council is meeting and planning for the needs of the shire. Let the community play a bigger part!
- Great. But I think you should also put a roundabout in on Hollings Rd/South Coast Highway before Ocean Beach Road/South Coast Highway
- Judging by the questions being considered, I think the council is responding well. I do not think that entrepreneurial activities should be undertaken by council. I think councillors should be adequately paid for the work they do. At the same time I don't think people should be attracted to council for money or gain. I think it is an honourable service position.(or should be)
- Council does a good job and should be supported and praised for all the time and effort put into these positions, keep up the good work.
- I am really not sure it is hard to know just what it is that the Shire do and what State Govt is responsible for
- Quite well I think. Good to have notes in each Bulletin

- Progressive, well done.
- Ok
- Can't think of any adverse observation: as against having a passion for a particular issue which generally is the basis of adverse comment on the council: who rarely can do enough for those with such a passion when trying for a balanced outcome for all.
- I think that council should stop letting all these committees tell you what to do as these are only the minority of the people in this town. Why don't you start making the decisions as a council and stop being puppets to the minority and however many committees that seem to really run Denmark for their own benefit and no-one else's. I have been told that if I have questions that I should attend council meetings. This is all very well but am I supposed to close my business to attend at 4pm. (I don't think so) I suggest that instead of having these at 4pm, why not have them at 6:30pm start so that business people and those working in & away from Denmark get a chance to have their say as well. Not every-one in this town is Idle. (Very cunning of you to have meetings earlier in the day when a lot of people can't attend). Get the wind turbines up and running and stop worrying about the little "save the trees people" who live in timber framed houses, sit on timber framed furniture and read about themselves in the newspaper. (Huh??) I am not a greenie as you have probably guessed but I do believe in conservation and looking after our little corner of the earth for future generations of this town. But not being over the top about it where is the loading Zone in Strickland Streets new paved area (waste of money) my husband was told that he would have to cart crates of bread up the back stairs as he could not unload these in front of our shop. Let me tell you this, If my husband trips and hurts himself because he can't see where he is going, then the ranger involved and council will be sued. I assure you that this is no joke. I also park out the front to unload on a Saturday morning and just wish a ranger would be game enough to tell me to cart my load up the back steps!! Loading Zone should be 7am - 3pm Monday to Friday and 8am - 12 noon Saturday. My husband worked for a council for 27 years in a supervisory role and has never seen such a shamozzle as the Denmark council. Why don't you turn the bottom of Strickland St into a car park and please don't ask a committee what they think. Stop wasting money and start looking after the shire; this includes grading roads that need them. (the farmers pay rates as well remember) You asked about paying councillors more money to attract more people to apply, my answer to that was NO. People don't apply to be councillors because of the money, (if they do, then they should not be a councillor and go and get themselves a real job!!) They should apply because they want to make a difference and hear what the majority of people want not just the minority. I would love to stand as a councillor and if I thought I could make a difference I would apply as the voice for the MAJORITY of Denmark and be fair and honest to all people in the shire, not just the chosen few although I know that I would be hitting my head against a brick wall. I will save the headache and let you all keep pleasing the committees of this town as is your want and wish you all well... I think the gardens are fantastic and my hat goes off to the man who looks after them. I think that you should put shade of some sort over the kiddies playground to cut the glare of the sand that you have put in Berridge Park and to also protect their skin from sunburn and skin cancer Also remember, that people in this town who rent properties are a part of this community and should also have a say as they contribute to the Denmark economy too. Maybe we should start up a rental property peoples committee. So I say to Denmark shire Council stop wasting our ratepayer's money and start earning what you get paid to do. It is time that you made decisions yourself and stopped agreeing with all of these little committees around the town of which I have no wish to join and should not be forced to do so just to have my say heard
- It is impossible to please all people at all times and almost every decision will receive some criticism, however that is no excuse for inaction. Overall I believe that the Council is doing a reasonably good job in meeting and planning for the Shire's needs within the limits of resources.
- I remember reading in the Bulletin that the Shire wasn't going to approve more buildings due to the lack of water this doesn't seem to have the case. I would like to see the council concentrate on building Denmark into a green sustainable town with attention paid to the environment of Denmark i.e. green areas, more trees no GM products, tackle climate change. The perception in the community is that the council is run by people who have an alternative agenda in terms of real estate and decisions are made to facilitate that interest. I only have a vague idea and rather confused image of the nature of the council really, through the bulletin I think the goals and achievements of the council need to be communicated more clearly to the community. I am pleased that certain issues are being raised i.e. green issues but don't see a lot being done about it.
- Comparatively well, but I would like to see a little more research into alternative power sources other than the obvious wind turbine route. Turbines are unsightly and can be costly to maintain long term. Possible options might include solar subsidies to local ratepayers, wave generators, heat sink development, etc.
- I am sure the council is doing everything in their power to make sure Denmark remains a beautiful and safe place to live and bring up our children.

- I know tourism is a big financial winner but it would be nice for the Shire to focus more on the residents and businesses of the town.
- In general I believe the council does a good job in fulfilling its roles apart from the over emphasis on real estate development; it would seem to me that council has allowed real estate to grow at a disproportionate speed; not observing the natural growth of a community but more focused on the momentary gains to be made, apart from this sad failure council meets the needs of our town well.
- Denmark's progress is hampered by a culture of decisive debate/decision making. Individual lobby groups appear to dominate. Council should provide leadership to channel Denmark's human resources & innovative opinions into a healthier process of decision making. The wind farm and other crucial topics have been left to become a public slanging match with counterproductive outcomes and creation of further "animosities". A small community in a growth trend like Denmark should focus on innovative design to showcase lifestyle and work environments which are based on sustainable/environmental and human centred objectives.
- The Wilson inlet is deteriorating year by year. The beaches are no longer family friendly. There are few fish left to catch, so why worry about a fishing platform? Any fish caught in the inlet are not fit for human consumption.
- Too much Land Sub-division we have enough approved sub-divisions to provide enough land for the next 20 40 years.
- Need more work on keeping Wilson Inlet clean. Infill sewerage and NO sewerage into Inlet.
- Don't know never been to a council meeting.
- I think we are finally getting a good balance of Councillors who think and act sustainably and care about the way we go forward as a community rather than individuals. Thank you and well done! Care Sustainability, Community Consultation and Teamwork is what I see, we as a community need from our Councillors.
- Need more regular input from residents re: development in CBD area & increased holiday home construction and ownership. E.g. meetings, surveys, information sheets. Needs of residents & visitors alike have been ignored in the 'upgrading' of Strickland Street. Access from side roads is difficult and dangerous. Parking is inadequate e.g. Caravans and camper vans. Non-native trees and plants have been utilised in favour of natives requiring less water and attention. Street lighting is either NON-EXISTANT or INADEQUATE.
- I think the Council is looking after the Tourists and Developers extremely well. For locals (including Developers) bugger all is done. Also - Weedon Hill should be checked. The houses (Mainly Holiday Homes) are covered in leaves and fallen branches. Have we introduced a cat law yet?? Have not noticed any difference if we did. More signage needed to stop people camping just about anywhere but caravan parks. Not very nice having to pick up other peoples rubbish, including toilet paper flying around.
- The traffic running though the centre of town is an issue. Corner of Hollings Road and Strickland Street is particularly dangerous. Restrict traffic flow to Peace St from Strickland St to reduce congestion.
- Barely a pass.
- I feel the council; is doing a very good job. However there could perhaps be a long term plan in general form (if there isn't one) e.g. what form should the CBD take? The present + format or more compact form by developing more facilities/shops etc. Maybe by using the Mitchell Sight + Price St? Etc. e.g. how much parking is required? Could the greened area on the corner of Barnett + Brazier St be the long term answer? (it being only a couple of blocks from P.O, Banks etc.) E.g. should we actively develop a historical precinct by moving relevant buildings, e.g. old group schools, police station and creating a tourist type 'village'?
- I think Dale has been very positive as CEO. Too much is spent on roads I think Council has done well with Strickland Street particularly including and achieving the town square. It is now important to carry the unique quality of Strickland street onto the Sth Coast Highway from Ocean Beach to the Ag School
- I agree council is meeting and planning for needs of shire in future
- I think the council does pretty well. It seems to have a good mix of people representing all the different interests within the community. I fear that short term money making will drive agendas such as introduction of a SHOPPING CENTRE in Denmark. To me tourists don't need Shopping Centres or fast food outlets etc; they do not come here for that and having those things will detract from the appeal of Denmark. I also find the proactive burning program in the height of summer dangerous; irresponsible and not in any way enhancing the beauty of our town.
- Reasonably well.
- Plan for increasing number of people i.e. Post Office Boxes Rubbish service to Bimbimbi Way (turn around at culde-sac not having the rubbish truck turning around on lights road) - Postal service to Bimbimbi Way as no Post boxes available - Cycle way from town centre to Ocean Beach brilliant but needs to be maintained i.e. - bush and trees overgrowing path (dangerous misc) - Seal the gravel road to lights beach

- Poison Point: Whilst access to this place is desirable how it is achieved needs careful thought. To be available to everyone a single track, following the pathway already there, would be unsafe. Two lanes would be necessary and this would destroy all ambience. Going along from Campbell Rd would seem much more sensible. A fishing platform is not necessary; half the fun is fishing from the rocks. Be wary of spoiling such a 'Denmark Place' with over building!
- As resources are limited council is struggling to keep up with the towns future needs. Some developers are not contributing to services sufficiently that their development is affecting. Youth activities and interests are vital for town future. Need more resources to encourage youth to be here.
- There is too much emphasis on housing development; we need to look at development in a sustainable holistic manner. Do we as a community want Denmark to become just another country town relying on tourists and retirees for its future? What will happen if tourism dries up due to increased fuel costs for example? The Council and community need to look at what attracts people down here both to live and visit, and then preserve and promote that. If a development or planning concept does not support the reason for people coming here then it should not be given support. The council needs a balance between sustainable (as in minimising harm and allowing future generation's choice) development and preserving the current character of Denmark. Is there any guarantee that reducing the number of councillors will assist this delicate balance of views? Maintaining a dedicated and motivated council staff is as important as the councillors in providing continuity in planning and support for Council deliberations and decisions.
- Overall, I think the Council is doing a good job. My major concerns are stated on page 17.
- I am a land owner of a block in Peaceful Bay; there only seem to be questions relating to Denmark in this survey.
- They are talking about it. That's a good start. There are perhaps too many pro development councillors. Luckily there are a few environment conscious one to balance it out. Overall, they are doing ok.
- Council needs to be encouraging businesses to be open in peak tourist season i.e. restaurants, cafes in town maybe incentives to help them be open. Tourism is their business and they need to be making the most of tourist season.
- Not bad but improvement is needed to satisfy the needs of the public other than personal interests of the councillors. Please speed up the swimming pool. Water exercise will keep the elderly away from the hospital longer. Please reinstate the roadside rubbish collection service. Many seniors don't drive so cannot use the free rubbish tip passes.
- A suggestion for better traffic management at the intersection of south coast highway and Hollings and Horsley roads.....Maybe lights?
- Council seems to be at odds with their planning/policies. On one hand they would like involvement and input into different projects e.g. Centenary Celebrations + Denmark Age Friendly Community Project. Then a group of 60-70 members (the majority being seniors over 50) are getting ousted to an out-of-the-way place. I am referring to the Denmark Cottage Crafts as one instance. A swimming pool has been canvassed for as long as I've been here (14 years). It would service both seniors + youth.
- Do as well as can be expected with such a diverse range of people and lifestyles.
- I think this Council appears to be doing a good job. One of the problems seems to be the change in Councillors in that a Council of the day makes a decision and then the next Council changes it. Sometimes this is for the better and sometimes not! I believe that virtually all residents and visitors wish to retain the uniqueness of Denmark, i.e. the environment and country town atmosphere and therefore it is vital that Council always has this as it's guiding principle when making decisions.
- I don't feel comfortable about Real Estate Agents being on Council. I believe this leads to conflicts of interest.
- Planning, and consultation process is good, the challenge is (as always!) the implementation....cost vs. priority vs. negotiation with Stage Gov.
- Greatly improved under current leadership, staff are pretty good too.
- On the whole, I think Council is doing a pretty good job. The bike track to Ocean Beach is fantastic and well utilised. Although I think aged care is a priority, I think this is more of an issue for the Health Dept, but any support given by the Shire to better this would be gratefully received by the community. The Strickland St redevelopment may take some getting used to but should be well worthwhile when the trees grow. I also think the gardens/park at the entrance to the town have never looked back - very well done by the landscape team, and I would like to encourage this as much as possible - still waiting for the Community Park 'botanical gardens' that we were promised - hope this is still on the agenda? Well done Council, you're doing a good job.
- I believe that the Council is doing a good job. The forthcoming Strategic Plan is very important. Input from the community is critical.

- I think Council should exercise more control over development to ensure that the existing character of Denmark is preserved. This includes both the scope of proposed developments and the architecture
- The council needs to focus on families with children and build an indoor swimming pool for swimming lessons and leisure during the summer months. This will also assist the aging population as well. Families are travelling to Albany and while they are there doing their shopping and taking away support from our local businesses. It saddens me that this has still not happened.
- Neutral.
- The development of the Old hospital needs to be progressed more quickly.
- Satisfied.
- If Strickland St is an example of Council planning it's a debacle.
- The council appears to be reactive, not proactive. I/we have encountered inconsistencies between Shire culture and Shire laws and by not using the implemented policies, effective planning cannot take place. All policies need to be clear to allow businesses and the public to plan for themselves around Shire directives, changing these on the basis of 'culture' creates uncertainty and mistrust. Council appears to be very 'green' focussed which is good however if not managed well can hinder better/faster development. I/we feel that the basic infrastructure in the Shire needs to be the focus, not the 'nice-to-haves' in this economic climate. By having good roads, good signage, aesthetically pleasing (pref. heritage) streetscape that suits the town etc will attract and encourage tourism, not building car parks in the CBD. If tourism thrives it will create funding and opportunities for further development.
- I believe the current administration and council have been more active in the future planning of Denmark. Should another growth or boom period occur Denmark needs to be well prepared with its planning to cope with a surge of population.
- 1 I am concerned that too many small blocks are planned close to town. Has a need been established that this is what is required? 2 New water pipes installed from the new tank at the top of Kearsley Road might benefit the town in the future as population grows, but where is the water to come from to fill this enormous tank??? 3 In case of emergency Denmark needs to have another in/out access other than South Coast H'way. 4 Council, in all decisions, needs to be sure of retaining, maintaining the natural beauty and history of Denmark, and that includes heritage buildings within the town itself.
- Generally very well. However, apparent ambivalence in billing is des needs attention. e.g. 2 ugly, large + inappropriate residences have been altered on McPherson Drive Nornalup effectively altering the amenity of the hill for everyone.
- Generally good, but need to plan strategically for projected developments to cater for shire infrastructure & services.
- My main concern is that the "village atmosphere" of Denmark is being eroded by some inappropriate development. The challenge for council is to maintain the unique "village/environmental" features of Denmark, while at the same time providing facilities and activities for an increasing number of residents and tourists. I fear that more car parks in the CBD region (such as the proposal to demolish the Infant Health Clinic and relocate the Denmark Cottage Craft buildings and to convert the vacated site to a CBD car park) is not the way to go.
- Reasonably well.
- I think council is doing a half reasonable job in difficult times. The sporting facilities are good and with the upgraded surfaces to the tennis and bowling clubs, and also the retic to the golf club this is meeting both current and future demands. The all weather boat access perhaps too little bay towards McGeary's would be an excellent facility. A permanent opening to the inlet would ensure all the boaties to be happy and bring even more tourists. The aged homes perhaps near the golf course would be excellent in the near future. The so called upgrade of Strickland St could have been done with more class. Parking is a huge problem and needs to be immediately address. For now and the future.
- Council should continue to support infrastructure in outer communities. Don't just spend in Denmark Town site.
- Having built our house and sub-divided another site to sell half and spent a fare amount of my career in building and sub-division from Administrator on a new town to large estates ( up to 250 homes) and feel Denmark is no different to other projects in WA or other countries. A piece of land becomes available a speculator thinks he can make money the proposal is put to the Council (be it Town, Shire, County)if they say no the speculator takes his proposal with a better storey to the State or County Council and nine times out of ten he gets approval. Somewhere in the mix someone wants a peaceful life, you may think I am a critic but that's the way it happens, if it really gets tough it goes to Countries Government and I do not know of one final decision. The Shire of Denmark is no different than the City of Albany, various towns in England, Scotland, the Windward Isles, Papua New Guinea or the xx? Likely I have found small Councils do not join against Big Money.
- As well as possible, these community surveys' are an excellent example.

- Unsure. Relatively new to town.
- Agriculture College use of Land on + near river Town parking needs more Survey Good Initiative Property sewer near water ways.
- Too much small residential development in this town
- Future satellite 'towns' should be based on minimal infrastructure i.e. Power, sealed roads, underground phone, water... and based on 'sustainable communities' practise. These developments could set precedence and be an example to other parts of the state.
- I think Council is doing a sterling job. Especially the wonderful administration and finance staff, who provide the best service in this town, for the limited amount of resources available to them.
- I believe they are doing a fair job. More work is required on several roads. More parking is required (without losing any buildings) as many of the parking areas are unsafe and lack in numbers. More consideration is warranted for competition with certain retail businesses and new retail businesses should be looked at.
- Not sure!
- O.K. There seems to be some excellent initiatives, but I guess one always wants more. Would like to see alternatives to car use continued (more cycle & walk trails) and maybe a bus service (2 or 3 times a day ?) to areas like Ocean Beach & Greens Pool in the school holidays to relieve traffic and parking problems.
- Needs to think they want more tourists in town they need car and caravan parking. Signs need to be put up so they no.
- ONLY a locally elected council can stand up for and protect the unique country life style of our district. NO ONE else will do this. Rampant development for ego and the extra bucks will sell us all down the river. (Dunsborough Development) While council management and planning seeks to contain development in the interests of local residents then you are doing a good job. In my view we are reaching a manageable balance between interests of residents and visitors. Well done. But we may need to cap the volume of future visitors by limiting the growth of visitor accommodation in the future.
- Based on the questions asked in this survey it seems the Council is heading in a positive direction though hopefully results of the survey will steer the council in making the right decisions fared on majority community vote and say.
- I have not attended a council meeting and only read the information provided in the local paper. It would appear all is ok.
- I feel in general the shire is a dedicated body doing a good job. A diverse and diligent body of councillors, which can only be a good thing.
- Not very well: 1) The Visitor Centre tower and barometer were not needed or welcome by most locals and it is generally regarded as an expensive waste of money. 2) Parking/Strickland Street. Again, the recent works were neither needed, called for, nor worthwhile. When the street scaping was planned some years ago (2007?) the community was promised double the parking capacity in Strickland Street and this was a consummate failure. The cost was a total waste of money in the opinion of the great majority and the crossover would be a joke if it wasn't so dangerous, as neither pedestrians nor motorists know who have priority/right of way. Consequently, there should be far greater community consultation on major issues like these. They are both immensely unpopular.
- Use of this survey is indication of good intent.
- Adequate. Rural properties are generally too small to be considered viable enterprises. There should be more scope for subdivision or changing of land description. By subdivision I do not mean residential suburbs rather medium size lots to appeal to a broader population especially in view of those wishing to make a "tree change or sea change"
- As I live out of town + too far out to be really appreciating the town's facilities on a regular basis, the roads (gravel) are always an issue. Also the spraying of weeds along the road drains + verges is not very environmentally friendly + should be stopped. People on the dole could be employed to dispose of weeds... Safety is an issue, but I'm sure there could be a way. When I've gone to town I've found the facilities good. Parking is a bit of an issue... But I don't mind walking. During the tourist season, you know what it will be like, + make allowances for it. I think Denmark needs to keep its natural assets... no more destruction of bush for development. The council needs to tread carefully + keep a happy medium between its natural + historical beauty, + progress + development of our town.
- Satisfactory but slow in making decisions and getting on with it!
- Within its limited finding I think it is doing quite well. The one exception is planning for the inevitable effects of climate change.
- I do believe the Council is doing a good job! I have lived here over 24 years and it's as friendly and welcoming to anyone as I've ever known. We haven't changed, people care about each other here and accept you for who you are. What more could you ask for? Beautiful Forests, Coastline clean and empty most of the time. The Rangers have the tourists in hand and Gardner's and Shire workers are fantastic. The Council should keep the good feelings that go with living here tourists welcome to share.

- Council is performing adequately.
- Going well-need to keep developing with tourism in mind as this is the way forward for Denmark.
- I don't understand why a town with a population of our size, and such large rate payments doesn't have a heated indoor swimming pool with spa and sauna facility. So many community members need these facilities for health healing, safety from the sun, swimming lessons, physiotherapy, leisure and recreation!
- Council needs to have monthly news letter, with unbiased, reporting of council activities, present and future. Facilitate better access to councillors on issues instead of the restrictive question time before meetings; many people are intimidated by this procedure. Submissions made by the public on proposals should be published in the news letter. The council is performing poorly IT IS NOT TRANSPARENT.
- I feel the two very urgent issues for our community are: 1) Strong fire prevention plan. Without block burning around Denmark (as Pemberton does), there will not be a Denmark, it is a very real issue. The younger people, with families should be involved more in the community, than leaving this important issue to older people. Perhaps this could be introduced via schools to the parents, say at community meetings? 2) Urgent water needs. Whilst I am in favour of development, we have the cart before the horse situation, we are opening too many new developments, as each new area is putting more strain on our water situation, which in the tourist season gets so low and smelly that we have to levy our drinking water. Because of the peppermints surrounding us on next door properties, we cannot have a water tank, which we would dearly love. 3) Parking in town is just terrible, perhaps a car park opposite the nursery and another opposite IGA.
- Doing a reasonable job.
- I don't have enough information to know of the council's overall planning.
- I have some concern about the smaller block sizes in housing developments which are springing up around Denmark and hope that Council will not compromise the characteristics of Denmark which make it attractive to tourists and families seeking a healthy lifestyle. I am also concerned that a large dam structure on South west highway about 10kms east of the Denmark town, which is quite clearly not related to farm use, was passed by Council with careless attention to proper procedure. This dam is allowing a lot of evaporation, is built on a peat site, may affect breeding of lampreys and other wildlife dependent on the good flow of creeks downstream from this dam and may have a significant impact on surrounding properties and the highway itself should it overflow or break its banks.
- From reports and comments there has been more activity in this area. With the growth of Denmark, (2-3%) Planning needs to occur so we do not have a repeat of the hospital or high school debate and the lack of future planning shown by the fiasco with these 2 developments.
- We are concerned that Council is not representative of the whole community and special interest groups' needs are met to the detriment of the whole community. We acknowledge that councillors give their own time to matters and issues and respect the community consultation is always invited. Overall, we would say that Council is meeting the needs of the Shire quite well.
- As my involvement in council activities is minimal I don't think I know enough to comment
- Council has done a good job in meeting and planning for the needs of the Shire. This is enhanced by the quality staff currently available to the Council
- I think a lot of the councils decisions seem to be very short sighted. I see no reason why Denmark cannot be the main attraction of the Great Southern; it has the natural beauty but lacks the infrastructure to sustain such an economic boon.
- I have concerns about council road maintenance methods for shire roads. They are destructive to roadside vegetation. I think too many special rural subdivisions are allowed. This has serious ramifications for the future. Council needs to stand firm against special interests and property developers where proposals are not in the best long term interests of the community. Otherwise it's doing fine.
- Too many similar looking/size Special rural developments, a mix of smaller (5 acre) blocks should be allowed in rural areas. New subdivisions would be more appealing with varying size lots. Encourage some commercial activity in outlying nodes Nornalup, Bow Bridge, Peaceful Bay, Scotsdale, Ocean Beach etc. But keep Denmark as the main centre centred around Strickland St and both sides of the River, rather than spreading up to Ocean Beach Rd.
- My main concern is that so much emphasis is on tourism I know they inject much needed revenue, but locals sustain Denmark year round. I did think the entire episode with Mr Bolle was mishandled! He should never have received any additional equipment, time, money or assistance. He reneged on his gift and taxpayers should not meet any costs to soothe his ego. Giving into a bully with a loud voice smacked of cowardice and now we are left with the eyesore which many of us objected to in the beginning. Legal action should have been threatened against him and I bet he would have backed off all bluster I say this as I have had dealings with the individual and when approached he backed off.

- Why no question on opening ocean beach bar? The inlet needs it! Farmers not developers should be allowed and encourage to subdivide to 5 acre lots with access to roads. Hobby farms would bring more families to the area, make land more affordable and help farmers overcome their present low economic situation. Protection of all Large Kauri trees could be ensured with an "Adopt a Tree' policy All housing permits must avoid placing residents in fire prone bush areas. All volunteer efforts should be given greater shire support through grants monies. A bridge is needed for crossing the inlet mouth.
- I think we have a better chance of making good decisions about our future with a balanced Council. There must be councillors who hold up a Green perspective, to act from best principles, to attract the attention of the big players, such as Western Power (Green Town Project). Property developers can get "with it" and support biolytic toilets, high density housing etc. Truly, the old model of 5acre lots is history. Having property developers involved in Council decisions leads the town into difficult situations as we have now, i.e. too many subdivisions, poor water and energy supplies, black outs etc. I think Green principles and sound economics will bring Denmark forward. We need development, but it must be sustainable. New models are smart and they need smart councillors to carry them forward.
- On the whole yes, although I do this that there are far too many vacant blocks around to justify clearing more land, such as Heather road a year or so ago. If clearing and subdividing carries on at this rate, with no building on already cleared blocks, I worry that Denmark will not be as lovely as it is now in the future. To be honest, I do not and never have attended a council meeting.
- See previous comments particularly with regard to the Visitor Centre. The Centre is the absolute focus for tourism which is surely the lifeline of Denmark's economy and yet the in-fighting resignations of experienced staff and negative publicity surrounding the DVC is palpable. And as I understand from several people the members are "afraid" of speaking out because of the likely pay-back in a small town. Therefore I do not think the Council/Shire is doing at all well with its "planning" right now. It's killing the goose that laid the golden egg in an effort to appear "professional". We don't need a Capital City type visitor centre with seminars, tourism degrees and technological expertise: just enthusiastic, pleasant, friendly people willing to "sell" Denmark and its unique charm.
- 4 out of 10.
- The length of time the council has taken to get their residential strategy in place is far too long. It is noted that they are in the process of finalising the latest strategy. One would hope that this does not become a drawn out process. The amount of money and time that has been wasted to date in regard to planning strategy could have been well used elsewhere. The current council seems to be on top of the process. The main cause of concern is the council being unable to hold their planning staff.
- Ok but the area needs greater job security. No future for youth so they leave the area. No future for farming as \$ are getting less + less. Food, wine, and music festivals generate income, potential and promote the area.
- OK Dunsborough is a fine example of how Denmark could be without restrictions on development hopefully we will not go down that path
- I think that considering all the legislative and financial constraints the Shire of Denmark does REALLY well!
- On balance the council doing a good job trying to meet the many and varied demands of faces from developers, industry, tourism, and ratepayers. There is however a perception in the community that developers have too much a way in council matters and appear to be able to flout the 'rules' as they know council does not have the fixed resources (ratepayers money) to prosecute. Denmark council is not the only council facing issues, but at some stage somebody has to be prosecuted and justice needs be to done (not just a slap on the wrist).
- We need to address the need for an adequate water source and supply as well as reliable power supply before we continue to release more and more land.
- The Denmark Shire has a great diversity of highly capable, skilled, talented and exceptional individuals, who are informed in an extremely diverse range of knowledge bases (i.e. environmental, leadership, community etc). The Denmark Shire Council needs to make best use of these resources and expertise, to inform the Council, Committees, and Community at large. Denmark needs an Indoor Heated Swimming Pool. We are a mixed aged community, with large numbers of both retired, and children/young people. Both of these groups would benefit greatly from an indoor pool, as would all the community. The elderly, retired, infirm, and the baby-boomers (who will soon be retiring and/or elderly) can all benefit from the relaxing and physiotherapeutic qualities of calm water. Also swimming is a sport which is not arduous for the infirm and even the non-swimmer is able to do water aerobics. Whilst the younger generations benefit from swimming competently and exercising regularly (swimming lessons and lap training). With an increasing focus on health for everyone, swimming is an ideal sport. We might even have an Olympian hiding in our younger generations. Denmark has great need for a Cultural Centre. This is a highly gifted, talented, creative, original, and imaginative community, with minimal venues (places, areas, and structures) to display this bountiful resource. The originality and peculiarity of Denmark's creative ingeniousness, and

innovativeness is a resource which we can utilise to attract more tourists to the area. To do this and do it well requires a high quality venue, along with a series of smaller venues to display the talent to its best ability (possibly the Old Hospital Building). The new angled parking bays along Strickland St. are dangerous. The angle does not allow motorists to see clearly when reversing. The blind spot of most large cars, 4wds, and vans is the rear corners (the larger the car the larger the obstruction). As most Denmarkians have large cars and 4wds, this blind spot is a concern for most motorists reversing out into the oncoming traffic. VERY DANGEROUS. The area in the middle of Strickland St. which has been paved across the road is hazardous. The continuous paving is very confusing for children, particularly toddlers and those learning to cross the street. The distinction between where the path finishes and where the traffic drives is extremely confusing. I have seen children, and even adults start crossing without looking, and then suddenly realise when almost in danger. There needs to be signs for pedestrians to beware of vehicles. But even more pertinent is the need for traffic to be slowed to a 5 or 8kms through this area. It is almost a mall so treat the traffic accordingly.

- Council is doing a reasonable job but could do more in terms of future planning of town site/CBD. I.e. use of old hospital area, parking, keeping "village" feel of CBD.
- Don't really know
- As stated on page 6, I believe too much focus and money is spent on building a 'Tourist Town' just like every other, rather than maintaining the very reason people are drawn here in the first place. Also, rate payers are entitled to priority of Shire expenditure in preference to improving the welfare of and conveniences for tourists. "Denmark, a Shire that looks after its own", is a better reputation that "Spend Easter in trendy Denmark". Hell let 'em go to Margaret River if they want every mod con. I believe that the aesthetics of the town are critical. Building exteriors like the Supa IGA are laughable in Denmark and look completely out of place; it should never have been passed.
- After completing this survey, I think the council is aware of the needs of Denmark and has prepared a comprehensive study to work through.
- Overall council has instigated many + constant improvement of facilities in the Shire of Denmark. Greens Pool proposed extra car park is a priority, if the district continues to promote this area. Holiday makers and locals alike love this beach. During peak holiday times, parking is inadequate.
- My biggest concern is a public health issue and relates to the antiquated practise of burning garden waste. There is an excess of green waste due to our climate where thing grow well and people wanting to maintain their property in the hope of providing some protection from potential bushfires. Currently residents are encouraged to burn this waste; however this practise is dangerous and needs to be eliminated. Residents need to be encouraged to recycle the waste and there are acceptable ways to do this. The waste can be turned into compost for their own garden, this helps to conserve precious water and reduce weeds. Council could consider buying in bulk some small garden mulchers to sell at cost to residents. Alternatively Council can provide green waste pick up. A bulk collection once or twice a year as is done in other shires would be the best option as residents already have the weekly collection for disposing of small amounts of garden refuse. Council could turn this waste into compost or just mulch and sell it back to the residents. The gardeners currently employed with high maintenance gardens might be transferred to this area. Alternately trailers could be available for loan from the Shire for residents to transport large material to the recycle station. Also on the topic of bushfires the Council could be more pro-active with stricter building regulations in regard to fireproofing houses built in high risk areas.
- I believe that more can be done as Denmark is continuing to grow however the lack of shopping and services is a worry. Not only do I need to go to Albany for work but also for swimming lessons, clothes + goods shopping and during tourist season grocery shopping. Although I understand that Denmark is a small community its potential for development is high, but there is a distinct lack of interest from council to allow this to happen. Infrastructure is another let down. Instead of focussing on power, water + sewerage to meet the demands of the community, money is being spent on planting unsuitable short lived flowers. At least this year somebody has the sense not to plant fox glove! Why is it so hard to decide on a place for a wind turbine? No one will refuse the power it provides once it is built + if worried about it blending into the environment, paint it various shades of green like they have done in Ravenshoe QLD, who also had opposition to their farm however since completion have only had 2 official complaints. How can Denmark claim to be environmentally friendly when there are so many issues with not only the turbine but also the inlet + the prawn channel?
- As a member of the wider community unfortunately it doesn't seem that council are always looking at the bigger picture.
- I think Denmark is looking the best it ever has. The gardens in town are superb, a real showcase and something to be proud of, and lately a lot of quality paving and pathways have been completed. I feel the current council has a long term strategy and is looking ahead, but I worry that Denmark will develop too quickly and lose its charm. Plans to create more commercial areas in Mitchell and Brazier Sts will have an impact on the feel of the town and

encourage faster development. I believe that development is given a higher priority than preservation of the natural environment, and that needs to change. Denmark is the one place in WA that hasn't made too many mistakes (yet) regarding over development, but it could without careful planning. The bush area opposite the golf course in Beveridge St needs to be made into a class A reserve, as do remaining areas of bush in town. I feel though that the Council is aware of some of these issues and we have a wonderful CEO who appreciates the natural environment, as do many of our councillors. Overall, I think the council is doing a very good job.

- Well.
- Too many meetings for the Councillors! Not sure if meeting costs involved in attending meetings and other work e.g. long-distance travelling for SCMG are reimbursed. If not, they should be! Those of our Councillors who contribute so much time and effort should not be out of pocket. Pity that some Councillors seem to have made several Directors of planning so frustrated that they resigned! The Council could try lobbying WALGA to work to change the power of DPI and WAPC to govern what can be done in our Shire! Planning I think the Council does not have a clear vision of what the Shire will be like in the future hence the 6 years (or more) to complete the LPS. It is attempting to put right the planning errors made in the past.
- Council has a difficult job planning for the future because of the diversity of the population. Youth have very little to do + getting public transport going to Albany would open up opportunities for them. Seniors needs for access to hydrotherapy. Medical care + activities also need to be addressed. Creating a tourism town, where families come to cycle all over, to play in a nature playground, to reconnect with environment is I think what sets Denmark apart. People often tell me there is nothing to do in Denmark. Why not create Denmark as the town for young families to visit by having activities which draw people. e.g. nature playground (e.g. old hospital site) natural pool at Ocean Beach section off part of beach with paddle pool. Cycle paths and cycle parking spots in CBD. Make up adventure maps for families to explore Denmark By foot for 30 mins, 1 hr, 2 hrs by bike for 30 mins, 1 hr, 1/2 day, day by car for 1 hr, morning, both in township + outer areas. By canoe for 1/2 hr, 1 hr, etc. e.g. beach adventure, forest adventure, river adventure, summer adventure, winter adventure.
- Except for the apparent neglect of the condition of the Wilson Inlet I feel the council does a good job.
- Places don't have to be big and developed to be beautiful this will cost us all more in the long run. Remember if you take away the flora in your busy attempts to develop this place, biodiversity and forna will not be sustained we all need biodiversity to keep Denmark healthy and most of us happy. Big development means big infrastructure it doesn't stop at the development. Roads & fire tracks, more roads to access areas in case of emergency. Bigger schools, hospitals (doctors, nurses etc). Poison point should be left as a sacred site there should be records of this at the Perth museum. This would also be a good tourism site. We all should be proud of this heritage not tearing it down.
- Council is generally doing a good job currently, but I would like to see more cycle ways included in future planning.
- The Shire Council appears to be doing a great job, but there is no reason that it should not strive to be the best Shire in the state.
- Generally you are doing an excellent job. Would still like to see a bitumen road to Lights & Conspicuous Cliff. These are top spots. I have been a ratepayer for over 50 years & my family since probably 1913, when my grandmother lived & taught here. I have loved Denmark for its rural atmosphere, since coming for holidays in the early 1930's and continuing nearly every year since. It is selfish to enjoy it so & not want everyone to come here. I know it must change, but I don't want it to change. Please try to keep it as it is.
- Reasonably well, although roads need more attention. In particular the Tindale / Nornalup Rd upgrade needs addressing. This is a major access road for the west portion of the shire and should be prioritised accordingly, both for business and tourism development as well as the expansion of the population westward to Peaceful Bay and Nornalup. It shortens the distance to Perth and Kojonup and the Frankland wine region considerably.
- Unfortunately much of the planning of poor standard occurred before this council was elected. E.g. proposed new Denmark co-op site. Future CEO's & Shire President must not have a conflict of interest. E.g. Shire ex-president head of a real estate business. More roads need to be sealed because of increase in tourism e.g. Glenrowan road. Stricter controls of clearing of bush. Follow-up action needed. More money given to fighting/controlling of weeds in parks & reserves.
- I am not a full time resident (yet) and am not familiar enough with council planning.
- Don't know of plans. Council seems distracted by now-essential issues.
- Overall, I think councillors do the best they can with the information they have, and they have Denmark's interests as their priority.
- Knee jerk responses mainly. Parking is becoming desperate without apparent solutions. First step is to reclaim the land occupied by Infant Health and Craft. Who is to be entrusted with a planning matter of such magnitude? Is the community to contribute a range of ideas and the Councillors add their views to produce a future plan which may

or may not have merit? Better perhaps as a first step to enlist the aid of a Uni Planning Department which might willingly welcome such a challenge.

- There are too many fractions within the council all pushing their own agenda. Be it the redevelopment of the golf club reserve the monstrosity of Strickland Street the r- development of the new Co op site. Unless we get a more unified approach we will always be two steps behind those Councils that are organised and functioning for their community
- I think the council has done well over the past year in meeting the needs of the shire, especially in the aspect of walk/cycle paths and ramps for people with disabilities. however the cycle paths would improve with the reinforcement of law and making sure people are walking and riding on the path rather than unsafely on the road which I encounter regularly
- I think it is doing quite well, I feel that Dale Stewart is a good CEO and I am pleased with the council's agenda to involve and listen to the community in decision making. I would like to see less rural acreage being rezoned for residential R20/R10 subdivision as I feel there is enough land already opened up awaiting development.
- We chose Denmark "as it is" to retire "as it is" is selfish to expect it to remain "as it is" needs careful control and available maintenance to retain. Any expansions should be based on the requirements of rate payer's not commercial interests. The return of a green waste collection would enhance the overall pleasure of living in Denmark.
- For the immediate future. I believe a bus service (even weekly) to Albany would be of the most benefit to the ageing population. I know of a retiree who for medical reasons cannot drive and has no means of getting to Albany to visit a loved one (severe stroke) in hospital. This causes stress and frustration in an ongoing way. At minimal cost I know this could become a feasible reality... Much more productive and welcome than any proposed swimming pool.
- From what I have experienced: Well done!
- O.K.
- Denmark is currently a pleasant country town in a beautiful natural environment. Council should focus on retaining this character NOT developing the town for the benefit of tourists. Eg1: Why spend a lot of money on upgrading Scotsdale Rd into a 4 lane race track? Eg2: Council should not have built info. Centre for visitors based around a huge (& ugly) barometer.
- Adequately! Not all good, not all bad!
- OK at present. Strict controls need to be placed on residential housing developments. The town must NOT be allowed to become a second Margaret River. Rather than developing the town site and its surrounds, development of other towns along the coast e.g. Nornalup, Walpole should be supported but again development needs to be well controlled and in keeping with the area.
- There seems to be a lack of facilities for children of working parents for after school and holiday care. The Recreation Centre school holiday program is very expensive when you need to utilise it for two school age children and a lot of the time they cancel the programs due to lack of interest. I believe if the rates were lowered slightly there may be more people utilising this facility. It is a great program but too expensive. Council seem to focus on the aged and youths 12 and above but not children. There is no after school care facility. Where can the children go of parents who both have to work and this day and age it seems both parents in families are working?
- Setting short and long goals/vision for the shire as is evidenced in this survey is a great start.
- I don't know. I assume the Council has an overall plan for the Shire, but I haven't seen it. The way that engineering works are carried out leads me to doubt that there is any concept of planning and project management in that department. There certainly is little, if any, stakeholder consultation. On the other hand, I was fortunate enough to be involved in reviewing the plans for controlled burns. At last! Someone who understands planning and stakeholder involvement. What a shame it's not infectious.
- We believe that upgrading of the waste facility is needed the facility requires more compactors and proper recycling of glass. We are appalled at the condition of some of the roads in the district especially the ones that are used by heavy trucks. Even when they are repaired or upgraded the condition of the road sometimes is worse than before it was repaired. Are the correct people repairing the roads?
- Generally seems to be OK, but don't expand too much. Update basic services for what is already here water, sewerage, power, etc. Don't keep approving subdivisions too many now.
- I believe that the council is currently doing a reasonably good job when trying to balance the needs of a very diverse population and a large number of interest groups. I believe that parking in the CBD is a problem, but only during several very busy periods in the year. I don't think that moving buildings is necessary perhaps look at developing more parking spaces in areas close to the CBD, such as the old hospital?
- We would like, and hope that the Council and future Councils have the present residents and future residents of Denmark's interests at heart, and not their own.

- There are so many blocks and developments for sale in Denmark, many of them have been on the market for years and haven't sold yet. I suggest the Council considers slowing down further development, especially where existing bush areas are concerned. There are some pieces of land already partway through the process of development that appear to be surplus to what is needed at present. There seems to be a lack of affordable accommodation for singles in Denmark. In view of that I'd like to encourage council not only to make it legal to rent out small selfcontained units ("granny flats") but to encourage home owners to provide self-contained units for that purpose.
- More planning is needed in sustainability and climate change issues. Land management, waste and recycling are very important issues for the future.
- Inlet Drive Industrial Site. Allowing a light industrial site adjacent to a stream which enters the inlet & a swamp which also drains into the inlet at the gazebo site is a danger to the health of the inlet. The site has garden supply bulk holding and service of diesel motors. Which if inundated by water will cause problems for the environment. Who will be responsible for this?
- Doing quite well at present water and power is still a problem.
- Too focused on growth for my liking try quality over quantity real estate agents should not be allowed on council.
- Denmark is a beautiful place to live and Council is doing a good job of maintaining the atmosphere with no apparent major problems. I hope we don't go the way of Margaret River into city type subdivisions.
- Overall I would say that Council is managing and providing adequate service. I have some concern at the way in which certain lobby groups are attempting to influence the council and to follow a politically alarmist trend which is not in the best interest of progress.
- This is too broad. There are many aspects of the Council's work that are not apparent. I expect that you get more feedback on a case by case basis. One area I would like to see more emphasis on is the acquisition of art works and their installation in public buildings. In fact our public buildings should be art works in their own right, not pseudo gulag towers. Raise the standard; don't buy on the cheap, go for quality and style. Plan for the long-term.
- Basically doing a good job I appreciate all their efforts but please do some protective burning before wild fires consume us as examples in other areas all over Australia
- Satisfactorily so far, but the council needs to listen more to what the residents of Denmark want in the way of planning for the future. Council must also apply environmental and sustainable conditions to all their plans for the present and future.
- Overall, I would like to see the Shire more proactive in maintaining high standards in housing developments, including factoring in resilience for the community, energy use, local food production, transport and surrounding natural environment including waterways.
- Happy with much of the planning such as the beautiful street scaping on Strickland street, parklands, festivals, conservation etc. However I am concerned about large beautiful parcels of land and irreplaceable fertile farmlands being chopped up into residential blocks, when there are so many complementary alternatives that could be used as residential locations. I also see many of the smaller Denmark residential blocks being subdivided. This is of concern. Is this happening for future planning or for income?
- In summer it is obvious that the traffic danger point is the intersection of Strickland and South Coast Highway, when cars on opposite sides are doing right hand turns into the Highway. My first preference would be a roundabout. Failing that, making Strickland Street a no through road (on the Bibbulmun side) so there is not a 4-way intersection.
- Council not looking ahead enough. Shire not putting enough effort into road development. No walk paths and cycle paths being included within subdivisions or provided in older subdivisions. Light and heavy industrial development would be more sensible and accessible on Kernutts Rd Motorbike track could be also be located in this area.
- I believe any more subdivision would hurt Denmark. Half the town seems to be up for sale. Luckily no one is buying as we definitely do not have the infrastructure to cope with any more people. WE need to also think of planning for a second primary school or putting land aside for it. Maybe on land zoned for another subdivision!! We need 2 supermarkets. Bob Cybula should remain in his IGA and let a second be run by someone else. Shire should have a say in this matter. We need to ease congestion in the main shopping precinct but not completely by closing down IGA. I think his decision is based purely on greed. We should celebrate each of the 4 seasons in Denmark as each season is unique Great Tourist Attraction we need to discuss a shelter for the homeless. I have only recently been made aware of this and think this should be our number 1 priority.
- Council should open the inlet each year as the state of the inlet is disgusting and embarrassing to Denmark Council should decrease Shire rates for what I pay for is my bins to get emptied Council should set up a recreational swimming pool Council should ban tourists and their caravans from driving and parking in Strickland St and the side surrounding streets Council should allow a Coles or Woolworths in town. Why should "Bob Cybula" have the monopoly of this town?

- Roads should be a priority. Too much dust and corrugations on heavily used gravel roads (e.g. Mt Lindesay Rd) Scotsdale Rd too narrow in places especially when large trucks are using it. Road safety should also have been considered in Strickland St regarding the angled parking. Unless you are next to an empty bay you cannot see oncoming traffic. Reversing out slowly does not solve the problem.
- Pretty well
- Seems to be having trouble coping with the rapid growth of the town in terms of services and facilities.
- The present Council seems to be more forward thinking and has made some great developments as in Strickland St.
- Low Profile from our point of view so are not too sure. Developments such as Springdale Beach & Walnut Grove should not be allowed. The Council should manage their tree resources in a professional manner so that maximum benefit can be achieved for the residents of Denmark. After all the trees are one of the biggest assets that Denmark has to offer.
- Re: Concept on page 3. Before any more residential development of any sort over 55's or otherwise, Council should be planning for the older generation over 65's, 75's, 85's Our hospital cannot cope even now with the number of people needing permanent care or normal hospital care. The Town is in need of a larger permanent Care Facility. Overall I think Council is planning for the town of Denmark, now that the centre of town has been prettied up, surely some of our country roads need an overhaul. I have been driving on the Mt Lindesay regularly since 1970. It did have a couple of improvements in the 70's & 80's, widened from the goats tracks it was then. But it has been graded and graded and more potholes show up and nothing is put back into the bed of the road. This is a busy road & short cuts for trucks going through from beyond Denmark to Mt Barker. Surely it should be sealed at least through to Churchill Road. It is also the road through to the Mt Lindesay Walk. (A tourist attraction).
- This survey is a step in the right direction.
- Tourism should be encouraged by providing more cafes, more parking, visitor centre is ugly and in wrong place, town should be prettified summer time, and tourists encourage to stop and not drive onto Walpole or Albany. More rubbish collecting during peak times take a leaf out of Rockingham Shire that beach and area is always clean! Stop subdivisions we don't want any more curbs or to become a Margaret River lookalike we should stay unique. Park around hospital should be suitable for picnics & made into a beautiful area! Old hospital should be art & cafe area we should use the talents of our artists we have in our community and make Denmark the best art-winery area! Be the first and make Denmark plastic bag free!
- I think there is a good balance of skills / background / concerns amongst Denmark Councillors. However, I do not believe that economic and tourist development should ever be prioritised over community requirements or environmental sustainability. (for example, Mitchell St should remain residential, as the primary School is located there) Denmark is a wonderful community with a special history and a unique natural environment. I think that these assets should be of primary concern in any decision making concerning future development of infrastructure and town planning.
- This method of obtaining views regarding decisions to be taken by Council that will affect the everyday lives of Denmark residents should be used more often. The impression is that minority groups and vested interests have more influence over Council decisions than do the ratepayers as a group or the residents as a group. Although ideas that mesh with the changing times ant the changing climate/environment abound in Denmark there appears to be an intention to stymie attempts to carry such ideas to fruition, thus giving residents a feeling of insecurity where important issues are concerned. The Council has a duty to govern and to carry out decision making activities with the best interests of all residents in mind. The residents of Denmark are entitled to feel confident that the Council puts their best interests before all other concerns in every instance that relates to the welfare of the town and its residents all residents. I believe the Council is beginning to be aware of the need for the confidence of all residents in their decision makings as well as planning and that the residents are looking forward to Council recognition of the changing times and changing needs of the town population as a whole.
- I do feel Council is doing a good job overall. However, they do stall to easily after things are actually passed, and allow a lot of argument within the town about issues, e.g. wind farm, poison point fishing platform, barometer etc.
- There needs to be a balance for all age groups especially the young if there are many activities for them they will b occupied and keep out of trouble (hopefully) there seems to be a very good mix of young people activities and this should keep going. However the ageing population needs immediate and future planning. 1 heated hydro pool (and swimming pool- coastal towns smaller than Denmark have pools. 2 disabled parking bays there has to be property signage 3 More support to keep people in their homes
- Seem to be doing okay.
- I think there is a lack of commitment to retaining village atmosphere with current buildings. E.g. IGA, new supermarket (when built) and future concepts.

- I do think we need to be very careful how we develop Denmark. The far end of Strickland St is underutilized. the land on the corner of Brazier St that is used for parking on Market days could be could be developed into a car park which would ensure easy access to that end of town promote Denmark as a green park and walk town! Many shops in town are vacant They need to be filled before further shopping areas are developed. A vacant IGA space is not a happy thought, serious consideration of how this could be used sympathetically is important. Denmark town site should be discouraged from spreading (physically) too far. Most people who have come here have come for the lifestyle we offer. We don't want a big town.
- Councils are only as good as the elected personnel. Denmark has a lot of outstanding attractions, but personal opinions sometimes halt progress and this is sometimes seen as a fracture unit. While we wish to view progress with the 180 degree vision, the Shire needs to look out of box to the future, e.g. Town house development at golf club for instance. Take advantage of its natural beauty and showcase to others, not to hope that "nice to have, but better not let anyone else see" I do see advantage of having a "professional" councillor with issues surrounding town planning, environment, social issues etc, the normal elected councillor does not have the capability to comprehend all issues
- Pretty poorly. Council has its fingers in so many pies it does not do justice to any and seems to be working for vested interest groups (arts, sports, chamber of commerce, real estate agents). I see Denmark as a tourist and retirement town; I think there needs to be more attention given to roads & road maintenance, that's how people get to see the natural beauty around here. Picnic spots & bins, at them if you visit here you don't want to sit inside or in someone else's rubbish. Foot/cycle paths. So many visitors + locals walk/jog/cycle on main roads; it is an accident waiting to happen. We are an aging population we don't need to use "Zimmer" frames on roads but on paths! Lastly, slow down the traffic on south coast hwy after the bridge (esp. trucks). Hundreds of people cross this hwy every day ignore the shop keepers + slow down that traffic for the rest of us + our visitors. Fire is a big issue where are all those strategic fire breaks.
- Too much commercial and property development bias in council is not healthy to the town's/Shire's long term community development.
- There is a very strong need for a roundabout at the intersection of Strickland St + South Coast Highway. Traffic coming down the hill needs to be slowed down + the flow would improve getting across the highway to IGA area. The non angle parking in Strickland St opposite IGA is a very bad choice. It should be angle parking. When backing out small cars can't see what is coming up the road if they are parked next to a 4WD, large vehicles can't back out without going over the white line to then go forward. Please re-do to angle parking! It makes much more sense. People and drivers are confused about the use of the new large paved area in Strickland St. Is it a cross walk? If so it needs signage.
- Okay.
- Generally speaking I think council is catering for needs and future planning in a systematic and competent manner. I appreciate the opportunity to comment and think the survey should be increased to about half of the population but am not sure of the logistics of this. Sometimes you can have too much interaction!! I find that the survey is discriminatory in that the persons who reply online receive the chance of a higher value prize compared to a posted survey return. Unfair!! Your really need to look into aged care with some priority because of the ageing population and that fact that retirees/seniors are a large demographic in the Denmark population. I like the emphasis on environmental consideration and issues as this is a special/blessed environment in which to live. Your gardener and his staff require special commendation for their efforts in beautifying the town site. It is a feast for one's eyes. Keep up the good work. It would be good to know what population growth you are catering for at this stage. I would like to know where the big trucks with trailers that speed up and down Ocean Beach Rd are coming and going from and to.
- I believe there should be more done towards welfare of the old and the needy before tourism needs. Tourism is not a growing industry, figures are continually down and the seasonal aspect of the town sees the end of so many businesses and the failure of new ones to start for fear of loss. The town needs permanent industry to support the population all year. Job security does not exist in this town.
- Seek professional advice on issues and listen to it. CEO's don't know everything. Focus on consolidating the town centre and not just expanding in all directions. Don't be afraid of development but influence it in a positive manner. Define the town's character and work out ways to continually enhance it not just develop, build, approve random applications.
- I congratulate council on providing this questionnaire for public comment. It demonstrates an open-mind on the current issues and a chance for the public to look ahead. More information would be useful on how Council's thinking is headed i.e. how might "Tourism... be further developed and diversified in the shire?"
- Not very well. Denmark water supply poor. Roads need upgrading average. Power supply very poor.

- It is disturbing to see the extent of approvals given to new developments people move and visit Denmark because they like what is here. We do not want to encourage developments to the extent that the town and its environs are changed beyond recognition. It is inappropriate for people involved in real estate / development projects to serve on council. I also feel it is inappropriate for Councillors to represent their personal views on important issues rather than reflecting the wishes of the ratepayers who voted them on to council.
- Something else needs to be done Strickland and South Coast Highway dangerous. South Coast Highway and Holland near bridge. Small roundabout maybe lights here. South coast highway and Strickland is dangerous traffic rules are not needed. How come a pool is not mentioned in this survey = either a hydrotherapy pool + public heated pool is essential for the health + mobility + fitness of aged + injured residents. Access to a pool for swimming lessons and water safety will compliment the surf life saving club. Water in William Bay and Ocean Beach is too cold access is impossible to these areas for disabled people. Loose bricks and holes in paths need to be fixed (outside den-bakery). Regular maintenance is essential falls are devastation to disabled people, can lead to loss of life and limbs.
- A flying fox would be a good idea at William Bay for the aged, disabled to be able to use as it allows more access for the disabled and elderly.
- Poison Point I agree with wheelchair access in places where it is possible, but Poison Point is not the place, surely there could be another option. I think Council is planning reasonably well for the current & future needs.
- Council seems to be doing a reasonable job. Two issues it will need to consider more seriously in future however will be the adverse impact on the character of Denmark resulting from increased population and inappropriate commercial and industrial development.
- Current and future planning seems ok. Perhaps more special rural subdivision could be made available. E.g. farming areas that are not needed. One farming practice could be subdivided off these areas could range size up to 20 hectares.
- Issues. 1. A) is council local democracy or the local representative of dept of local gov. I favour common sense, diversity and communities with character (as instinct from tourist appeal)... effective representing and opportunity for consultation is essential. b) my concern is the intrusiveness of outside interests. (such as Denmark WILL become a community by 10000 by, (date) and be a dormitory for Albany) Professional officers are bound by state local government acts. We pay (salaries) but put up with the disadvantage of "one size fits all" approach that severely limits local input too points: The CEO is in too powerful a position... more master than servant, and; covert arrangements are too easy resulting some citizens being more equal than others (such as the Wentworth dam fiasco). These comments go to power and paranoia. Understand: they are not imputations about the current council (but do reflect scuttle but that is always with us... we could do without it!) Consider new streetscape/parking. 2.) We are deluged with openness by way of reports... access is an issue if the information isn't timely and written for a less sophisticated audience. The web site is preferable to the paper-war. But is not offering easy access. 3.) Parking (a) people will need to talk further but; (b) they need parking outside the street locality defined by the CBD. (map drawn on survey)
- There is a big problem at the intersection of South Coast Hwy & Hollings Rd / Strickland St, maybe a round-about needs to go there.
- Council plays up to whoever says loudest "they believe" e.g. the alternatives and their so called weather pattern needs. Yes we need some help but for everybody, not just a few who talk loudest. The councillors each have a view and want all to join them.
- Surveys such as these are good and from what we read in the Denmark Bulletin you appear to be doing a reasonable job.
- In a haphazard manner.
- Not been here long enough to comment.
- The council is very slow to do things. There have too many random subdivisons, the street upgrade has lessened parking
- I believe that the Council has lost sight of the community needs and is concentrating too much on development. E.g.: The provision of a Swimming Pool with competition lanes for learner as well as keen swimmers. The lack of this facility puts our children at a severe disadvantage for access to what is Australia's major sport at the International games. Further, a heated hydrotherapy centre could be included for all rehabilitation patients, particularly the elderly, (>30% of Denmark's population). The council's role is to provide community services, not to make a profit. Lots of lovely new development is very nice, but give some thought of the rural & semi rural residents, Mt Shadforth Rd has been partly bitumised for over 20 years. Funds were allocated for completion during the bicentenary "funds for roads" Commonwealth Grants. The only change at Mt Shadforth Rd was a large sign that was eventually removed with no change to the road surfaces. The number of ratepayers in the Shadforth Ward

is increasing rapidly, but there is little or no improvement in road access. When will Council provide this improvement?

- Council are doing a good job.
- Council's performance could be improved. Council's decisions need to be better researched. Council needs to better explain the reasons for the decisions it makes. Councillor's need to respond to the needs of the community. Future rate increases need to be minimized.
- Existing local sporting clubs are poorly supported, advertised. I.e. Denmark Pistol Club, Clay Target Club, Motocross Club.
- At times it does seem to spend money on iffy projects like Strickland St when a road to boat harbour bogs vehicles in both summer & winter Boat Harbour a strange name when you can't even get a boat near it. Overdoing growth on road sides with kangaroos a big problem in some areas beats me. The quality of some field work questionable, like Peaceful Bay drains dug way below culvert levels. Putting sewerage discharge unit in such a silly place and pathways laid with thinking done after. Denmark and Shire's outer areas are generally in good order but this beautiful area needs a lot of thinking done before hand. As far as I'm concerned it's not always done, engineer a prime example. You should never be hesitant about seeking local knowledge.
- They seem to have addressed most issues that I was aware of.
- Overall good however leaned involvement in the health, welfare and tourist attraction of its multi \$ drained "Wilson Inlet" is lacking. Leaving it what appears, to the Hackers + Rivers v Outside bureaucrats has got nowhere over the years and new ideas and concerned involvement are required for pushing of inlet to achieve at least of that similar to the conduction of Walpole inlet. Council needs to lift its game in this area.
- I feel the council is pushing Denmark away from its uniqueness to something like every other developed tourist town or even worse another suburb of Perth. I also think council should not allow anymore land to be opened for development until all land already available is fully utilised. As our council chosen by the people and paid by the people are our hope in control of our towns growth with suitable care given to its uniqueness, not the developments and estate agents who have no interest in our history or beautiful surroundings. Which are gradually being whittled away. The very thing that attracted tourism in the first place. The majority of beaches etc have been developed to exclude wheelchair access or even comfortable viewing for the disabled.
- Denmark is the jewel in the crown of not only the South West of WA. But also coastal towns around Australia due to the combination of our natural environment of our forests, mountains, rivers, inlet, beaches and coastal scenery. The town itself has a natural feel of small country town magic that still maintains its basis heritage along with a feeling of casual relaxation. These are just some of the special qualities that bring people to Denmark and hordes of tourists to our town in the holiday seasons. There are currently more than enough subdivisions approved to sustain Denmark for the next decade! Please keep a lid on any further development destruction to our town! A typical example was the rampant destruction up in Smith St! What a disgrace! Margaret River and Dunsborough have already been totally ruined through over development. Please do not allow this to occur to our unique and magical Denmark! Remember, once it has gone, it is lost forever!
- Any development over and above current plans should not be entertained urban. However Bow Bridge development as contained in the 1999 Rural Settlement Strategy should be pursued. In addition pockets of development such as "Airport Estate" and Lapko Rd Settlement need progressing to sustain Shire revenue
- Overall, yes. I feel getting more community involvement in key decisions of sustainability climate change awareness + development proposals. (Would help even if it was via small groups/already established to save council time + money).
- As I rarely attend meetings I do not have a firm opinion by my impression is that Council works very hard on our behalf.
- Council does not contribute to the needs of ratepayers outside town boundary. I.e. too far for nurses visits, no transport, no easy access for shopping i.e. Dewsons.
- BAD.
- Care should be taken in decision regarding new, large shopping facilities. Already there appear to be excessive competition which disadvantages the smaller shops that have provided long term and loyal service to this community. As you are aware this is a small, diverse community with occasional increased numbers form tourists at varying periods in the year. Long term forecast regarding population growth etc are fraught with errors and should be treated with a great deal of caution e.g. Hopetoun when mine closed. THINK SMALL.
- Need to address safety issues 1.Heavy fully laden timber trucks/trailers accessing CBD streets. 2. Black spot on highway where trucks on 2 recent occasions have rolled over. b. Address preserving the 'character' of Denmark for the future - preserving old buildings + keeping green spaces - important for tourism + locals. c) Address number of sub-divisions and consider encouraging eco-friendly buildings - self sufficient designs. Denmark could lead the way

on many environmentally friendly housing for the future. d) Proceed with wind farm ASAP e) Swimming pool for health + fitness - all ages + teaching kids to swim, therapy for oldies. f) Explore possible bus service to Albany.

- I see the planning leaving a lot to be desired. We ratepayers pay professional staff to advise our Councillor's, often their recommendations are ignored and issues passed that do nothing for Denmark for now and the future. If the reasons for voting against the officers were well thought through and their reasons given for against the recommendations sensible, I'd feel much happier. Is this reflected in the change of staff we've had over the last few years? Please openness & honesty.
- I think council has lost it way in cultural and values. Why! Denmark full of selfish people who think of themselves not the town.

# (C) COMMUNITY CONSULTATION AND ACCESS TO INFORMATION

A number of avenues are used to promote community awareness of Council decisions and long term planning.

Indications, by numbering 1 to 3 (1 being the preferred preference) were asked for, as respondents' preferred method/s for the dissemination of Council information.

Not being a member of PA I am never informed or consulted re Council business in Peaceful Bay.
- 2 -- ABC national radio
- Currently very difficult to find information supposedly on the website. Calls to Council have consistently been met with 'it hasn't been uploaded yet' or 'I can't find it myself very poor form!
- Notice boards around town although a bit tacky are I think looked at by another range of people that might otherwise not come across topics, so potentially and avenue like these could be useful
- A return to mailbox distribution of the Denmark Bulletin would be a huge plus, even if it meant some sort of Council subsidy. At the moment, people simply aren't getting to read things as they used to. As someone who contributes a regular column, I've been disappointed at the lack of readers who've seen the issues.

- The website can contain all minutes of meetings, plans, current issues. It isn't sustainable to have someone constantly sending sms etc. People also have a responsibility to inform themselves and be active in the issues that they are concerned about
- Not everybody has access to a computer and paper generated communication is expensive therefore more council meeting reporting should be in The Bulletin as this available to all free of charge to ratepayers.
- Of course this is dependent on the importance of the issue. There would definitely be the need for public meetings on occasion. I am unsure which of the Albany papers is free but that would be the one to use.
- A local community radio station set up in the new CRC offices when they move to the old hospital site would be great! \$2000 has already been donated by the Denmark Community Foundation Inc. (WA) previously, the Denmark Community's Future Fund (an initiative of the Healthy Community Project) towards this eventuating in the near future and as yet hasn't heard of any progress.
- Yes, definitely need to communicate with the community as I mentioned earlier
- A general bulletin board placed in a prominent position in town.
- Council website can contain/combine minutes/newsletters/results of public meetings.
- Too much emphasis on electronic communication. Need more accessible documentation for older and nonelectronic residents.
- As we live out of town we do not receive Denmark Bulletin, Weekender nor Albany Extra. We do not have internet access so all associated sources are not accessible nor do we have mobile coverage. So no txt messages. Aust. Post is the only reliable means for us.
- It would be interesting to find out how many homes have access to computers, as I don't. If I did it would probably influence my decision to some degree.
- Selected Denmark Bulletin for choices 1 & 2
- Papers are no longer delivered to outlying areas and not always in town to pick them up. Since they aren't worth paying for we seldom bother. So a good council website makes it easier to access any information at any time.
- The promotion of community awareness of Council decisions and long term planning should be kept at a local level with reference to relevant links/sites for the detail. Those people interested in Council activities will make the time and effort to look up the sources. The Albany papers are too broad a range and social media may be good for younger people but most Denmarkians wouldn't refer to this type of media for business type topics.
- The Denmark Bulletin is no longer delivered to all residents. Although it is available free of charge I am sure that many do not pick it up every fortnight. I would like to see it delivered to all homes (especially rate payers) unless otherwise indicated on their letterbox. I know that I always read it cover to cover and it would be a great way of alerting people to what is happening in Denmark and what Council is doing.
- Council conversations etc is included in the Denmark Bulletin. The Bulletin is the prime source of all community activity and it should be strongly supported by Council.
- Mind you I am computer illiterate.
- Council Conversations Mailed out to owners home address.
- I am sorry and appreciate Councillors and staffs efforts but this is the reason I left a career in a Town Clerks Dept. for a career in Commercial Construction having qualified in UK and WA as a builder. I learnt quickly if you wanted to work on large projects "you'd better be good" at both taking it and dishing it. No Development takes place unless there is a dollar, a quid or xx? In it. Money is the thing that drives building a conscience keeps you honest as well as not having to be embarrassed at what you have been involved in. The easiest answer to most questions is "Yes" the hardest a shorter word "No".
- 1 is top 3 is bottom Face book is inappropriate for government to use. It can be seen as non-professional, although a large number of businesses are using this form of advertising for its registered customers. Local government doesn't require this though, as everyone gets and reads the Bulletin, and has access to the website if required. I can't see how You Tube is relevant. And, Twitter doesn't have any real relevance to modern day government. Emailed newsletters would just be viewed as junk mail. No one reads the minutes. Public meetings are a waste of time unless absolutely needed when the town is at loggerheads. The Albany newspapers would be numbers 4 to 6 for my choice.
- The Council website should be better promoted. I didn't know that there was one.
- The bulletin is no longer delivered to addresses out of town. Therefore it's harder to get it regularly. This is a problem for some out of towners.
- This page should have been devoted to "new ideas" to put Denmark on the tourist map. So many rely on the influx of tourists to stay in business. "The council" needs to stop promoting ITSELF and get on with being the heart beat of the community. Denmark needs an annual agriculture fair during holiday time (not a "show"), something everyone

can participate in together. A swim through, kayaks racing, log chopping, talent quest, pioneer dress up day competitions. Daily music from business! Brighten up the town.

- My husband and I read the Bulletin from cover to cover, and so do a lot of our friends, it is undoubtedly the best way to convey council news. I also read the free Albany papers. I am keen to attend public meetings but am ignorant as to how to go about it.
- I would like individual councilor's contact their constituents on a random basis just to pass on information concerning council business that might affect his or her electors.
- Remember the elderly don't know how to use or have access to internet.
- These are my easiest and preferred methods.
- The Denmark Shire Councils Newsletter Council Conversations, needs to be delivered to all rate payers and residents of the shire regularly. Since the Denmark Bulletin is no longer delivered to through the post, the council news letter needs to be posted to everyone concerned.
- The Co-op corner window would be a great place to have a public notice board briefly promoting community issues relating to Council decisions and long-term planning.
- There will be times when a letter to householder is necessary such as with major policy changes.
- Information in all of the above three has improved enormously over the past few years.
- These papers are still free and are delivered into our letter boxes.
- None of the 4 newspapers listed are distributed outside the town area, therefore other means that can be accessed more readily, need to be implemented. As no one means will cover everyone, Email and local newspaper combination is probably the best mix.
- (Carters real estate always sends us the bulletin we appreciate this and read it, when we get them) we would appreciate receiving council conversations.
- A regular email would be a good idea.
- Council Conversations is part of the Bulletin.
- It would be useful + informative for absentee owners to be sent the Denmark Bulletin free of charge as to help with local issues. Since absentee owners do not use many of the services which the locals do, but pay the same rates this would be fair.
- I assume that 1= strongly agree and 3= disagree??
- I think we are well served as long as the sharing of Council information is reliable and regular, it is there for all of us.
- If the newsletter like the bulletin is not posted out it would fail to reach many community members.
- Council should encourage more participation in public meetings which will happen if residents are confident that their concerns will be heard, evaluated and permitted to seriously influence Council planning and decisions. Public meetings that act as window-dressing cause loss of confidence and loss of attendance at meetings.

- What is present is well done. Needs more. Encourage more people to get out of their car.
- Further work is required on the Mokare Heritage Trail from the Bowling Club to the footbridge so that it can be used all year round. 2. Pathways in the Community Park need to be repaired and maintained. 3. It would be good to have 'Doggy Doo' bags as provided in Annie Harrison Park near the public toilets in Norm Thornton Park.
- Consideration should be given for warnings/signage along Inlet Drive for new walk trail. Many dangerous crossings as paths lead to bends with poor sight lines.
- A new footbridge at the end of Riverbend Lane where the old East River Road Bridge was would be a great addition to the current walk trail along the river.
- Need a roundabout at the corner of Hollings Road and South Coast Highway

- Foot paths to schools Golden Hill Steiner School has no safe passage for children to ride from town to their school ground. They desperately need a cycle path/walk path
- I believe most services are satisfactory with just the occasional need for upgrades which is common of any small town, but one that is growing so rapidly through tourism should put a bit more effort into its appearance, only because for lots of small businesses the tourists are there bread and butter and need to be coming to town
- As I don't live in the centre I can't comment on these issues.
- More benches and ramps for wheelchair access at tourism spots.
- With respect to (h) much better use of local artistic talent could be used here
- Would like to see some permanent art in the streets/paths around town.
- Would love to see further development of trails for horse rides in the shire there are a lot of us and so few trails available
- Get your graders out to these roads and grade them. Farmers pay rates too
- I strongly disagree with the need for street lights. We live in Bracknell Crescent with a street light outside our property and consequently we never have complete dark I would love for it to be turned off it is not necessary.
- Streetlight solutions should focus on solar lighting where possible.
- Lights Beach paving required to road and car park including speed humps or kerbs to control hoons.
- f) (On a full moon!)
- Many of these things are tastefully improving to suit the community's needs as well as visitors.
- Given the range and diversity the council provides a good overall service.
- Scotsdale Road only
- Rural roads are somewhere between poor and satisfactory depends when the grader has been around! Road side drains channels are not kept clear so run off often damages the road surface.
- One comment I wish to make is the need for more post boxes be made available around town. At present there is only one post box and that is at the post office.
- All road verges should be made to be clear of bush some corners are a hazard.

- Location between 47 + 57 Ocean Bch Rd. The bridge + storm water creek along Ocean Beach Rd is a disgrace. Always full of rubbish and never cleared. Railing inadequate and dangerous. Needs urgent attention to be safe and effective as well as visually pleasant.
- Denmark needs more rubbish bins and emphasis on re-cycling in the CBD (i.e. multiple bins for different waste streams).
- When we come to Denmark it's usually a pleasure once we've found a park for the car.
- Some control of horses on paths and bridges re manure.
- Roads in rural areas are well maintained but one wearing out and many need gravel sheeting
- I think that overall there has been a great improvement in roads and paths (indeed many have been constructed in recent years) however of course these need to be regularly ungraded and maintained. Do not believe in so much lighting especially in rural sub divisions it is a waste of power and also quite unsightly and detracts from the feeling of privacy. I even question whether it is necessary as a security measure. The high school is lit at night but surely if it was in darkness then an intruder would need a torch and you would know someone was there! As it is nobody knows they are there and they have lighting for their activities. I think there are a satisfactory number of benches and bins and particularly like the upgrade in the children's playground by the river.
- Please install a footpath bridge at the end of Riverbend Lane; this would then join up with the existing footpath on the East side of the river back to town. Tourists at the caravan park are always asking for walk trails. This would also be good for locals.
- Perhaps more cycle racks required. There are too many disabled car parking slots, but maybe you are complying with statutory requirements.
- There appears to be a very urban focus as town sites have far superior services. Upgrading of rural roads will assist in increasing tourism.
- 1. There needs to be a footpath from Amaroo Village up Hardy Rd to South Coast H'way to assist those with gophers. 2. There needs to be a footpath along Scotsdale Rd, from the beginning of Scotsdale at Mt Shadforth Rd through to the "Glendale" development.
- The last 4-5 years the council has done a great job. Particularly on country roads.
- Inlet Drive is well below standard. Generally roads & paths are improving. Why has the town section of Scotsdale Road not been up graded to the standard of further out?
- Dual use paths need to be constructed in certain areas 1) Town to Rivermouth 2) Rivermouth to Poison Point and through Campbell Rd to Ocean Beach Rd.
- Rubbish bins at sites such as McGeary's rock is justified it is a landmark fishing spot that is regularly covered in discarded cans, bottles, bait bags + newspaper.
- I think all should automatically be 4.
- Money should be allocated to environment issues first!
- Let's keep lights to a minimum. Too many streetlights would force me out of town. Bridges could do with some extra work. Especially the little bridge next to the fire station. More cycle priority paths are needed from outlying residential areas to the CBD. I mean paths marked on the bituminised road pavement. Potholes are quite frequent on rural roads. More grading needs to be done.
- Rural roads especially the unsealed gravel of Shadforth, Redman/Glen Rowan etc are our charm and heritage. Apart from 'gravel warning' signage, these roads should be maintained just as they are.
- For many years, locals and visitors have wanted Mt Shadforth Rd sealed and it is high time it was done.
- The new zodiac walkway in Strickland St needs 1 or 2 crosswalks + improved No Parking signs. Pedestrians + motorists are unsure where to go + who has ROW, obviously pedestrians do, but for elderly people, in particular, there is too much indecision.
- Walk trail Mokare recently improved could continue more work. Efforts of greenskills in advancing trail projects not seemingly supported. No, I don't work with them.

- What is the purpose of developing the park near the hospital? Plant trees and leave it as a rough parkland. Council is in danger of trying to do too much. Do what is currently done and keep up the standard (Berridge & Norm Thornton Parks)
- The CBD development needs reviewing and finishing there are sections that are unfinished.
- Council should be commended for their work in creating creative spaces however input from the arts and design community would have given some of the work a competitive edge as it is, these areas look quite similar to other regional towns such as Busselton where is uniqueness. I believe that it is critical to retain urban bushland in a wild state and not over develop it to try and meet all our needs. As I get older, I realise that I will not be able to access some of these places.
- The level of graffiti is excellent compared with suburbs in Perth. Although the main street is pleasing to the eye, it is very cramped and does not accommodate country vehicles.
- Too much time and money was spent on streetscape. No need for all the paving in centre of road near the chemist. If angle parking was all the way along the side of Strickland Street on the post office side, and curb parking was retained near the library, we would have more parking areas and extra rates could have been used for more important projects in the future.
- I love the bushland but am not sure about the new CBD street scape, its very hippy like.
- CBD streetscape would have much more character if local artistic talent were used.
- Would love to see more art around town.
- CBD Streetscape good but a bit boring... I'd love to see a bit more artistic input. Children, Denmark Arts, etc. A bit too conservative for me. The same holds true for Berridge Park. The playgrounds are all a bit boring and outdated; check out Geraldton and Fremantle for ideas!
- CBD Streetscape is a waste of money. Where is the loading zone?
- Streetscape available curb areas that are grassed could be used to plant native gardens and plant trees and make a boundary for birds and animals along the streets. Trees also lower the temperature of cities more trees please.
- Too much street scaping especially on Strickland St. where that space could well be used for parking.
- Overall the provision of services to the Denmark township is very good, it still retains character, and it would appear that council take that into consideration when planning for the future.
- Urban reserves/surrounding bushland could provide an opportunity to combine fire retardant plants with environmental aspects.
- At the moment. More residents will bring urban problems to the area.
- Would prefer all native gardens in town centre. Although they look great (cottage) they are very expensive with the continuous maintenance!!
- Streetscape sterile & non-user friendly. Deciduous trees and exotic plants not suitable in this country.
- Plants natives to save water.
- Unfortunately Denmark has gone down the brick paved road which has made it almost indistinguishable from hundreds of other towns across the country.
- Would like to see a greater effort placed on architectural/landscaping cohesion. 2) Visitors Centre remains an external visual catastrophe. It is an affront to the beauty of Denmark.
- More play Equipment required.
- Like the work done to Strickland St but unsure why designs in brickwork are zodiac symbols would have thought a more nature based design would have been better suited to Denmark. Wish there was shade over park beside river on Hollings Rd opposite pub.
- Gardens are a credit to the town.
- This summer especially the CBD has been subjected to dogs of all sizes on the streets. The leads can be dangerously, they are unhealthy. Should not be allowed in CBD.
- CBD Streetscape whilst being visually pleasing needs some indication as to rights of vehicles and pedestrians.
- Denmark needs more public art giving a living story of Denmark's life to people who live here, pass through or visiting.
- Nice mix of exotic and native plantings in the current streetscape caters to all tastes! Some hanging baskets in the arcades would add further colour and interest.
- I believe more should be done to eradicate weeds within the Shire, especially Sydney Wattle.
- Too many ugly ramps in Strickland St. Angled parking in Strickland St should be reverse in, it is safer.
- Boat Harbour Reserve is BADLY degraded; I'm urgent need of better management!
- I've never noticed any serious rubbish or graffiti.

- Hospital park land needs to be mowed + whipper snipped etc more regularly so people can use the area. It should look like park near river + hotel so families can picnic etc.
- Is that a pedestrian crossing opposite the chemist?
- Although I believe the town parks and gardens are excellent there are many suckers growing in Berridge Park which should be removed and also the weeds amongst the paperbarks. The CBD streetscape is a little harsh (so much brick paving) but hopefully will soften with growth.
- The lavatories at Berridge Park are not very clean; in the high tourist season they should be cleaned more frequently...I won't take my grandchildren in them.
- I think our town parks and gardens, and CBD streetscapes have never looked better.
- Great garden beds, keep it up!!
- Wonderful to see the town graffiti-free.
- The recent improvements to the CBD are beautiful. They have given the shopping area and town entry such a lift. The gardener is doing a marvellous job.
- Need more play equipment. Something more challenging for primary school children.
- Shire staff should be congratulated on the presentation and selection of plants in the CBD area.
- Paved zodiac crossing in Strickland St needs to be clearly identified as either pedestrian right of way / or cars right of way.
- The CBD streetscape has greatly enhanced the Denmark township, well done!! Lawns and gardens by the bridge and Berridge Park are excellent, a very attractive entrance to the town.
- Shire reserves & road verges are FIRE HAZARDS & are part of a disaster waiting to happen. Roads are supposed to be part of strategic access ways. Gardens are a credit to the team of gardeners.
- Current garden department doing an excellent job.
- I believe Graffiti should be cleaned up by the perpetrator with ice cold water and old sacking.
- Despite continuing weed eradication many areas are no better than many years ago.
- Andrew Brinsden's team do an excellent job of the CBD, however there are many more parks and gardens that need work, including the playground at the end of Parry St. Berridge Park playground could do with more varied play equipment, a non blinding surface in full sunlight, and extensive use of shade sails, like at the Kojonup playground near their Visitor Centre.
- Children's playground in river park could do with a modern "jungle" climbing rope/tower or at least something extra as it is the main entertainment for little kids.
- Would really like to see the Reserve (between Inlet Drive & Ocean Beach Rd, the Industrial area and Earthworks) protected and utilised for walkers, horse riders & cyclists more. Such an asset to Denmark with some important pockets of regulation.

- a) Kerbside Collection

- d) Peaceful Bay Refuse Facility

- We fill our recycling bin within a week regularly and then have to fill our little waste bin which fills too quickly. A solution would be to have 2 bins the same size as the recycling bin. I think we also could do with green waste bins in Weedon hill.
- Councils elsewhere provide free-of-charge replacement wheelie bins. We've been repairing our bashed-up inherited one for over four years. We pay substantially higher rates in Denmark than in Perth, and feel very strongly against having to pay for a replacement bin.
- *Recycling rubbish truck should be every week.*
- Should have a green waste kerbside facility.
- It would be great to know where our waste product ends up and the path it took to get there and what of it now?
- I don't live within the town of Denmark, therefore, I cannot comment.
- Kerbside collection not relevant to greens pool.
- I don't like the fact that my main bin is only small, I understand the push to recycle but sometimes when my bin is full it's a bit of a pain.
- Unaware of town facilities.

- Could have at least an annual roadside collection for garden rubbish and whitegoods etc.
- We would like to see the return of annual rubbish removal of big items from kerb i.e. whitegoods Tip passes are no use if you don't have a trailer.
- If our rubbish doesn't actually get recycled why call the service recycling?
- Excellent waste management service.
- I suspect that those outside kerbside collection area (including me) are getting a raw deal. Kerbside costs about \$5/week for pickup and disposal but taking bin to tip costs \$10. Maybe solved by giving those outside kerbside area say 10 tickets per year on payment of rates.
- Ongoing focus on recycling should be sustained.
- Kerbside collection needs to include greater majority of rate payers. (Your highest rate payers famers).
- I think we could improve on recycling still more kerbside collections for green house items would be good.
- Maybe look at once a week recycle collection.
- Would like to see free kerbside mulching returned.
- Feel out of town dwellers who get no Kerbside collection should get a visible discount on rates.
- We have no collections so can only comment on McIntosh Road. Recycling there is very good. The hours are sometimes difficult for us. The condition of the facility is very good.
- Bimbimbi Way doesn't get kerbside collection OR any FREE TIP PASSES
- Do not use the kerbside collection facility as not a town resident, ditto for Peaceful Bay
- Peaceful bay tip is well run and innovative. Not like it used to be.
- Reinstate kerbside collection. Many seniors don't drive to use free tip passes.
- Recycling not done at Rivermouth Caravan Park.
- We do not have kerbside collection but I think the fortnightly pick up is a good idea. Sometimes I am shocked by the cost of taking refuse to the McIntosh Rd tip but like the vouchers that Council has introduced. Also good to see longer opening hours.
- The recycle shop is wonderful.
- As a rate payer with a block of land (building) we are paying extremely HIGH rates while renting and are not even given a tip pass!
- We have a fortnightly rubbish collection, but have had no luck in getting the correct coloured lid. It's been many months since we requested it.
- Recycling facility on McIntosh Rd is a bit out of control. They accept too much which will never be sold, is in rain so damaged.
- It is difficult to recycle large volumes of glass product in rural areas as no provision has been made. Suggest a collection of used bottles from wineries by the Shire to encourage recycling
- *Kerbside collection needs to include a twice yearly green waste collection to encourage householders to get rid of rubbish, especially just prior to summer and winter.*
- I live half the year at Nornalup. Bin is way too small considering the light fee. Also, no recycling available.
- Working well!!
- Excellent working team.
- Good service with excellent friendly staff.
- Star next to D)
- Outer Communities need to have more facility for re-cycling. Need to have re-cycling bin pick up.
- Rural property, so don't use kerbside collection.
- Need recycling pick up weekly. McIntosh Rd needs to be open longer hours on weekend.
- Tip shop is excellent! People who take green waste to tips should be encouraged to take equivalent back in the form of mulch as in some Australian shires.
- McIntosh Rd could have a less cluttered Tip Shop without all the junk that sits there.
- Why do we not have a green waste collection to stop people burning.
- Green waste & general kerbside collection as is in Albany and many other towns. We use to have this service in Denmark. 2-3 times a year would be appropriate.
- As semi rural, Denmark district, I have no knowledge of these nor do I wish to. I experience no problem managing my own recycle + tip runs (about 4 x per annum) I have nothing but praise for your McIntosh Rd refuse facility.
- We have to take our rubbish and recycling to the top and I consider 2.50 to 6.50 in a few years hike a bit rich!
- Would really like to see the mulching of residential pruning back. I live on Inlet Drive and when the burning season starts the air is foul & bothersome (as an asthmatic). Also on back fire rubbish burning in the town areas at any time as in keeping with other residential / built up areas in WA.

- The main concern is the fact that waste is trucked to the Albany Refuse Site. Surely Denmark has a place or area on already cleared land. E.g. farmland... possibly the Ag. School land or plantation land... There must be somewhere Denmark can have its own refuse site hole! Privatize waste management!
- I understand that recycled material is not being recycled.
- More than 3 tickets for ratepayers.
- What about kerbside collection? We are not all able to deliver our waste to the tip ourselves or to afford to pay others to do it for us. A choice of kerbside collection or tip passes or both should be offered.
- Not economic to recycle from Denmark, has been a waste of shire resources a secure land fill should have been established.
- *Kerbside collection should be extended further, e.g. Tully Rd.*
- Don't get kerbside; we have to pay for all our household rubbish to go to the tip.
- RECYCLING: Peaceful Bay ratepayers in leasehold area, who are largely intermittent users of this service, must nevertheless pay for a minimum of fortnightly rubbish collections which do not include a recycling collection. Recycling waste can be delivered to the Peaceful Bay Tip and transfer station but this begs the question as to why we need to pay for a rubbish collection at all? Waste and recycling could be delivered to the Peaceful Bay Transfer station as it was in the past, for a more reasonable cost to non-permanent (the majority) leaseholders.
- Living out of town we have no access to kerbside collection or recycling.
- Re wast. Annual roadside pickup.
- Why is there going to be kerbside collection for new Springdale Heights? Favouritism.
- Needs help! 2 bins at rotund need disinfecting as food gets dumped in them. The seats & tables need cleaning & painting toilets need some better signs.
- Tip shop is excellent too.
- General rubbish bins too small.
- If there was no charge for recycling bins for commercial property, recycling for us would be an option.
- I do not have kerbside collection too far out of town.
- Peaceful bay needs greater open hours.
- I have no experience of the Peaceful Bay facility.
- All working well but plenty of room for improvement and up grading.
- The costs to dump rubbish are too high for those who live out of town. If the high prices continue farmers and others will dump rubbish at other unauthorised sites, as has happened in the past.
- As an accommodation provider, kerbside collection (1 green bin emptied twice a week) is not adequate during peak holiday times.
- Need green waste collection probably twice a year to encourage property maintenance and cease the need for any burning of refuse. Bulk rubbish collection also should be introduced to discourage personal junk accumulating in backyards. Tip passes are good but not everyone has a trailer.
- Believe it would be beneficial to have a green waste collection or at least free dumpage of it to encourage less burning. We do burn as we have a large garden and it is too expensive to dump a trailer load of waste each fortnight.
- The tip is a wonderful example of what commitment to a cause can bring about. A dedicated staff doing a great job.
- Excellent for town residents. b) Councillors should support and encourage instead of criticising the Tip Shop management. c) Tip passes should be given to renters and not their landlords as we are the ones who have to keep the vegetation pruned etc.
- There are a lot of rotting couches at the McIntosh tip. Things do have a use by date and should be dealt with accordingly. Nobody would sit on a wet mouldy couch or mattress in the same condition.
- Recycling need constant improvement and should be encouraged and rewarded. Fishing spots and other sites of interest need waste management due to increase of tourist activity
- Kerbside collection could be extended to some less densely populated areas around the town.
- Should be more frequent recycling service, perhaps undertaken by shire rather than palming off to Clearway. Need Green waste collection particularly for the elderly.
- I don't understand why there is no rubbish collection for Sheoak Drive.
- Would like to see McIntosh refuse facility open some mornings e.g. 1 morning per week from 9am.
- An excellent service very reliable. Perhaps we could also have a kerbside green pick up and/or larger item pickup a couple of times a year.
- My previous comment re greens pick up seems the only neglected item.

- Ratepayers living outside the town should get passes to take rubbish to the tip.
- Ratepayers on special rural properties should receive tip cards or rubbish collection options.
- Recycling could be extended to more items.
- Comments are in relation to outside the town site.
- As I am not living there full time I am unsure.
- Would like a collection out at William Bay.
- We need green waste collection to stop people from burning off and creating a nuisance with the smoke.
- We live in a rural area and cannot comment on kerbside collection or Peaceful Bay refuse facility
- What is happening with glass recycling?
- Nonexistent kerbside collection for rural residents.
- At least P/Bay has trailer out the front when locked so that people can still deposit rubbish. However not open enough. McIntosh Rd 4 hours open per day is not enough for businesses. Tip fees way too expensive. Transfer station already working to capacity. Encourages people to dump rubbish in the bush or burn hazardous materials.
- Well Managed Facility
- Annual bulk collection on roadside badly needed.
- Would like to see green waste introduced.
- We generally need a large bin for general rubbish collection current small bin grossly inadequate.
- Recycling more recycling of plastics if possible ,
- Not everyone is able to use the McIntosh Rd facility. Some other form of collection needs to be addressed say on a quarterly basis at roadside (this used to be done).
- Love the tip shop!
- Rural besides being very expensive for rural users. Are we actually recycling there seems to be some doubt?
- Council staff are very helpful at tip.
- Not familiar
- Good stuff!
- Not used.
- Love Tip shop.
- Very happy with my service.
- There should be free green waste disposal at the tip Free mulch pickup from tip
- The Shire is doing a good job for recycling & McIntosh Rd Refuse Facility. A kerbside collection would be a good idea even if its once a year.
- If the material we so carefully place into separate bins at McIntosh Rd really sent for recycling, or does it all end up in landfill?
- I do not know how much of the content of my recycling bin is recycled and how much goes into landfill
- For people who have no access to trailer or utes large item throw out e.g. broken beds, fridges or washing machines, we need kerb side pickup instead of vouchers once a year maybe.
- Kerbside collection nonexistent. Pensioners need a twice yearly pick-up at least.
- Recycling tip shop great idea. There don't seem to be recycling bins in CBD reason for low rating
- Pour hours open the damn thing earlier.
- Council is to be congratulated for its support of the Tip Shop Facility at Denmark Tip.
- *Kerbside waste no longer done I'm happy to clean up... but paying for access to tip green waste is a bit much given the proportion that comes from shire trees.*
- No waste management outside of town limits. Due to no waste management in our area, to take rubbish to the refuse facility is very costly, as rate payers we get no tipping passes even though we pay our rates. Rubbish pick up should be covered in all surrounding districts. This is why people do illegal dumping of household rubbish!!
- Peaceful Bay Refuse Facility could do with more varied recycling facilities & closed bins for household refuse.
- Tip Passes (say one per month) for ratepayers not getting collection service.
- Recycling of white goods, computers and mobile phones could be better.
- Kerbside collection not available at airport subdivision
- Need a green waste collection once or twice a year.
- *Refuse facility opening hours are frustrating and in convenient.*
- Staff at this facility and the tip shop are excellent, very helpful, great service + great for a sustainable future.
- McIntosh facility should be upgraded and enlarged to store more recycled materials under cover
- Don't use any of the above kerbside not available/recycling not available McIntosh Rd too far/Peaceful Bay can't get there and too expensive

- Expand kerbside collection to outlying areas.
- What kerbside and the council stopped doing it which is a shame. I think we are the only council in WA that doesn't do bring out your dead and also vegetation kerbside. The tip passes don't seem to be passed onto rental tenant. Maybe they should be mailed to the address instead of the owners.
- Should be regular green waste collection or free access to the tip. Should have kerbside collection once or twice a year
- Would like to see a green waste collection not necessarily weekly but maybe monthly and is a choice with extra cost to landowner e.g.: weekly or fortnightly rubbish collection.
- No white good roadside collection?
- More recycling collection would be great i.e.: recycling bins weekly & waste bins fortnightly.
- Bins could be bigger large bins for recycling but small bins for rubbish, we have a large family and struggle with rubbish. All bins in Perth are large.
- Helpful staff at McIntosh Road Refuse Facility.
- As much recycling as possible, even if it costs us (as general ratepayers). Too high fees > dumping in the bush.
- Kerbside collection needs extending 10km around CBD. Some close to CBD areas miss out e.g. Cussons/Ruhen Place. Same for recycling.

- b) Youth
- c) People with Disabilities
- d) Families/Children

- Keep the footpaths clear of vehicles for the disabled and people with prams can get around.
- We desperately need an indoor swimming pool!
- These facilities vary enormously. E.g. Strickland St is now very 'disabled' friendly. Other areas of the town are REALLY poor.
- Not relevant to this family.
- I'm not in any of the above categories and so don't really know what's out there for them.
- Public transport and a swimming pool would enhance the life of seniors.
- Rural Dweller
- Denmark by rain with active children? Very difficult!! Provide shade sails for playgrounds and upgrade equipment!
- Denmark needs an Aquatic centre which has an indoor/outdoor pool with a specific play area for children and a swimming area for laps and general swimming. It is so bad that Denmark does not have one. I personally go to the aquatic centre 2 4 times per week for better aerobic classes and swimming lessons for children. Most families are at least doing the swim lessons. Denmark could make lots of money out of having a swimming pool and better fitness centre that incorporates health and fitness classes to be a better standard.
- Not sure what to recommend for families. Prefer the natural environment.
- I am none of the above so do not know.
- Await result of Aged Care friendly community resources project.
- More disabled parking
- I think all of the above need a lot more care and consideration and with consultation with the particular groups to hear what they want or need.
- No facilities for PWD. As compared to family/youth services.
- I find this question difficult to answer. Each of the groups are too wide. E.g. there's a wide range of facilities for some sub/groups but not for others. E.g. There a good ramps etc but few parking areas. There are housing facilities for active seniors but very limited for frail aged. There are play ground for young children, but not for primary school aged etc.
- Construction of local 50m swimming pool vital for the entire community.
- A hydro therapy pool would be of great use to the increasing number of seniors. Recently I have spoken to a number of people who need this and can't access it. This has been something that has been an issue for some time and will only result in much greater need.

- I would like to make a comment about the skateboards, bikes being used daily on the main town footpaths. They have a first rate skating facility at Mclean Park but pedestrians have to contend with these people on skate boards there appears to be no policing at all on this matter.
- More housing for over 55's would be welcome. As the hospitals aged care facility only provides shared accommodation Denmark needs a facility like the former Aged Care units at the old hospital people do not like to share rooms or toilet facilities.
- The HAV service run by the hospital is wonderful. All the staff I have encountered have been excellent and well worth of praise.
- All seem to be adequate.
- There is no soap in the recreation centre's disabled toilet. People in wheelchairs have no way of reaching the soap dispenser in the general toilet. Why bother to put a sink and towels in the disabled loos when there's no soap.
- We desperately need a pool.
- I am a senior, but as yet do not need special requirements. I look on senior requirements as post 75 years of age, or for people with disabilities.
- Have not had to use any of the above facilities so unsure of what is available.
- These areas as council is aware should continually be addressed.
- All shop owners should be forced to have full accessibility shopfronts in the CBD. Playgrounds need improved equipment. See Standard of Parks and Gardens above. Footpaths that actually connect are a great idea for prams. Example is the footpath alongside Amaroo Village which does not continue to South Coast Highway. Whose idea was that????
- I have no personal experience with any of these.
- Is there anything for people with disabilities? Lots of ramps & access things but I'd be thinking in terms of social and recreational services (Oops refer to Q.6)
- Too much emphasis on youth when responsibility rests with parents and a small group are overloading services. Many responsible youth don't use system as their activities are independent.
- Denmark's facilities and services are fine... You don't have to go overboard... The facilities are adequate.
- All categories could be improved
- Would like to see Old Hospital Buildings used temporary help for homeless or troubled, nowhere for the old fringe dwellers to relax in town anymore, we all smoke. Perhaps a room for us there with some things to do ; pool table , table tennis , coffee, we are still to active for the over 55's club.
- The youth centre is a breeding ground for bored juvenile delinquency! People with disabilities are not considered with regard to waste disposal such as offering kerbside collection.
- The development of youth facility of Mclean park And the work of Aaron Bailey has been a great thing for Denmark.
- Total overkill in streetscape.
- Denmark needs an indoor pool to cater to people of all ages.
- Because I work in Aged Care and Disabilities services I am unaware of whether the facilities available for youth and families are satisfactory
- Have no experience with facilitation for young people.
- Ages care needs will be increasing in this community, provision needs to be made NOW!
- All need attention.
- From what I can tell because: a) I'm not a senior yet b) my teenagers have grown up c) I'm not disabled and d) my teenagers have grown up.
- Exercises such as recent Universal Access Challenge is a great way to judge facilities for the disabled; however I have not done this.
- All could benefit from a pool even unheated for summer activities. Where are the fetes?
- This is a very big portion of the community and as everyone has a little something there is no recall overall for everyone. More thought maybe into again the bigger picture.
- Great sporting facilities. Could do with a playground suitable for bigger kids in Berridge Park. All equipment is only suitable for kids to about 7 years.
- There are things in place for all the above but more wouldn't hurt.
- Not used.
- Feel for the teenagers of the town, not much seems available, if they don't play sport; I accept this is a rural problem everywhere, not just Denmark.
- Swimming pool required.

- I have defiantly seen an improvement in the town regarding access for disabilities
- Playgrounds, caravan parks good. More could be done for people with disabilities e.g. wheelchair bound.
- A properly designed Community Centre based around the library could provide facilities for all the above groups.
- We need more programs for the young disabled most of these services are only offered in Albany.
- I don't use many special facilities or services so am unable to comment.
- Again not living there full time to notice these items.
- I don't fit any of those categories and am therefore not qualified to comment
- Seniors organised programmes are good, but the room allocated to the seniors at the Old Hospital is very small. So the Over Fifties group still have to have their monthly meetings at the Rec Centre. More importantly access to the small room is via a flight of steps, so is not as accessible to disabled or wheelchair bound seniors. The Rainbow room would have been more suitable as it is accessible by a ramp.
- Denmark is very family oriented thank you!
- No facilities for seniors.
- But we still need a pool
- A Pool would be great for winter and for school swimming and adult exercising. Denmark needs a Pool.
- Pool would be good!
- It would be great to have a swimming pool for use by all residents. For physio purposes also and for the elderly & disabled who have difficulty accessing beach locations.
- RE: people with disabilities there is still no provision of soap to wash hands in disabled facility at Rec Centre WHY???
- Hydrotherapy pool
- The facilities for the disabled & families & children appear to be okay but as I don't use them I don't really know.
- Not familiar
- I'm not sure of facilities and services available for seniors as I haven't had to use them. Aged care needs to become a priority we shouldn't have to go to Albany for care. Aged people need to stay in a familiar environment.
- I have not yet needed to access these services.
- Better playground facilities at playground in front of pub, with shade
- The Shire has done a lot to improve Strickland St for people with disabilities.
- A pool is required. Golf, bowling, tennis are for people. A pool would be for everyone it is costly to go to Albany for 30 mts of hydrotherapy + counterproductive.
- Families & children does not apply, so I cannot answer this one.
- (As a senior) Youth & family facilities seem good but I am not seeing them up close. Seniors facilities OK really. Heated pool needed. Services for people with disabilities could be better but projects could be more carefully chosen than expensive Liberty swing and destructive Poison Point development. This (disability needs) is an area we are newly aware of. I work with PWD & constantly looking for recreation ideas Classes at Rec Centre good idea if enough interest shown
- Pool / pictures in the hall.
- We've gone as far as we ought. Local management is fine/facilities are state responsible and there is a need for them to be more even handed and consultative e.g. 22 aged care beds less than half open Mt Barker obviously have a better connection with a smaller population. Many more beds, regular ext it's not fair to locals who a) are housed away from partner and family b) are disadvantaged by the "drag" caused by performance data and a growing population.
- We are a small town that has come a long way over the last 30 years. As we grow so will the need for services. But people have to realise that services are connected to numbers.
- As noted before, some of the footpaths are not safe for elderly/disabled people.
- Main thing missing is the Swimming Pool (all ages)
- We need more facilities for both the elderly& the youth (12 25/30). There is very little for the youth to do in town.
- Swimming pool is needed for children to have an alternative to ocean swimming or a trip to Albany.
- More aged care beds needed.
- Sorry but I'm in the middle of these.

- Have nothing to do with the above
- Never been there!
- Have not heard of any programs being offered for PWD?
- Never use this facility.
- Don't use the facility.
- It's not something we use.
- Enjoy the diversity offered. Aware some activities financial not viable (re staff time) Competitions seem to attract consistent turn out enjoying new gym facility.
- Don't use it.

- Do not frequent the library.
- A bit small need more books otherwise have to go to Albany after a while for more choice.
- Could do with more space and more books.

- Far too small Volume/range of books inadequate Children/young adult range inadequate and out of date.
- Don't use the facility.

- Once again "it's the people who help us in there wonderful, friendly and helpful".
- More space required.

- Have always been very helpful and friendly.
- Quality of service totally dependent upon the individual staffer you happen to have service your concern. This means that there are internal training and supervision quality procedures concerns that urgently need to be addressed.
- Run really well.
- I always get great personal service.
- Have only had a couple of calls to the shire but there seems to be 'o what do you want' attitude Extra information isn't always provided when a small bit of information can go a long way rather than you have to call someone else offer to put people through etc
- Have had no dealings with regard to a, b, and c, I assume refers to over the counter transactions.
- Most positive, proactive and obliging council I have dealt with, with the notable exception of the building inspectorate!

- Generally customer focus is 'basic' shire staff represent the shire and need up skilling to respond to public.
- Advice and information varies according to staff attending.
- Staff usually professional and co-operative.
- Front of house staff generally excellent in response to request for information. Planners, health officers appear to be under pressure.
- Good staff deserve a pay rise or at least recognition!
- Just don't do what Denmark post office has to do.
- I have had little dealings with Shire Staff in recent times so I cannot really comment.
- We have a fortnightly rubbish collection, but have had no luck in getting the correct coloured lid. It's been many months since we requested it.
- Staff have always been friendly full of service when I have been to Shire offices.
- Enquiries we have made to shire staff have always been dealt with in a very professional manner.
- Always helpful and courteous.
- B) I know you're busy.
- Pleasant dealing with customer's request.
- Administration staff are always friendly and answer the phones straight away. Keep it up Shire.
- As a resident of 10 years I have consistently found your shire staff the friendliest and most helpful of any council I have previously known.
- I contacted council early Jan for a call back from your health officer no one returned my call.
- I haven't needed to contact the Shire for info often but on the few occasions I have, it was not possible to find out anything conclusive regarding (1) over 1 acre of clearing & burning (over several months ) on Inlet foreshore. (2) Invasive plants & huge trees on property boundary of 20m wide blocks.
- Sometimes too SLOW!
- (b) The information re: tip hours for Denmark was wrong when you put an asterisk people go to it! Poor Guy on the gate didn't know what was going on ... I explained he was turning people away not good enough should have been picked up.
- Normally very good, but in my opinion too many staff.
- Excellent
- Great work girls!
- Rarely need to contact shire.
- Customer requests have not always been dealt with effectively issues have been delayed if a staff member is away on leave there should be some other way to deal with this situation.
- Have always found the staff to be friendly and helpful. Re recent introduction of fee for snake removal, although I'm happy to pay this I do have concerns that this will not be good for our snakes as many people will use a shovel on the poor snake rather than pay \$25-50 fee for their removal by the Ranger. In the interests of our snakes this fee needs to be factored into the rates.
- Never have contact with the Shire.
- Very little dealings with shire staff.
- Planning and building services are slow.
- Staff always pleasant and willing to assist where they can.
- Staff friendly and helpful.
- Haven't needed to request information.
- Male engineering staff could benefit from telephone customer service training.
- In my experience- responses to requests for information made in writing or by telephone, rarely get a response. I understand from friends that I am not alone in this. It seems that requests are passed to whoever is deemed appropriate to deal with the matter but there is no follow up that there has been any response.
- I personally have little contact with Shire Staff at present, so not able to comment fully. From past contact found staff very pleasant and helpful.

- I do know who my local councillor is. But I have never seen him + never spoken to him. I think he takes the easy option + deals with local groups, i.e. Progress Assoc which represents approx 20% of PB population.
- Have no need to have contact with councillors so unable to comment.
- Councillors' decision making seen to be dictated by business interests or even worse inherent non-capacity to formulate and/or deliver on policy. Very disappointing!
- Haven't dealt with the councillors yet.
- I can't answer this as I'm married to a Councillor.
- There was lot of evasive behaviour about the damming of Denmark River rather than open and honest information. The councillors need to leave their own agenda behind and work for the town i.e. citizen centred services The town is easily divided on issues and the Councillors need to be in agreement and work from that platform.
- Had no contact with them. Do any of them call a public meeting in their ward to meet their public and discuss local issues with them?
- Have had no dealings with councillors.
- New ways to 'connect' councillors with Denmark people is required website option.
- Not answered Excellent in some areas. Variable in others. Very concerned around development and the degree to which town planning is not adhered to.
- Have had no direct contact with councillors lately so can't comment.
- Never had the need to contact any councillors.
- Cannot comment as never had to utilise a councillor directly
- Don't often use.
- I have really only had dealing with Ross Thornton and John Sampson. Both have been accessible and have listened to what I have to say. Overall I think this Council is doing a good job.
- I have never had cause to contact a Councillor
- Most councillors have gone on Council to further their own interests in business.
- I can only comment on the Councillors who represent my area.
- Unthankful job but someone has to do it.
- Have had no problems.
- Never needed to contact a councillor.
- I have had a 'one of one' about a particular issue to determine performance, but believe all are there to do what's in Denmark's best interest.
- Never had a problem.
- Have had no contact.
- Unrestricted development does concern me: Once a councillor is elected he/she is there to represent their electorates interests not their own.
- I have not had contact with councillors.
- Some councillors have double dipped in their roles and personal business interests. Maybe this will be changed through conflict of interest policy implementations.
- In my opinion only 2 councillors have actively helped me when I have bought up signage issues; which I believe the council is failing, Denmark Businesses to promote their business, it appears it is ok for some but no others, tourism based business are given more leeway than all year round normal business.
- Only had dealings with two Councillors
- You are not there to "perform" you have a job to do to the best of your ability for the future of the district. Thank you for your efforts.
- John Sampson, Alex Syme and Dawn Pedro are the most approachable others do not hold same values, into unsustainable development
- Some councillors are very responsive and others not at all.

- I recently sent an e-mail to every Councillor, not one responded with an acknowledgement of receiving it.
- Need to have a box to tick that lets you know there are some Councillors who are attentive and accessible and some who aren't. That's been my experience.
- Quality of Councillors varies as do the people they represent. The overall performance of 8 is excellent, including the President; 3 need hardly be present at Council meetings; while 1 is frequently obstructive. The demand made on the time through committees and other meetings is huge for those Councillors who take on these responsibilities and we should be extremely grateful to those who do shoulder these tasks.
- Very little dealings with councillors.
- Had no contact.
- Of 3 councillors for the Kent/Nornalup Ward, only 2 are accessible and interested in representing their ward. The 3rd is never seen in the ward to the extent that he could not even attend the ward meeting. Councillors should be required to live in the ward they represent. There should be more wards, not less.
- Have never seen or heard from our representatives on the shire there should be an obligation on their part to make themselves available to constituents.
- Haven't had cause to contact our Councillors suppose that means they must be doing OK.
- Make little contact with councillors, so guess I'm basically happy with performance overall
- At this stage we have had no need.
- Haven't any need to use councillors yet.
- There are too many of them! There should be no real estate/developers on Council! We need more women on council!!!
- What can I say? some are excellent others are a waste of space, I am sure that all believe they are working for the common good, and that they are good councillors, just as we all think we are good drivers. You really can't lump them all together and get a meaningful response. I guess that is why we have elections.

- Regularly cars are parked at the school at the clearway areas and no parking area at the end of Mitchell Street. The ranger drives past nearly every day and can see that people are parked not only illegally but dangerously. Nothing appears to happen. Once I was parked at ocean beach near the prawn channel and was asked to move my car from where it was parked. Surely we should be more vigilante around our schools, as the risk assessment would have to be higher.
- More enforcement of illegal camping required.
- Ranger services lacking: parking on footpaths, in now parking areas etc littering camping noise unfortunately people don't do the right thing if they can get away with doing what they want. Many bylaws etc are totally ignored at the cost to those trying to live in Denmark in a reasonable responsible way.
- Public Health received 'Poor' because of the extremely limited services available at our hospital, though I know this is a State issue.
- My perception is that the planning section is under intense pressure and I am not happy that action has not been taken in regards to developers undertaking environmental destruction. In terms of fire prevention, I would like to see greater community engagement and activities to guide people about what where to go in the case of a fire
- Have not used these services.
- Rangers certainly represent the Shire's interests very diplomatically sad that the rest of staffers and council can't emulate these field officers' skills. (c) Is a total joke! Or less worse corrupt!
- These all seem to be running well.
- Difficult to comment on. I feel council is not strong enough in dealing with people who go against planning permission (Smith street and dam on South Coast Highway). Council should act more quickly once decisions have been made.

- Nearly every time I go the Lights Beach (that is my first choice for swimming,) there are dogs. I have never seen a ranger there to inform the dog owners to remove their pets.
- Rangers should Stop, think, assess then act before carrying out their duties and use a bit of common sense.
- Fire prevention debate/focus is one-sided towards control burning, not allowing other preventative alternatives in my opinion.
- D & f) Dog poo at Mclean Park Oval. Ban dogs from oval.
- Every day I have seen parking on footpaths & brick paved areas, parking in disabled bays (with no acrod signs), dogs on the beach and uncontrolled in parks. Not a ranger to be seen.
- Some improvements are needed in Town Planning Permits and attitudes to Building, also N.R.M, also the amount of empty houses to holiday home owners, when housing shortage is so huge.
- Maybe another ranger is needed to control stray dogs and cats.
- *B* & e) not answered. \* Good overall but major concerns over 1) undergrowth clearance zones (too extensive on small blocks) and the value it has in real terms in event of catastrophic fire 2) no apparent evacuation sites for the town.
- Too pro burning!
- With the ever changing staff, the perception of continuity is challenged, and delays occur. Generally shire does really well with the challenge of these resources.
- Have not used the services of some of these departments.
- In regards to town planning, I like the idea of spreading the population growth to areas such as Peaceful Bay and Nornalup. High Density planning in town goes against Denmark's natural chilled out vibe I believe.
- Rangers/law enforcement they need to stopping people who work in town centre from parking all day in main street. Each business should have parking for employees. Also stop people camping in main centre of town i.e.: car park near toilets near 4 square supermarket and lawn area near fire brigade.
- Could be better re barking dogs & straying cats.
- I cannot comment on the provision of services for these areas. However, I have contacted the rangers several times on a number of issues and they are always helpful.
- We need more aged care beds.
- No doubt this will come up in the Strategic Plan as it probably needs to be improved.
- I'm unsure of the Councils philosophy with regard to future development. The proposed shopping centre is a concern as it may detract business from the Town Centre where already shop are struggling
- The hills of Perth have burnt badly. What is stopping the same thing happening in Denmark?
- Takes too long for building permits.
- I live in Paterson Street and would like to see the jungle opposite burnt.
- The fire danger to Denmark is huge, given a variety of adverse conditions coming together. This needs to be given absolute priority.
- Fire prevention- A plan open to the public needs to be put into place. Cleaning up fuel loads within freehold land under bush in residential areas is required. Evacuation procedures need to be made public.
- Too many areas within the town site and surrounding areas are a "fire hazard". The recent happenings in Lake Clifton and Perth should be a wakeup call for all concerned.
- Those services I've made use of are fine.
- A more visible presence during the holidays would be good at Peaceful Bay. Strategies could be developed to train 'casuals' i.e. honorary 'rangers' whose main job is to offer advice. Need good PR skills!
- NRM needs more funding and a dedicated bush crew employed by the Shire.
- The planning of Strickland Street has proved unpopular and vehicles are constantly in danger of collision.
- Re: Fire I don't think the answer to either climate control or Fire Prevention can be to burn everything. Would love to see Denmark Shire progressive in this area encouraging other strategies like good surveillance, good fire breaks, parkland clearing of understorey in residential areas etc.
- Policing of standards needed. I.e. signage applications not applied to industries.
- The industrial area should NOT be in the paperbark wetland area. Should be away from waterways on an open paddock.
- When I came here there was one policeman ; and he was great how many now with the population doubled 5 or 7 don't think we have more crime ; so even though they are so nice , feel a bit threatened , when will they start saying hello to us ..? Too distant- plenty of weapons in the street?
- Springdale Beach = "a white elephant"?
- Town planning. Strickland St is pretty, but non functional.

- Too many houses being built in fire-prone areas
- FIRE PREVENTION: It is very concerning that the maps on the BUSHFIRE WARNINGS double-sided colour brochure lack detail, are not to scale and are not inclusive of the areas they purport to cover. This deficit could be extremely dangerous in a bushfire crisis. For example: Richardson and Wentworth Roads are just two of many roads that are not shown on any of the maps so it would be impossible to direct an emergency crew to those roads by referring to the maps (which state "Please use these maps in conjunction with the Watch and Act and Emergency Warning messages to know where you are." The purpose of these highly stylised maps is unclear, and therefore, potentially dangerous if the purpose of this brochure is to increase awareness of procedures to follow in a bushfire.
- d) Sad that families can't have babies at the Denmark Hospital. e) We attended a very good seminar about fires about five years ago at the Shire offices. These should be a regular event.
- Fuel reduction: vacant lots to be slashed building envelopes cleared/maintained.
- Home building should not be allowed in uncleared areas. Houses in bush-place a great burden on community facilities which should NOT BE ALLOWED! There should be two ways out of every area of housing!
- More resources need to go towards community and household preparedness, information and training at household level in high risk areas.

- No thank you!
- If the Council does go into residential development I'd like it to focus affordable housing in state of the art passive solar, carbon neutral community development! (Serious) I would really love an indoor pool a simple solar heated 6 lane pool. Dual use path along Scotsdale Road long overdue. Earlier in the survey I indicated support for reducing the number of councillors. I don't necessarily think that is a good idea but seeing as how it is likely to be forced on the council, better to be proactive and get the new maximum in a timely fashion. Keep up the good work.
- A sustainable liveable town FOR residents. Don't simply allow the town to sprawl.
- The aquatic centre 2. More frequent mowing/slashing of public areas (i.e.: Community Park and Mokare Heritage Trail during 'snake' season 3. Steps cut into the (steep) hillside or handrails erected to facilitate easier access to the dog beach at Lights
- A very 'user friendly' survey. Thanks for the opportunity to have my say!
- A good way forward to off on-line survey. Please, please do not destroy the best things of Denmark, the people, relaxed atmosphere, not over-developed, great locations. It would be great if there was more rubbish picking-up and education in reserves, beaches, fishing-spots, along the road. Paths and cycle ways that link to each other so that we can all reduce our carbon foot-print. Forcing the slowing down of vehicles within town especially where people will be crossing roads. Promote the Denmark lifestyle.
- Council to recognise that communicating with Progress Assoc. is not the same, or as efficient, as communication with ratepayers. Acknowledge the need for drainage in Williams Road Peaceful Bay. The Shire should be making decisions + Handling distribution of 'Royalties' monies in Peaceful Bay. It could be made better use of.
- Overall I believe that Council is doing a satisfactory job however the community engagement processes could be undertaken in different ways (not just a survey for example) to identify our needs. At times I feel that despite being asked for our opinion, Council staff and councillors are still making core decisions about the future of our community rather than it being a partnership between all three entities.
- Do we really need the wind farm located on our pristine coast as a so called tourist attraction? The Denmark community needs a "Community Development Officer" Someone to refer issues of welfare, youth, drugs and alcohol, mental health etc to. I do not understand why this has not already happened and that we are one of a very few Shires that does not have one!! Why does the Shire not consider this an important position???????
- The Council needs to inform and accommodate all people living within the Denmark Shire, not just within the town of Denmark. I did not feel that this survey really applied to myself, being a resident of Nornalup for only part of the year and of Perth most of the year. Also, the survey needs a participant information sheet attached to inform the participants of all issues within the survey, otherwise inaccurate data will be collected.
- Subject Relocation of Denmark Cottage Crafts, the Denmark Cottage Crafts is well patronised by both locals and tourists who have visited the shop many times before. It is in keeping with the area of Denmark, who promote arts

and crafts, and it is unique to the area. The profits are donated to many local Charities needs in the area, along with the flying doctor. If relocated it would not help with tourism, which is Denmark's main source of income for many locals. Car Parking is of only a real concern during Christmas Holidays /New Year, and Easter.

- Not at this point.
- While accepting that the cost of construction and ongoing maintenance of a community swimming pool is not really a viable issue at present, it should not be shelved into the "Too Hard" basket, but given every opportunity to become a reality.
- Basically Denmark is a growing shire and the Council needs a strong plan, to communicate the plan and to work towards a cohesive citizen base Don't forget other age groups in the endeavour to provide youth and aged services Promote environmentally sound projects such as a target towards a certain percentage of housing having solar electricity by a certain date become known for something special don't let the town go the way of Margaret River
- Comment on Q2 Demolition of Infant health clinic, retain Denmark Cottage Craft building and incorporate building into new commercial area developed there. Create car parking behind new buildings Promote Denmark as tourism centre with advert on TV either using Visitor centre as focus or individuals who are willing to contribute to advert and their product being named.
- A little more attention to detail for example the directions for finding this survey on the website were inadequate
- Denmark needs a pool that is sufficient in size to accommodate school usage, seniors and leisure activities.
- Get rid of Bolle's Barometer ASAP! And put the tower to better use in community. E.g.: Sea Rescue tower or lifesavers lookout at Ocean Beach.
- Denmark is a lovely town, but I do believe there should be better sporting facilities for not just young people and babies/toddlers but for the elderly. Also the park opposite the pub should be improved. Denmark should take a look at Donnybrook Park, especially as there is only one park here and it is very poor in regards to sun protection, and the limited activities for children to play.
- Council needs to address the gender and age imbalance in representation, or lack thereof. 11 of the 12 councillors are males over the age of 50 yrs with only 1 woman councillor. There are numerous reasons many women don't stand for election e.g. school-aged children, working full or part-time and the main person responsible for 'keeping the home fires burning', domestic duties; lack of support or encouragement/confidence or don't like the odds etc...... Young people are also not represented or given an opportunity to participate in decision-making, or at least learning about local government. Discussion and ensuing decisions could well take a very different tack if there was more welcoming opportunity for equal representation.
- Basically I think the present council is doing a good job. Difficult times and a growing community. I think the strength of Denmark lies in preserving the natural environment as much as possible, since that is the reason most people move here and also why people like to holiday here.
- The pool!
- Swimming lessons at Greens Pool William's Bay are excellent thank you for the excellent service, can be a bit difficult to park at this location but was manageable.
- I have already made my comments previously and I am sure that you don't need to hear them again. All I will say is: that if you take anything of what I have typed seriously then I wish you all the best. If you think it is just a load of Bull then keep running your little shire with all of your little committees and one day I hope you wake up to who is running this town (NOT YOU that's for sure) and know that your days are numbered with council because your private little committees will be the ones in your shoes.
- Councillors should lobby the Water Corporation to construct a new wastewater treatment plant in the hinterland, with the run off directed to forestry growth. ALSO Lobby for the construction of a pump station at Ocean Beach Camp Ground and new reticulation system to pick up waste water along Ocean Beach Rd.
- Climate change, sustainable buildings, bigger library, No GM crops in Shire, more trees/landscaping within the town, new buildings should be aesthetically pleasing, promotion of curb green belts (i.e. planted to native vegetation creating a corridor for wildlife) along roads
- Generally very happy with the performance, emphasis and direction of the Shire Council and Staff.
- The only major issue I currently have is with speeding on Ocean Beach Road as we walk this path everyday and live on it. Every day many people speed in the 60 zone going toward Ocean Beach, I would like to see it dropped to 50 as we have had near misses with people not caring about the speed limit. Overall the council are doing an amazing job with the resources they have. As a new person now living in Denmark it is a wonderful to see such a caring community.

- I think lighting at the corner Ocean Beach Road and the Highway should be increased before the winter sets in as this is a very difficult intersection especially if it is wet and dark. Also I think there should be more control over dogs roaming the streets; some of them are not the most friendly.
- Assist with environmental design for new residential building Support of sustainable agriculture Creation of farmers market or investigating feasibility Plan/support light industry and regulate with strong environmental guidelines and support projects to achieve these concepts, i.e.; waste management, energy saving solar industries, renewable energy. Tourism expansion and support with similar focus on ' Green & Clean' image of Denmark's environment. Mundabuddi track for new options for bicycle friends planning & facilities.
- As the sand bar has been opened at west end for 17 years and inlet has deteriorated severely with beaches polluted with rotting matter. It is suggested that a five year trial of eastern openings is trialled.
- I definitely feel Council should be active in facilitating and encouraging more community housing projects for rentals e.g.: Lionsville type projects/Mia Mia housing Co-op etc, to help with housing shortage or even a Shire Caravan Park Project for Locals as Temporary accommodation support. Thanks to all of you! As I know you are all doing what you feel best for our wonderful community.
- Road side collection of rubbish (household) to be collected on a 3 month or 6 month basis like they do in Albany. Would be nice for aged people who don't have access to trailers and who do not drive.
- The development of Mitchell Street precinct. i.e.: Heritage/Residential V. commercial. Need information about current & future status. High density building (residential) in Brazier St, and adjacent to laneway at rear of Price Street. Properties. -Tardy and ongoing building impacts on residents by way of noise, dust, and visual aesthetics. Residential occupation affects current residents. CBD area is becoming high density in terms of building and occupancy.
- Doing a great job. Keep up the good work.
- Denmark is relatively small shire I would like to know funds were being managed well to suit residents of the town best and primarily. Development should be viable and without destruction of the charm and natural beauty of the area.
- Council should look at having solar powered flashing school zone 40kph as they do in some metropolitan school zones. Council should also look at free household green waste delivered to the tip as this would encourage cleaner yards and less burning off in the winter months.
- I think the council should consider allocating a suitable area of sufficient size for the establishment of some community ventures. 1) Community Garden 2) Men's Shed 3) Play ground for older children (who aren't interested in skate boards) 4) and to extend bike path along Scotsdale Rd to the Steiner School as it is quite dangerous to have children riding on the road (and other cyclists) as there is no safe over taking. I think you do a great job and I don't envy you.
- Connect the Youth Centre to Strickland Street with a mini treetop walk Make Denmark CBD as unique as possible with Art, sculpture, murals, trees. Make South Coast Highway also unique and special to make tourists stop and taste Denmark from Ocean Beach Road to the Ag School. Try an Eastern bar Opening Fire management is crucial and critical to Denmark's safety with a strategic break along the backside of houses north of Lights Road level road shoulders are safer
- I am disappointed because we have no computer we are not able to enter this survey online so we are not eligible to go in the draw for a \$100 voucher to one of the three restaurants.
- A swimming facility has long been a sort after item. Whereas most people realise the cost etc of a full facility, perhaps the council could consider a therapy pool. With an aging population and a youth programme, prompting sporting activities such a pool would be well used, and not have to bear the burden of full time life-savers, etc.
- Future consideration should be given to securing the land for a heavy haul bypass around the town suggest from behind the golf course connecting via the reinstatement of the old railway bridge near the Rivermouth Caravan park to a suitable location joining the south coast highway. A bus service either public or private to and from Albany on a daily basis maybe utilising both routes i.e. Lower Denmark road in one direction and South Coast highway on the alternate direction.
- Issues: More public art/street sculpture to depict story of town. Ensure every building allocates and uses 2% of cost to some sculpture i.e. Denmark visitor centre, hospital give character to town. Keep town linked to outside world. Help us see outside town issues promote linkages with councils outside sister cities. Development and growth pressuring infrastructure, peaceful bay? Town etc. Lobby more, ask.
- Council should encourage tourist support type retail outlets (particularly food outlets/cafes) to be open longer and more consistently for tourists. This year 2011 New Years was a farce, if I'd been a tourist, Denmark would be low down on my list of places to re-visit as many couldn't get basic food and drink on New Year's day and other public holidays (either not open or closing early). It seems that the Chamber of Commerce is pushing hard for more

development and tourists but many (most?) locals aren't so convinced that this is such a good idea. Perhaps tourism as an economic mainstay, if that is the way Denmark is committed to, needs to be more nature orientated. There isn't for example a sliced log anywhere around showing tree growth rings versus time other than in Kings Park. How about putting a cut Karri tree log upright in the Visitor Centre tower? Use the stairs to show time up the tree versus height or what lives in a tree at different levels. This will mean the barometer will have to go...... Denmark needs to 'seize the day' and promote itself as a closely nature related community, environment friendly, sustainable, eastern gateway to the Wilderness areas and south coast National Parks, different from all the other 'wanna be' little towns around WA. Council should be supporting this concept, tourists will come for the experience, people will settle if this idea motivates them, if it is too 'green' do we need them? Perhaps they should consider living in the city or Margaret River, Dunsborough, Dongara etc.

- As stated, I believe Denmark's remaining natural vegetation needs to be cared for with high priority. Invasive weed eradication should be a priority. Furthermore, any clearing of native vegetation should not be allowed, unless absolutely necessary. I oppose the proposed Poison Point Development (separate letter included) and also the wind farm.
- At present, we are represented by 2 very dedicated councillors, one pro development, one not so. Both however, are doing a very good job. I do like the idea of getting young people, even of school age, involved in council activities. Local government could get a youthful boost. Cheers.
- Speed limit at Rivermouth Caravan Park not policed. Especially at busy time when there are a lot of families on bikes or with prams etc. Also the car park at the rear of the Fig Tree complex. Poor condition, very steep in parts, no lighting. Dangerous.
- Public Transport is the main issue with me going to and from Albany at reasonable hours. It would be something I would use.
- I am totally opposed to a fast food outlet in Denmark, especially a drive through facility. I believe they have no benefits and create noise, smell and visual pollution as well as obesity and behavioural problems. 2. When developments are approved keep carparks at the rear as they are unsightly. The Visitor Centre is a good example of this. 3. I do not like the locality address system. Denmark is regarded as a good place to live whereas most people think Hay is in NSW so it is confusing. 4. I also do not like the new numbering system. I cannot see the benefits and liked the anonymity of a RMB number. We were told it was for safety so that in an emergency your property would be easier to find however surely if you have to say which number you are at it is just as easy to give the location. 5. I think we should retain the leafy roads and lower speed limits. The winding, tree lined roads are one of Denmark's attractions and it is better to retain them than to knock down trees and widen roads so that speed limits can be increased. 6. Denmark should be promoted as the town that doesn't have high rise, traffic lights, fast food, etc. The ultimate getaway. 7. There are some lovely private gardens in Denmark. Perhaps these could be an attraction for visitors. Bridgetown opens gardens annually and many go to view them over a 2 week period which helps the town as people need accommodation, food, etc.
- A footbridge at the end of Riverbend Lane...it makes so much sense and the community here is very enthusiastic about it.


